Final Notification Issued for Electronic Waste Disposal

A final notification to city residents has been issued in advance of the city issuing tickets to households that illegally dispose of electronic waste (e-waste) at the curb. As per New York State regulations, the City of Buffalo is no longer able to collect unwanted electronic waste discarded by individuals at the curb. (It's prohibited for city residents to dispose of e-waste at the curb and



it's prohibited for landfills to accept them). Those who do not comply and continue to put electronics out at the curb face fines up to \$105, as per a recent city ordinance amendment passed by the City Council. This action follows a long grace period in Buffalo in which the City of Buffalo Department of Sanitation tagged households with notices, advising suspected violators of the law.

HEAP is a federally funded program that assists eligible low-income New Yorkers with the cost of heating their homes. outreach need to bring the following documentation: Proof of gross income received within the last 30 days for all household members; proof of all household resources; current shutoff or disconnect notices, if applicable; and one form of ID for all household members (birth certificate, license, Social Security card).

Skaneateles Revisited

It is with great reservation that Rocket Man revisits a destination. All too often he and the First Mate encounter disappointment, that the thrill was not what it was upon the first landing, when the adrenaline of discovery heightened senses.

But that was not the case last weekend at Planet Skaneateles, a touchdown without a letdown. It does, as Dickens concludes in "Carol," keep Christmas as well as any other good old city in the good old world.

As Hertel and North Buffalo entrepreneurs carry on for the holiday this weekend, housebound Rocket Man (some interplanetary virus) fervently hopes they can convey the joy – and, dare we say it, drum up the business - of the Dickens celebration in Skaneateles, a community of some 12,000 souls perched atop the lake of the same name about 20 miles this side of Syracuse.

It was 21 years ago, by all accounts, that the Skaneateles citizenry got together with a jolly old elf named James Greene of Dryden, about 30 miles to the south. A theatrician through and through, Greene and his wife, costumier extraordinaire Tracey, helped Skaneateles realize the vision of a season-long celebration of Charles Dickens, his time, and his words.

Some 40 performers of varying ages don the gay apparel of the time and walk the lean streets of Skaneateles, greeting citizens and visitors. Not only does Scrooge humbug passers-by, but in their own way so do such Americans of the period -1842 – as then President John Tyler and frontiersman Davey Crockett. It's a world of 170 years ago, condensed into one 12block snowglobe. Picture Skaneateles as East Aurora, only with narrower streets.

The most intense concentration of history unfolds between noon and 4 and at three times during that span, a few of the higher-profile characters gather for a "trunk show" on the lawn of the Masonic Temple. There, actor-producer Greene depicts a struggling Dickens seeking just the right words and characters for a "Christmas Carol," seen as a work in progress.

Spontaneous, interactive theater abounds, sort of a "Whose Carol Is It, Anyway?" As Rocket Man had just committed to memory most of "Carol's" first stave, Greene actually permitted him to recite it, but the real fun comes from conscripts who will blurt out to Scrooge, as did a charming lass drafted as nephew Fred, "I want to come over and have you cook me dinner."

It's a big part of Skanny's Dickens Christmas, but by no means all, and the spirit invested the entire community. In four hours of scrapping for space and the Skaneateles Bakery's before-your-veryeyes doughnuts, Rocket Man heard not one single word that was not of good cheer. It runs through December 21st with an abbreviated version December 24th.

In two visits, Rocket Man has never seen anything like it. God bless 'em, every one.

Lump of Coal

There was a comment on Facebook about a new Christmas song. It was being introduced on one of Jimmy Kimmel's late shows and is being considered another Christmas classic. Do not know if it will accomplish that status, but it did have some meaning. It is about Joel the lump of coal and the child that received it. Kind of a jumpy tune, and as I understand it, any proceeds made from the recording will go to a specified charity.

You would wonder why a song would be written about a lump of coal. Most of the young people today do not even know what a lump of coal is. And what connection it has to Christmas. You would have to be well over 55 years old to understand. In my youth, if you were bad prior to Christmas, you were told all you would get in your stocking is a lump of useless coal. No presents or gifts, just this dirty lump of coal. Back in those days coal was what kept most people warm in the winter. There was no natural gas or electric heat so every home had a large amount of coal in their basements. You ordered it by the ton and it was delivered by the ton to your home by the "coal man".

Most basements had a designated coal bin that would probably hold up to three tons of coal. This was usually located in the front of the 'cellar" where the "coal man" could run his cart right into the coal bin. The coal furnace would also be located centrally in the front of the "cellar" close to the coal bin. The coal furnace would need constant attention as coal had to be added regularly to keep the fire going. Special care had to be taken when you went to bed to make sure the fire stayed lit overnight. There was no

television so that meant getting up off a warm chair after listening to the nightly radio show, rip off the blanket you were sitting under, and trot down to the "cellar". Open the furnace door and shovel three or four solid shovels of this pure black coal into the fire. Inhale a little of the black coal dust, set the damper and go up to bed. Take a hanky and blow the coal dust out of your system. What came out was black.

It is hard to image having to do all that just to stay warm overnight. Now we just adjust the thermostat to the reading we desire and go to bed nice and cozy. I tell you this to relate to a lump of coal in your stocking. That was the ultimate disgrace to think of getting up on Christmas morning only to find a lump of dirty coal as your present. I do not know of that ever actually happening. I heard the threats many times and most were directed at me. With all that coal promised me I could have heated all of Buffalo for a week.

Getting back to the song, "Joel the lump of coal", I do not believe it will be a classic, but what do I know? The song does start with the kid being bad and receiving a lump of coal for Christmas. The song proceeds to go on with the young boy becoming good friends with his new found possession. Kind of corny and most of today's kids, like I said, do not have a clue what a lump of coal is. Probably have never even seen one. As kids we shoveled it, washed the dust off us from the furnace, cleaned the ashes it left and considered it the everyday way of life. Like the milk man, the rag man, the popcorn man, the fresh vegetable man, the coal man is long gone. Hey, we still have the mail man, for now.


Saturday, December 6th is the next 'First Saturday of the Month'. The City of Buffalo Engineering Garage will be open for city residents to properly dispose of their e-waste between the hours of 8 am and 2 pm.

When thrown out with the garbage, household computers and electronics, which often contain hazardous substances. such as lead, mercury, and PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls), can contaminate

our air, soil and water. Through proper disposal methods or recycling, these hazardous substances are reprocessed and reused in an environmentally-responsible manner.

Items accepted include: computer systems (CPU's, monitors, mice, keyboards, printers and scanners), cell phones, fax machines, wires, televisions, video games, VCRs, DVD players, small appliances, microwave ovens, fluorescent bulbs and rechargeable batteries.

Unaccepted items include: construction debris, devices with liquid mercury, dry/wet cell batteries, hazardous waste/pesticides, yard equipment, gas powered equipment, or radioactive materials.
