Spring Forward, Fall Back

Many people use the term "spring forward" and "fall back" when they refer to the daylight saving start and end dates. This is mainly due to the fact that DST occurs in the spring season and ends in the

fall (or autumn) season in the northern hemisphere.

The term "to spring forward" refers

when peo- this weekend. ple set the clocks one hour forward, marking the start of DST. It is a term that is easy to remember, this is because the DST start date coincides with the spring season. It is the time of the year when the days begin to have longer hours of sunlight after the winter's end, in addition DST, which brings forth an extra hour of daylight in the af-

The term "to fall back" suggests that one must set the clocks one hour back when DST ends. It is associated with the fall (autumn) season because the DST schedule ends in the

ternoons or evenings.

fall. The fall season and the end of daylight saving time mark a period when the days become darker, in that there are less hours of sunlight during the day, particularly in the afternoons or evenings, as winter soon

to Turn your clocks ahead "spring forward" and

"fall back" were mentioned in newspapers from as far back as the early part of the 20th century.

For example, the Heppner Gazette-Times (October 28, 1928) printed a notice, stating "Daylight Savings Time ends this Sunday, October 31. Remember to set your clocks back one hour, 'Spring forward – Fall Back!"".

The use of the words "spring forward" and "fall back" became increasingly popular over time and these terms are now used widely across the United States and Canada, as well as in the UK.

'Glorious'

Rocket Man and First Mate caught the closing notes of "Glorious" Sunday afternoon, courtesy of O'Connell & Company at Erie Community College. While now beyond the reach of groundlings, it leaves behind an ode to all Buffaloarea theater.

It depicts one Florence Foster Jenkins, real-life moneyed socialist who fancied herself a singer, hiring halls, even Carnegie, for recitals. A new accompanist unclenches his teeth and wanes nostalgic.

"You remind me of my mother," he says.

"Oh, could she sing?" asks Mrs. Jenkins.

"No."

Rocket Man recalls the late Mayor Sedita, proud bathtub tenor, who one morning took it on himself to answer an open audition for the Philharmonic, Michael Tilson Thomas conducting. An awkward si-

lence followed the last full measure by Hizzoner, privy to the orchestra's pursestrings.

Sedita broke the tension: "What I think you want to say, Maestro," he said, "Is that for a Mayor, I ain't bad." Tilson Thomas, practical perfectionist, broke up laughing.

Foster Jenkins, he'd have impeached. A minor auto accident, she believes, has extended her range to Fsharp above High C. When she screeches it out, attending motorists fear for their windshields

Darryl Hart plays her charming and charmed pianist; Victoria Perez a whirlwind Spanish maid too caught up in her own linguistics to realize she's been fired; Roger VanDette the randy companion true to her in his fashion; Anne Gayley her ditsy co-conspirator and Kate Olena, high-fallutin' self-appointed de-

fender of the musical arts so convincing that she was resoundingly booed.

Add in Director Joyce Stilson's, audacious enough to select Glenn Miller's iconic "Moonlight Serenade" for a dance scene, and Pam Snyder's spectacular costumes, fancy even when plain, and you have an incomparable afternoon and if you missed you, Rocket Man apologizes.


Even in the hands and ample larynx of the gifted Mary Kate O'Connell, "Glorious" has the potential for a one-joke show. It's not. It honors "everyone who ever dreamed and never dared." There's no willful vanity in Flo-Jo's mojo, just an honest delusion that has a gift she is obligated to share.

The generous glow of "Glorious" represents the very essence of Buffaloarea theater, in which nobody makes a living, but everyone enhances ours. Mercifully for our ears, we number no Florence Foster Jenkins, showcasing an extraordinary talent level, as evidenced here. No one in "A Chorus Line" ever did it more for love than Buffalo's troupers. Glorious. Bless 'em all.





March 2, 2013




