The 18th annual Elmwood Kiwanis Fishing Derby was held Wednesday at Hoyt Lake in Delaware Park. Volunteers from National Grid and Price Waterhouse Cooper assisted with 100 campers from the Delaware YMCA for this year's event. Members of the U.S. Navy Sea Cadets were also on hand to assist with setup and helping the kids fish.

More than 3,250 volunteers from 145 organizations lent their time, talent and sweat equity to help local non-profit organizations during United Way's 2015 Day of Caring. Western New York's largest community service event, Day of Caring was held on Wednesday, August 19th. Volunteers spent the day working on 184 community service projects for 125 organizations, including painting, gardening, clean up, activities with children, chaperoning field trips, organizing donations, and much more.

The event kicked off at First Niagara Center with a volunteer breakfast and rally, followed by transportation to volunteer sites.

Each year the United Way Day of Caring provides much-needed volunteer-power to non-profit or-

Moving Day Raises Parkinson's Awareness

The 4th annual Moving Day walk and movement celebration, sponsored by the National Parkinson Foundation of Western New York, will be held on Sun-

day September 13th at Coca Cola Field. The event is called Moving Day because it is much more than just a walk. It truly is a celebration of movement, incorporat-

ing dance, Tai Chi, yoga, a drum circle and many more dimensions of motion and physical expression. The event also raises funds for the organization which help support the many support groups, exercise sessions, therapeutic programs and social gatherings that the organization provides for the growing Parkinson's community in Western New York.

Movement of almost any sort is a key component in the battle against Parkinson's Disease. Parkinson's is a degenerative neurological disease that can strike someone of most any age, though it is most common in people over the age of 60. The disease disrupts the signals that the brain sends to the body's muscles, thereby causing slow or uncontrollable movements, like an interrupted gait or shaking in the hands. The more a Parkinson's patient moves, the longer it takes for the disease to affect those muscles. Moving Day incorporates many different aspects of movement in

a celebration of keeping all of our bodies healthy and in motion.

Though the event is only in its fourth year, it is growing at a tremendous

> rate. "Last year we had more than 600 participants and raised better than \$70,000," Moving said Day Co-Chairperson Laurice Russell. "People in our area

who have a connection to Parkinson's are really dedicated to making life better for the Parkinson's community as a whole," she continued. According to president Vicky Glamuzina, this is the capstone of a year's worth of work. "This is our biggest fundraising event of the year, and it is the most important part of supporting all of our programs. The goal for this annual fundraising walk is \$80,000 this year. Everyone has such a great time. We're calling this year's walk a pre-game warm up for the Bills' game," said Glamuzina.

Parkinson's is a little understood disease that affects nearly 9,000 Western New Yorkers. When caregivers and family members are considered, tens of thousands of people in our region are affected by the disease. Parts of our area lead the nation in the prevalence of Parkinson's diagnoses. The reasons why it is so prominent here remain a matter of research, and there is no cure.

An open letter from Buffalo Teachers Federation **President Philip Rumore**

Kouch the fu

Setting the record straight after The Buffalo News misrepresents the facts in contract negotiations with the Buffalo School District

The Buffalo News refused to print this article

Again, The Buffalo News misrepresents the facts.

Under the current Board (Contract) proposal, some teachers would actually earn less salary after they pay for

The average base-salary increase for 2015-2018 is 3.5% minus the 20% teachers must pay for their benefits.

The Board's salary offer is an average of only nine-tenths of a percent (.9%) per year when you include the 11 years that Buffalo teachers have been without a new contract. They will now have to pay 20% of their health care benefits, amounting to approximately \$3,600 per year for some.

If that isn't bad enough, the Board further decreases its salary proposal by increasing the school year by 2.2%, plus the school day by 12.2% (a 14.4% total increase) — putting the Board's proposal below a 0% increase.

Also not mentioned by The Buffalo News:

- the 17% reduction of sick days (usually at least one of your 30 or 150 students has a cold);
- mandating seeing a doctor on the day you are ill;
- increasing prescription co-pays from \$5/\$10 to \$10/\$25/\$40;
- increasing teaching periods from five to six periods (a 20% increase); and
- the withdrawal of arbitrations and other BTF legal victories that would cost the district more than \$20 million.

As a further insult to Buffalo teachers, this Board's offer is \$16 million <u>less</u> than the Board's last offer.

A subsequent offer was withdrawn as a result of an improper practice charge filed by the BTF.

Yes, this — plus other detrimental proposals — is what the Board is demanding from Buffalo teachers, who work under some of the most difficult conditions and who are already \$20,000 — yes, \$20,000 behind their colleagues in surrounding and other city school districts.

Yet, The Buffalo News characterizes the district's offer "as the starting point for serious negotiations."

In an incredible statement, The Buffalo News first refers to "work rules that have prevented significant progress in improving educational outcomes."

Then, in the next sentence — The Buffalo News states, "some of those antiquated requirements are almost laughable, including a smoking room in each school, a vending machine for each school's staff use only, access to outside telephones and a requirement that notices be posted on a bulletin board!"

Besides the fact that, with our agreement, there have not been pay phones or smoking rooms in schools for years, that The Buffalo News makes a statement linking these obsolete items to educational outcomes

While Buffalo teachers have come to expect these distortions, we hope the public will also see through them. is bizarre.


Parkside Volunteers Take **Part in Community Cleanup**





Second Annual Corn Hole Tournament



Corn Hole boards are relatively inexpensive to purchase or easy to make yourself, and set up quickly.

Last week we participated in the 2nd annual Corn Tournament. those who are not familiar with the Corn Hole sport, it is a relatively new form of competition that can be played by almost anyone. The equipment is two corn hole boards which consist of a slanted board with a hole near the top (called the corn hole) and eight cloth bags filled with corn. Each side gets four bags. The object of the game is to get as many of your bags into the hole in the board. If you accomplish this you get 3 points. Any bag that ends up on the board counts as a point. As long as you competitor does not cancel either by matching your throw for points.

I first saw this in Ohio, which was my introduction to this new form of competition. Like any new game it takes time to adjust to the form used to either get it into the hole or at the least end up on the board. It is not that easy, at first. But like any other game with somewhat "physical skills", practice makes you better. I say this as I watched those who have their own boards do much better than those like me, who are first timers. It was nice to be invited to this new concept tournaments. There were 16 couples with four sets of boards set up in a beautiful back yard with a heated pool. I mentioned the pool as it was a hot afternoon and as you were

eliminated, the perk was a dip in the pool. The rules were double elimination so that you were not sent to the showers or pool in this case, too early. Each team had a nick name like "corn stars" "corn huskers", etc. some not printable.

In Florida we have a Bocce league, which is a bit more difficult, but again most people can play no matter the age. There you need to play on a bocce court. What is nice about this corn hole game is that it can easily be set up in any backyard in minutes. You can even buy a set of corn hole boards for less than \$100 or easily make your own. A tournament is a nice way to have a backyard party with a definitive purpose and still have fun. Like any competition there are those who are there to have a good time and those whose only purpose is to win and therefore take it too seriously. We actually won our first ever game, but when it got to the higher level players, got romped. I even watched one woman throw all four of her

bags in the hole. That did not happen too often and I was pleased just to be able to land and keep it on the board.

198 Scajaquada Expressway: Bad Buffalo History

Just a quick mention about the 198. It took a while but something had to be done about one of the worst decisions made in Buffalo history, building a high speed expressway through the middle of a park. We now realize it was an idiotic thing to do and those who did the planning must have had their heads up a certain part of their anatomy. have the one bridge that was built almost one hundred years ago. Wow are we forward thinking people or what?


