Death at Canandaigua

In "Breaking Away," front-runner in many lineups of inspirational and sports movies, an Indiana teen, just months younger than the late Kevin Ward, idolizes a team of Italian bicyclists. Training hard, he gets to compete with them and proves himself their equal.

That is, until one of them hurls a tire pump through his sprockets, knocking him out of the race.

The more Rocket Man replayed Ward's death at Canandaigua Motor Speedway, the more he meshed it with "Breaking Away," plus the John Grisham baseball novel "Calico Joe" and spring training's "inter-species games."

About two weeks ago, NASCAR superstar Tony Stewart bumped Ward out of a minor-league, dirt-track at Canandaigua. Ward foolheart-edly ran onto the track to shake his fist during a yellow-flag caution lap. Stewart's car struck him, during a minor skid,

many claim.

Most of the commentary boiled it down to seven words: "Ward should have stayed in his car."

Says Southern Tier historian driver and Ford Easton, whose new book "Stock Car Racing in the '50s" is flying off the shelves at Indy-500 speed: "We all learned early on not to exit your car on track unless on fire or strong possibility of fire and then only if advised it was safe to exit. The kid did the cardinal rule break that most of us know better than to do even if upset. Not Stewart's fault."

Rocket Man, whose checkered resume includes a gig as dirt-track announcer, sees it differently. What was a NAS-CAR points leader doing racing for tire money on an unfamiliar track with inexperienced drivers laps? Metaphorically, why was a major-league all-star playing hardball at auto racing's equivalent of Batavia?

At least the lad in "Breaking Away" suf-

fered no more than a skinned knee and shattered illusions. Not so in "Calico Joe," where an aging pitcher with an attitude that would make Sal Maglie look like Mister Rogers, beans a rising rookie into insensibility. Baseball spring training often pairs majorleaguers with collegians - Yanks vs. Army, Red Sox vs. Boston College. These are celebrations of the game and the code is not even unspoken: No knockdowns, no takeouts.

If Stewart and his ilk want to "race down" to low-rent tracks, they should come as mentors and role models, forwarding the short fuses to Watkins Glen under separate cover. Kevin Ward's death was an unintended, but inevitable, consequence.

Yes, Ward, a kid, should have stayed in his car.

But Stewart, if he couldn't behave like an adult, should have stayed off the track.

Niagara Falls columnist Paula Thompson plaintively concluded that he "will have this incident hanging over his head and his heart for the rest of his life."

That's nowhere near long enough.

Best Qualified

With the recent news in Ferguson, Missouri, it has become quite obvious that some people should not be members of law enforcement. Being a member of any police or protection agency is an extremely tough and dangerous position to hold. They have to deal everyday with the worst element in society, the really bad people. It is a job that means any day you just may not see the sunset. Therefore, instead of hiring these individuals in order to fill certain quotas it is becoming more and more necessary to fill with the best qualified individuals available. That is not being done here, there or anywhere. Like I mentioned, a certain quota has to be maintained so that means hiring non-qualified personnel in order to meet the numbers. This is too important an occupation to fill for political reasons.

I had mentioned in this column before about my grandson. Not because he is related, it is just that is makes me aware of the situation. He went to college and took law enforcement. Nice kid and really low key. Maybe even too low key to become a policeman. We wondered how he would respond to a major accident and seeing a really horrible scene. Anyway, he was told he would almost never be a Buffalo policeman as they have quotas to fill. So he moved to Wilmington, North Carolina in hopes of landing a position there. Same story as here in Buffalo, have to meet certain quotas. Makes no difference that he did well on the exam, has a degree in law enforcement, and is physically the right size. He just does not fit the requirements. Now you and I have seen some Buffalo police people who have trouble getting out of the vehicle. They fit the bill? I have written about this before and do not want it to sound like nepotism but these are the facts. Recent news tells us we are not proceeding down the right path. Please regard law enforcement agents as someone who has to fill certain requirement, both physical and mental, regardless of quotas.

Here is another small

example of people who are given authority and abuse it. My wife was getting gas at Tops last week and fell returning from the attendant to the pump. Nasty fall and I feel not necessary due to a dangerously placed display. So she was hurting to say the least. Arm in a sling and leg bruises. The next day we planned a get together at Evangola State Park on the spur of the moment as some of our out of town children were here. So I went into the Evangola office and inquired as to any empty shelters. There was going to be quite a few of us and it would be an easy find as they are numbered. Turns out there was one open and even though it was a distance from the beach it would be nice. I asked if I could pull the car up to the shelter to let my ailing wife off. They said sure and one of the boys got in the back of our car and showed us where to go. I pulled up to the shelter, the park fellow got out and I helped her walk a little ways to sit and view the water.

Up pulls a park ranger. OK he is doing his job. Told me I was not allowed to pull my car up to the shelter. Told him I was given permission and wanted to

get close as my wife could not walk. I had the keys in my hand to move it when we had this confrontation. I explained I was told I was allowed to do that. Guess that is not what he wanted to hear as he started to go off on me. The people in the office had no right to tell me that. He works with the state troopers and what I did was a violation. In my view, he had no reason to strike the attitude he did. I did not in any way cause any friction. What it did was make me understand a little how someone given a little authority could find it necessary to flaunt that authority.

A badge is a very significant piece of equipment. Those who wear if should be the best available for that honor. We need to find a way to find it not only necessary but mandatory that only the best qualified are given this privilege. Again, both physically and mentally.

Preserve the Harvest



Fermentation is an ancient food preservation technique making a comeback.

The cucumbers have filled the vegetable drawer, you've run out of cabbage recipes and your family is refusing to eat one more BLT. Or maybe you just couldn't resist that special deal on a bushel of tomatoes, potatoes or apples at the farmer's market. So what is a gardener or shopper to do with all that produce? Since properly stored vegetables will hold their flavor and nutritional value longer than those left in a plastic bag or set on the sunny kitchen counter, consider preserving some for the long winter ahead using one of several methods.

Storage orchard racks and slatted crates placed in a cool dark location have long been used to store squash, onions and potatoes.

Drying is one of the oldest food preservation techniques. The goal is to quickly remove moisture without cooking the food. You can make your own dehydrator or purchase one.

Another ancient food preservation technique, fermentation, is experiencing a comeback. Fermenting cucumbers into pickles, cabbage into sauerkraut, and berries into preserves are just a few options.

Lock in the flavor and nutrition of your fruits and vegetables with freezing. You'll need airtight containers or bags that won't become brittle in cold temperatures.

Canning is a bit more involved, but can be lots of fun. This process preserves the food and keeps it safe by preventing the growth of undesirable bacteria, yeast and mold.

Whatever method you choose, do a bit of research before you start. You'll have greater success and a lot more fun.




