Paper Chases

Local journalistic sands shifted twice in recent days. Tonawanda's News announced that it would cease publication Jan. 31. Buffalo's free weekly Artvoice split like an amoeba, key personnel leaving to form another newspaper called The Public. Rocket Man could not find hide nor hair of it on the internet.

Rocket Man has worked for 13 newspapers since 1948. With unprinted information moving to prominence, just five survive in their original form – the Jamestown Post-Journal, Buffalo News (Evening in his day), Niagara Gazette, Grand Island Dispatch and the Buffalo Rocket. Others have merged, shrunk or vanished altogether - the Courier, the Jamestown Sun, Grand Island Reporter and now, the Tonawanda News.

One of Pulitzer winner Tom Toles' most touching cartoons showed a line of

newspapers marching off to eternity, Courier bringing up the rear. The GI Reporter ran a similar cartoon of local businesses striding to their demise - not including that newspaper, which folded that very day.

To traditionalist Rocket Man, the Artvoice cat fight is amazing and amusing. Many defectors pack much punch in their world – film critic M. Faust, political analyst Bruce Fisher and indoctrinator-in-chief Michael Niman, who never saw a national flaw he couldn't blame on Bush or Reagan.

Devil his due: His terrific probe exposed an Iraq war rescue that had "fraud" written all over it in language even Rocket Man could translate.

Only a drone on the wall knows what really happened at Artvoice. Newspapers, while ranting about government transparency, are as opaque as asphalt and with skins as thin as their pages. After enumerating pros and cons of the Buffalo News, Rocket Man was threatened by a columnist there, and banished from its pages. That long has passed and most of us are on good terms. Same with Artvoice.

But Artvoice does seem slimmer lately, and reports of red ink persist. In a one-daily town, we need a 'voice, not an echo.

The Tonawanda News actually revived Rocket Man's sportswriting career, and while its closure will little affect his bottom line, it is sad and, perhaps, avoidable. Feisty columnist Barbara Tucker, practically part of the woodwork, compared it fairly to the Diocese's unconscionable closing of the city's St. Francis School.

Circulation had fallen below 4,000, this for a paper that once sponsored its own baseball league - not team, LEAGUE!

Rocket Man suspects some attrition may reflect the paper's inclination toward editors of the political left. One, long gone, bashed a Bush for requiring a police escort at Kleinhans. Another demanded that Rocket Man read an anti-Fox website before reviewing Bill O'Reilly's "Killing Lincoln."

These leanings were not reflected in news coverage. Incumbent Eric DuVall proudly displays indignities heaped on him by one Democrat candidate. Still, Rocket Man suspects traditionalist Tonawandans said "enough," one at a time, until the noble paper slipped below sustainability.

Not good times. Heal, Artvoice; R.I.P. Tonawanda News; Go, Rocket!

Chapter Two: West Side Gangs

As promised in last week's column I will proceed to go into chapter two of my encounters with the gangs that existed on the West Side of Buffalo back in the late sixties. Just in case you missed last week's endeavor I will rehash the highlights. It had to do with an inappropriate remark made by one of the gang members to one of my daughters. After talking to my siblings it turns out it was not my daughter but my wife. In any case I quickly confronted the gang leader and he was kind enough to insist on an apology from the perpetrator. The Incident was settled peacefully and at that point the Beta gang and my family continued on to co-existed at the Massachusetts swimming pool and playground. Which happened to be the Beta gangs stomping grounds.

One fine day in the middle of that summer, this same Beta gang decided to hold an outdoor concert right there at the Massachusetts playground. Or at least in front of it. They somehow solicited a band and set up quite an elaborate stage and sound system. It was in the parking lot, so if someone chose to dance they could do so. Seemed like a great idea and something for the kids to do in the outdoors and mingle with other neighbors. Now remember, this was in the late afternoon and with plenty of daylight, so no lighting system needed to be procured. Everything went fine and I was there enjoying the afternoon with my children. I thought much more of the "gang" for doing something like this.

Like I said, everything was going really well until someone complained and called the police. The complaint was that they

were making too much noise. Granted, the music was not quite the golden oldies and was meant to be played "loud". Still it could be tolerated as it was still during the day. So a patrol car appeared and told the leader of the gang to turn the music down. Remember that this was a neighborhood gang and even though this event was allowed they have had other confrontations with the police. They did turn it down at first but the effect of the music was not as stimulating, I guess. So they turned the sound back up. This did not sit well with the officers who had answered the call. To simplify this I will just say the officer pulled the plug. The gang leader put it back in. Thus a serious confrontation as the crowd in attendance were not in favor of the officer's actions. It became ugly and uglier until the officers called for back up. In those days in the sixties, some may recall, riots were happening all over the country. So "back up" showed up in force. Riot gear, paddy wagons, night sticks, black jacks, (which are now illegal) and a small army. No questions asked, if you were the least bit defiant, you were arrested on the spot.

Fortunately I was able to get my family out of there before the bottles and rocks started flying. When we got home I realized my eldest son was missing. My daughter said they grabbed him just for being there and she thought he was in one of the paddy wagons. So I returned to the battlefront, which now existed of the police at one end of Shields Street and the angry crowd at the other. A one block long street. The space between them was littered with rocks and

bottles. The police were trying to disperse the crowd which had become extremely unruly. I just wanted to find my son. So at the risk of being arrested myself, I began to look into each and every one of the paddy wagons on the scene. Each contained some pretty beat up kids and plenty of blood. My neighbors told me my son did nothing but being in the wrong place at the wrong time. They feared for me and thought I would end up the same way if I did not go inside. This was one really ugly

place to be for such a normally quiet residential neighborhood.

I finally went to the police station and my son was there. The officers were kind enough to let him go with my without any charges. The only damage was a welt from a black jack and a goop of his Afro hairdo was missing as it came out in a big chunk when he was grabbed by the hair. We were happy with that as it could have been much

Strange how this all transpired as what start-

ed to be a good thing, turned into a complete disaster. Looking back in retrospect, both sides over reacted. The responding officers could have been a little more tolerant and understanding. It was a bad time for law enforcement agencies. Back then in the days of the riots they were called "pigs". Seems that moniker has passed and that is good. Now they have to watch who has a video camera.






