

USPS Military Mailing Deadlines Approaching

Every November 11th, Veterans Day, Americans are encouraged to show gratitude for our nation's veterans. For many men and women currently serving in the military and stationed away from home, remembrance through a holiday card or package is especially appreciated. With military mailing deadlines quickly approaching, the U.S. Postal Service reminds mailers to be aware of the following guidelines to ensure timely delivery of holiday wishes by December 25th.

PMEMS is available to selected military. Check with your local Post Office to determine if this service is available to an APO/FPO/ DPO address.

PAL is a service that provides air transportation for parcels on a space-available basis. It is available for Standard Post items

not exceeding 30 pounds in weight or 60 inches in length and girth combined. The applicable PAL fee must be paid in addition to the regular surface price for each addressed piece sent by PAL service.

SAM parcels are paid at Standard Post prices with maximum weight and size limits of 15 pounds and 60 inches in length and girth combined. SAM parcels are first transported domestically by surface and then to overseas destinations by air on a space-available basis. Customers can get additional information about military mailing options, restrictions, customs forms and APO/FPO mailing discounts at usps.com.

The Postal Service does not receive tax dollars for operating expenses; it relies entirely on the sale of postage, products and services to fund its operations.





"A Christmas Carol"

So is this "Christmas Carol" or "Family Feud?" So many relatives are involved in the Dickens classic in Kenmore's Advent Church that Rocket Man can't sort 'em out.

Mr. and Mrs. Fezziwig are married in real life. Scrooge's daughter plays Mrs. Cratchit and she, in turn, has a daughter in the cast, a third generation. Fully a third of the 30 "Carolers" share some sort of DNA.

So can that many relatives produce a decent show? What, you never heard of the Von Trapp family? In fact, the producers are so family-friendly that they've got a family ticket, \$25 for any number, no ID required.

Full disclosure: Rocket Man has a meteorite-sized

role, as Old Joe (the scavenger who buys the dead Scrooge's bedclothes), and, briefly, as the playwright himself, with a tip of the topper to Mike Randall.

"Carol" comes courtesy of Raiders of Niagara, literary troupe headed by Niagara Community College instructor Randy Rumley. Christine Coniglio, hardworking Tonawanda housewife with a keen eye for design, shares the mantel of directorship. Last year they worked together on a "Kill a Mockingbird," so popular with a diverse audience that on closing day it was practically kneelingroom-only.

Kenmore resident Bob Lonski, who so gripping portrayed attorney Atticus Finch in "Mockingbird," essays the challenge of Ebenezer Scrooge. Lonski's quest: that the boyish Scrooge show through in the quintessential skinflint. "Can you see the child, can you see the child?" he will ask colleagues during long and difficult rehearsals.

Actually, they're everywhere. Not even "Annie" or "Oliver" would feature so many youngsters as this, including Ethan Coniglio and Tyler Lucia as younger and happier Ebenezers,

and one Nora Kiel as Tiny Tim. Do not adjust your screen, the Tim role is often filled by a female, and Kiel is especially effective, so frail-looking at rehearsals that other actors give her a wide berth, lest they knock her down.

In a complete change of character, the wide-ranging Mike Leszczynski, "Mockingbird's" perjuring redneck, plays the beleaguered Bob Cratchit, opposite Lonski's daughter Jessica Miller as Mrs. Cratchit. And her own Gracie Miller, Lonski's grand-daughter, plays the mystical waif called "Want."

The jolly old counting-house Fezziwigs from Scrooge's past are played by Angie and Mark Fulk, she one of the town gossips from "bird," he making his Raiders debut. Marley is played by Tom Turici, whose ear-curdling wails threaten to alarm the firemen at the nearby Kenmore hall. Ghosts include Ron Mangum, last year's "bird" victim, and Tom Fratterigo as a jolly old Christmas Present with just a sprig of

"Carol" opens Friday at 7:30 and runs through Nov. 23, Fridays and Saturdays at 7:30, Sundays at 2 in the church at 54 Delaware Rd., Kenmore, with prices \$9-12 plus the celebrated family rate. Long before rehearsals began, this familial flock knew how hush the humbugs.

A Family Get-Together

A family get-together is always fun and a good way of reminiscing about past happenings. Not always "The Good Old Days", but incidents that occurred when my children were growing up. Some things one might recall vividly while the memory is a little hazy to the others. Keep in mind that the incidents I refer to happened in the sixties on the West Side of Buffalo. Not necessarily the best atmosphere to raise eight children, but a lot of it was good. The neighborhood ethnic scene was changing slowly. Ethnic gangs began to form much like the ones in the movie "West Side Story". It was fortunate that unlike the movie, there was only one and there were no gang wars. Still, their presence was felt and very visible. I will recount three different incidents I personally had with these "gangs". It would take up too much valuable space in the Rocket to go into all three in one week so I will break it into three separate stories. This is the first and the mildest.

In the neighborhood we lived in on 15th street, the main attraction for the kids in the summer was the Massachusetts Avenue swimming pool, located right around the corner, and within walking distance. After chores, our children would spend the day at the pool and the playground behind it. There were always lifeguards present and our older children would watch the younger siblings. Childhood relations formed with other neighborhood children who were also there on a daily basis. Most of it was good. The one problem was that it was also the stomping grounds of one of the neighborhood's toughest gangs, Beta.

These were mostly young men of one ethnic

group and mostly did not bother anyone who did not cross them. If one did, they simply beat him up. No guns or knives, just fists. Just want to add that the beating were mostly to instill fear and were not brutal if I recall correctly. I would assume they felt they needed to do this to have control of the area. The Massachusetts Avenue Pool and playground was their territory to rule. Everyone was aware of their presence and avoided any contact that was not necessary. I am not sure if they ever actually went into the pool, just hung out, smoking and trying to look tough. It was best to just try to ignore them and let them be. That is, unless they cross the line.

In the first of the three incidents, and like I stated the mildest, my eldest son was recalling the day I confronted these tough guys. Since I had a couple of good looking teenage daughters who frequented this pool, something like this was bound to happen. One night at the supper table one of my sons related to me something said at the pool. It was an inappropriate remark made

by one of these gang members to one of my daughters. Now, what would any red blooded American father do in this case? So that night I calmly walked over to the pool and went directly to the gang leader. My son, who was recalling the incident, thought I was dead. Here I was in the middle of a gang of thugs demanding an apology for the inappropriate remark made toward my daughter. Now normally at this point we would say tune in next week to see what happened. No, I will tell you what happened as I have other stories to tell.

The ring leader went face to face with me and said "you want what"? I did not wet myself and remained composed and asked again for an apology. Then he asked which one did it. The perpetrator was pointed out and told to apologize, which he did. From that moment on we became friends and my family was now under the protection of the Beta gang at the Massachusetts Avenue swimming pool.

The second incident, which is much more intense, also has this gang involved. Only this time we were somewhat on the same side. As a hint it was to do with one of the riots that occurred during the sixties, right in our neighborhood...stay tuned.

West Side & Black Rock-Riverside Neighborhood Housing Services

Home Repair Grants Available to West Side and Black Rock-Riverside Homeowners

Through the generosity of the NYS Affordable Housing Corporation (AHC) and NYS Housing Trust Fund Corporation (HTFC), West Side Neighborhood Housing Services (NHS), Inc. has rolled out two new home repair programs to assist low-income owner-occupants in Buffalo's upper West Side and Black Rock-Riverside neighborhoods.

West Side Owner-Occupied Home Repair Program applications are available today and funding is limited. West Side & Black Rock-Riverside NHS will assist owners of 1-2 family dwellings in zip codes 14207 & 14213 by providing a conditional grant to cover up to 60% of their home repair costs, up to \$30,000. The grant is not repaid if the applicant owns and occupies the property for the next 10 years and meets other qualification quidelines. The remaining portion of the repair work must be funded through another source, which can include owner's savings, private loans or through West Side NHS, Inc.'s NeighborWorks® America revolving loan fund.

Applications for the Residential Emergency Services to Offer Repairs to the Elderly (RESTORE) Program will be available as of Monday, November 10th. Through the RESTORE Program, West Side & Black Rock-Riverside NHS will provide a 3-year, deferred and forgivable loan of up to \$5,000 to seniors, age 60 and up, in zip codes 14207 & 14213, to fund emergency repairs such as furnace and hot water tank repair or replacement, roof repair, plumbing and electrical repairs, and other structural repairs that threaten the health and safety of the senior-occupied dwelling. The loan does not require repayment if the applicant owns and occupies the property for 3 years following completion of the project and meets other qualification guidelines.

Applications for both programs will be available at West Side NHS, Inc., 359 Connecticut Street, Buffalo, NY 14213, and Black Rock-Riverside NHS, Inc., 203 Military Road, Buffalo, NY 14207, or by mail, fax or email. Please call 716.877.3910 to inquire about income or other eligibility requirements.





My First Day in Viet Nam

When I first arrived in Cam Ranh Bay, Viet Nam, it was hot, sticky and scary. My fatigues were stiff and scratchy. Forget about the fit, I had to take three steps to get to the front of my pants! You looked like a rookie, felt like a rookie, and frightened like a rookie.

The troops coming in and going out were all put together in the same pot, talk about a bad idea. Here we are in our new pressed clothes and shiny boots, the hardened war vets had worn muddy boots, rumpled faded fatigues, beard stubble and worst of all, combat experience. I was in awe.

They loved taking us through their knowledge of war. "You!" As he pointed and said "A machine gunner in a combat situation, you have one point two seconds to live, Radio man 0 seconds." (I want to go home).

Here we were on this large beach, going in and out of huge tan tents. Being directed by combat vets to petrify us. They were enjoying every minute of



it. I left after I saw several of the kids I came in country with turn white, no matter what race they originally were.

They gave us a duffle bag, clothes, mess kit, God knows what else, and it was as big as me and weighed as much. The truck that picked us up was large as any I'd ever seen. At home I had a sports car that I had to crawl down into. This truck bed was over my head and with the tailgate shut, forget it. Trying just to get the duffle bag in was beyond my ability. Three tries and finally a trooper felt sorry for me and grabbed my bag and pulled me up. I was embarrassed, but I got over it. I gave the trooper sitting in front who didn't lift a finger to help me a real dirty look. He told me later it didn't bother him a bit.

Two days passed when I

finally arrived at the First Cavalry. It was a cold rainy night, muddy and gray. Sandbags piled up everywhere. The smell of mold, wet damp and dreary. I kept tripping over my rifle and dragging my duffle bag. Guard towers, troops coming and going. It was like a war movie. I always hated war movies!

"Hey!" yelled one of the troopers, "We have a cook. He's Marty's replacement. Well look at you, you don't look like much." I sure didn't feel like much either. Oh, did I forget to mention, I was a 94 B 20. A cook. Somebody has to cook!




My mother did not prepare me for this!




