Riverside Park The Farmers Market was started through the office of North District Councilmember Joseph Golombek Jr. His office started this venture several years ago with some success. Councilmember Golombek decided that a way to improve on the market was to enlist the help of the Black Rock Riverside Neighborhood Housing Services and this year, they have taken it a step further.

This year, the Farmers Market had a kid's day, along with several craft days in order to spice up the market's atmosphere.

No one owns the market. It is a joint venture between the Black Rock Riverside Neighborhood Housing Services and the Councilmember Golombek's office. This is an event that Joe has continued because of the demand of the neighborhood. The Farmers Market has fresh produce and fruits which are all locally grown. Castle Farms, from Brandt, NY specializes in goat cheese and fudge, all of which are made organically at his farm. JJ Jams is one of the new vendors who provide homemade jams and jellies along with Fetch IT who provides organic dog treats.

The Farmers Market also has a few craft vendors as well. The market is trying to bring different items each week to the public. The market is trying to help bring a alternative type market to an area that we feel is underserved. This Market is run by volunteers each Sunday. They feel the market is a catalyst to start to revitalize the potential of Tonawanda Street. Along with stopping to support their vendors, they want people to provide insight as to what they would like to see happen on Tonawanda Street.

With so much happening in the area of Hertel, Delaware, Grant and Amherst Streets, the Farmers Market organizers feel that Riverside will be the next neighborhood with the distinction of up and coming. They believe that this market will be one of the catalysts that make that happen by drawing in people from the surrounding neighborhoods. The agencies feel that together, with everyone working towards the same goal, they can make this happen.

Twice Upon A Time...




Twins Elly and Emy Perez participated in the Twin Festival in Twinsburg, OH.

'Enchanted April'

Two desperate housewives of the Boring 20s realize fantasies in "Enchanted April," one of the finest shows Rocket Man has beheld in 51 years at the Shaw Festival. He can think of only two equals.

Dotty Lotty and Frozen Rose "meet cute" over a classified ad offering respite in an Italian villa. With a "mind like a hummingbird," Lotty persuades Rose to jointly fly the coop. They could hardly be less compatible, with husbands to match. Or not. Lotty would "make Pollyanna sick"; Only Rose could justify this note darkly jotted: "'I'm happy,' she snarled."

Logistics require recruiting lodgers, failed flapper Lady Bramble and the stuffy Mrs. Graves, next to whom Queen Victoria seems like Amy Winehouse. Dotty's husband is of the sort who declares that if she's late, "It reflects poorly on me." Rose's flitty and litty spouse has an identity crisis. Landlord Antony, who puts the dash in dashing, counterpoints inexhaustible housekeeper Costanza.

It's 1922. The World War has just ended, badly for many. Women do not holiday without their husbands, even during the late-winter gloom. While disdained by some as dreary, the first act crackles with wit, fright and conflict, concluding with a silhouetted train ride worthy of Hitchcock.

First prominent as a movie based on Elizabeth von Arnim's period novel (it played forever at the North Park), "Enchanted April" has never seemed so lively and lovely. Director Jackie Maxwell dictates perfect pacing and spacing for a breathtaking ensemble: Moya O'Connell and Tara Rosing as Lotty and Rose, Jeff Meadows and Patrick Galligan as their astonished husbands, vivid Marla McLean as "Commando Caroline" Bramble, Donna Belleville as the delightfully insufferable Mrs. Graves, Kevin McGarry as the landlord and non-stop Sharry Flett as the pastapushing maid.

Whirling into William Schmuck's set, glorious with just a hint of the shopworn, nearly stops the show, but the ovation really belongs to this awesome octet of thespians, pulsating prose in eightpart harmony. It runs through October's bargain matinees shorter lines at the bridge.

Slow down. Speed limits in school zones are reduced for a reason. A pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling at 25 mph is nearly two-thirds less likely to be killed compared to a pedestrian struck by a vehicle traveling 35 mph. Come to a complete stop. Watch for bicycles. Children on bikes are often in-




