'Buffalo Rises'

In "Buffalo Rises," Road Less Traveled Theatre serves up an eight-slice pizza, each with a different ingredient, each from a different shop.

You might not love everv bite, but vou sure come away satisfied, as did Rocket Man and First Mate, after the appetizer of a long line at the box office window in the Market Arcade.

RLT has a footnote in our theatrical history, the last troupe to produce a play at the "old" Studio Arena. It will produce the next one, too, "Clybourne Park" around Halloween. But for now it has "Buffalo Rises," eight ten-minute plays seasoned with distinctive Buffalo themes by eight variously-credentialed playwrights from our area.

It is no discredit to the authors and the actors to say that director Scott Behrend's presentation is as profound as the plays. Images delight the eye during and between playlets with quite a few vintage postcards from the days collectors cherish as the "linen" era. Rocket Man could almost feel the grooves.

A generous program insert describes each era, its date and Buffalo's population at the time. Not even the Shaw Festival, with its abundant resources, mixes better backstory. It's as if the bakers had attached their recipes to the box.

While the selection and order of the plays seems almost random, it does start with the oldest, Gary Earl Ross' "The Man Who Saved the President, Almost," about a black waiter who wrestled down McKinley assassin Leon Czoglosz, then was himself almost instantly erased from the history books.

"This city changes things" he intones in one of four fine portrayals by Willie Judson.

Later, a youngster (the fetching and well-prepared Malik Springs) who might be today's mayor shows up at the 1967 East Side riots in Ibn Shabazz' "Mad Dogs." Media manipulation has another moment in the spotlight. Amen from Rocket Man, a night city editor at the time.

Whimsy rules Justin Karcher's "On the Eastern

Shore of Lake Erie" and Jon Elston's "Bride of Buffalo Movie." In "Shores," folk-singer Greg Howze stonily wallows through cringe-worthy lyrics with an hysterical succession of body angles. "Movie" has Bonnie Lee Taylor and David Mitchell offering off-the-wall contrasting concepts while liberally dropping the names of local stage icons. Plenty fun, but not ready for prime.

Darleen **Pickering** Hummert brings a worldweary but vigorous outlook to old-world nanas in Caitlin McAneney's "Good Neighbors" and Darryl Schneider's "Steps," both confronting ethnic shifts seriously, but with good humor. She could scold Rocket Man anytime.

Jonathan Shuey maintains a fine pace as a jogger contemplating "The Fountain at Gates Circle" by Matthew Crehan Higgins. "Rises" curtain falls with Donna Hoke's "Spirit of Buffalo," Taylor and Shuey marooned in a bumper car while Nancy Parisi's snowfall swirls with chilling realism.

It was a relief to find merely rainfall after a smorgasbord that came close to offering something for every taste. EIGHT ROCKETS (out of 10) through Oct. 6.



Work Ethics

Some people work TO receive a paycheck. Other people work AND receive a paycheck. One little word difference, but it is big in meaning. The first group does what needs to be done. The second group seems to enjoy what they are doing, and being paid to do it is an extra. I would bet that wherever you work or worked you can select which group each person fits into. There are those who have no work ethics to speak of. They show up, put in the time that is necessary and complain about how they are worth more money than they are paid. There are those who enjoy what they are doing and have no problem going to work, working hard at what they do, even working extra and are hap-

py doing it.

I speak through experience as I have hired literally hundreds of employees over the last 44 years. Needless to say, I have seen both and need both. Unfortunately the first group is taking over the work place but through no fault of their own. Back in the day it was a good days work for a good days pay. That was back when it was hard to find a job, any job. Employees are able to be more selective now. Most have college degrees as it is almost a must. College is expensive so the pay scale needs to be in line with the education. That only makes sense and this has become acceptable.

One of the things that I find to be contributing to the decline in work ethics is

the unemployment policy. To continue to pay people to sit home and do nothing all day encourages the lack of incentive. Unemployment insurance is a necessity. To suddenly have no income is tragic, and if you have a family, a lay off is devastating. Been there, done that and with a family. However, in those days you had to wait two weeks before you received your first check. Before that happened I always managed to go door to door until I found a job. So I actually never did receive an unemployment check. Besides waiting two weeks for a check, you had to report to the unemployment office every week and prove that you applied for work. Signed slips from at least three places you tried to find work. No slips no check.

Many applicants for work are still collecting \$400 a week in unemployment checks even though the 99 week period is over. One fellow said his 99 weeks was over and they just extended his benefits indefi-

nitely. Why would anyone want to work if they are paid not to? These people belong with the first group at the beginning of this column. Members of the second group would go out and find a job, or at least spend the day looking.

Let's take another group of workers, like teachers. That profession has also changed drastically since I went to school. I recall having to stay "after school" as punishment for antics during the day. I had to stay until five, but so did the teachers. Teachers were overworked and underpaid back then. Compared to that time, it seems just the opposite. There is no lack of teachers as it is a good profession and a rewarding career. Rewarding to those who are members of the second group. Like any other profession we mention, there are those who are outstanding and those who are "also runs". Statistics show us the results of the teaching profession. It tells who is doing well and who is not doing their job.

Like the case workers responsible for allowing that five year old boy to be beaten to death. Members of my first group's work ethics eventually surface, sometimes tragically.

Just heard where a Buffalo teacher took a failing, inter-city eighth grade class and brought their math grades higher than those at City Honors. He inspired those children he was teaching to learn. That is what we base our opinions on, statistics. The bottom line. He is a perfect example of the second group. Which group are you in?

Coaches Speak Volumes For Shoshone!

It was a victory celebration for all the winning teams in the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League season this past Friday evening. Boys and girls have been celebrating for weeks now after winning championships on the diamonds of Shoshone Park for 2013. The one thing left to do was pick up the beautiful trophies that were awarded to each player for a spot on the bedroom dresser or a fireplace mantle.

That's exactly what they did this past weekend, amongst all the talk, the memories rekindled from an excellent year of baseball and softball in North Buffalo. But, there were some moments when a winning coach got up to the microphone and just spilled out a feeling they kept bottled up inside of them all season. That was magical, because in the era of this new social media, nothing beats face to face contact and the lives that are connected through Hertel North Park. Let me explain.

We've written in the past of a young coach for two teams this season, Trey Gardner, who guided the Rookie Pony Rebels to a championship this season as well as the Minor Pony Yankees. A product of North Buffalobaseball himself. first in the old Delaware Hertel League and then in Shoshone Park, Trey introduced us to all the girls on both teams and handed out trophies with Joan Cavanaugh. She, herself, also a former player in North Buffalo sports, the pair worked together to lead the Yankees. Before the

Yankees gave the over 200 people on hand a special cheer of their victory, Gardner had a special gift to present to a young woman who was the previous Coach for the Team, Rachel Lucas. A special plaque was created and she was on hand for the presentation, unbeknownst to everyone in the room. A fine tribute to a special woman who had to step away from the from the diamonds this year but made the Yankee championship victory even sweeter.

The Champions of the Rookie Boys Division New Haven Yankees soon followed the girls, along with their coach Aaron Conners. They didn't lose a game all year, winning 16 straight during the regular season and five more in playoffs. They scored more than 200 runs this year over that span and would of made the Steinbrenner Yankees in MLB proud in fulfilling their mantra.

Conners was expressive in thanking his assistant coaches, but more importantly, showed gratitude towards the parents of the 13 boys he got to coach this season. They met a tough Dayton team in the semifinals before facing the Las Vegas Dodgers in the Championship.

Next up on the ladder of baseball for the boys is the Second Minor Division and their Champions, the Dallas Tigers. They defeated the Sacramento Cardinals in the third and final game of their best of three game series, after the Cardinals won game two, 10-9, in a nine inning affair that lasted long after the sun went down and

had to be moved to a diamond with light towers. By the time the two teams returned to the Park two nights later, a 2-0 final was all the Tigers needed to make their season "roar!"

Tigers coach Carrie Cline thanked her assistants, husband Greg as well as Stacie Moon and Bobby Mecklenburg and introduced her players. Then she had a special award for her young daughter, Stella, still too young to play in the league, but very much a part of the victory celebration. The players are Conor Barnum, Israel Blodgett, Gavin Cline, Justice DaCosta, Aiden Dobo, DeKari Jackson, Solomon Jackson II, Christopher Johnson, Jadin Mecklenburg, Owen Rooney and Damien Smith. Carrie Cline was just one of four women coaching boys teams in North Buffalo this season.

Senior Pony Athletics coach Reno Masecchia introduced his Championship girls team soon after. He paid tribute to two of his girls, Kelsay McCarthy and Jessica Carey for their leadership as both have played their last season in the Park. Both girls play high school softball as well and for McCarthy, this team was more fulfilling for her than her Blue Devil season last year. "I'll miss it," she said afterward. "It feels good to go out as a champion. I've enjoyed playing in Shoshone."
