## **HEAP Process Begins** in Erie County

Erie County's Department of Social Services has begun accepting applications for Home Energy Assistance Program regular benefits with county officials anticipating receiving more than 20,000 HEAP applications by the end of December.

In an effort to expedite the application process and to prevent residents from standing in long lines, HEAP applicants are encouraged to apply for benefits online or attend one of the upcoming HEAP outreach events that will be held for residents to sign up for this benefit.

Eligible households whose primary heat is electricity or natural gas can receive a \$350 regular

benefit. Households using a different heating source or that have heating costs included as part of their rent may receive a larger or smaller amount.

Residents with their heat service currently on and without a shutoff notice are advised to apply online at www.mybenefits. ny.gov or by calling the **HEAP Application Request** Line at 858-1969.

## 'Buffalo Noir'

The city goes all black and blue in "Buffalo Noir." Continuing a series of dark-tale anthologies from around the world from Akashic Publishing, Buffalo gets its day in the dark with 183 pages of marvelous yarns by authors of wide degrees of notoriety.

The 12 tales are universally as dark as a dozen chocolate doughnuts from Paula's, but as craftily assorted as if picked and packed at random. They cut across every social class, every degree of guilt, every neighborhood. Editors Ed Park and Brigid Hughes fit them together like an intricate puzzle.

Rocket Man especially liked Gary Earl Ross' "Good Neighbors," set in Allentown. Full disclosure: He's fairly tight with Ross, whose "Guns of Christmas" play reprises soon at Subversive Theater. But of all the pieces, all of them, Ross' has the best narrative, as two opposite-side neighbors subtly compete for the potential largesse of an elderly widow. Ross never specifies the address, but it feels like Cottage, maybe, or Mariner.

Whatever, the feel is – here, anyway – cheerily authentic. Ross later confided that his golden-age central figure, surely at death's door but stumbling on the jamb, was based very much on a real life. For all we know, he was one of the competitors. It ends with a bang, but not too loudly. One reviewer described it as "droll." Rocket Man prefers "comically cunning."

"Television Tom" Fontana offers a compelling story of loyalty and revenge along lower Niagara Street, one character even seedier than the other, it turns out.

Lockport's widelyacclaimed Joyce Carol Oates, one-time slanderer of Grover Cleveland ("City of Light") and never inclined to employ one word when 10 will do the job, unwraps, in "Valentine's Day," one magical night in the life of an impoverished and downtrodden teen-age girl. Was it all a dream? You decide, 'cause she sure didn't report. Rocket Man did find it odd to read of north- and southbound cars on Huron St., which actually runs east-west. What do they know in Niagara County?

Lawrence Block's "Ehrengraf Settlement" unfolds on Nottingham Terrace, the one serving of the truly upper crust, also unique in that its protagonist predates "Buffalo Noir." The story is not so much drawn as it is etched. It grinds exceeding small, and that's a compliment.

Such past-tense legends as Rick James and Memorial Auditorium play strong supporting roles. It is all just sooo Buffalo; maybe it's just hometown pride, but Rocket Man can't envision it being done as well in any other city.

He read every story twice, and some three times, to make sure he "got" it. A couple still eluded him, notably the unfortunate fate of the "Bubble Man of Allentown" and "Dr. Kirkbride's Moral Treatment Plan," set largely at the now repurposed Psychiatric Center. Maybe next time. Still, a true treat for the twisted, available generally for \$15.95.

ly uncomfortable for no apparent reason. If your pet exhibits signs of bloat, bring him to a veterinarian as soon as possible. Speak with your veterinarian for more information on this condition.

No Bread for Barney: Think twice before leaving that homemade bread dough atop the oven to rise. According to the ASPCA's Animal Poison Control Center, when bread dough is ingested, an animal's body heat causes the dough to rise in the stomach. As alcohol is produced during the rising process, the dough expands. Pets who have eaten bread dough may abdominal experience pain, vomiting, disorientation and depression.

**Peanut Butter Warn**ing: Using peanut butter as a holiday treat for your pet? Remember to check the label! Xylitol is a sugar substitute now added to some peanut butters. It's safe for most humans, but deadly to pets, even in small quantities!

Garbage **Pickers?** Some animals patiently wait for the chance to pick through the garbage when you're not around. Keep your garbage bags away from where pets can chew through them to get to the goods. Ingestion of these items can be life-threatening.

Chocolate can be fatal to pets! Chocolate contains a substance called Theobromine, a compound very similar to caffeine in structure. Theobromine can be toxic to dogs and cats in small quantities, causing vomiting, diarrhea, hyperactivity, seizures, rapid and irregular heartbeats, muscle tremors, coma, even death. Keep chocolate safely away from all animals.

**Potpourri Problems:** Of course we want our homes to smell nice when guests arrive...but be mindful that liquid and other types of potpourri, especially when sprinkled into rugs, along with many scented essential oils are toxic to dogs and cats. Read more about the overall effects on pets, the dangers to cats and the dangers to dogs.
