Route 198 Travel Advisory

The New York State Department of Transportation announced that the demolition of the second half of the Elmwood Avenue Bridge over NY Route 198, in the city of Buffalo, is scheduled to begin. As a result, several travel restrictions will occur on NY

Route 198.

On Friday, May 20th, NY Route 198 westbound will be reduced to one lane in the vicinity of Elmwood Avenue from 6:00 pm until 10:00 pm, and will be closed to all traffic from 10:00 pm until 6:00 am on Saturday, May 21st. Traffic will exit

and re-enter NY Route 198 at Elmwood Avenue using the existing exit and entrance ramps and will be directed by flaggers.

On Monday, May 23rd, NY Route 198 eastbound, from Grant Street to Delaware Avenue, will be closed to all traffic from approximately 10:00 pm until 6:00 am. Traffic will exit at Grant Street and follow a posted detour along Forest Avenue to Delaware Avenue.



Take a Swing at the **Home-Run Derby**

The Royals won two games over the Athletics and Indians and the Orioles shut out the Yanks, 4-0.

In Major Girls, McKenna Horne helped lead



Here's a list things to do in and around Buffalo for the 2016 Memorial Day weekend.


The Kenmore Memorial Day Parade is one of the largest Memorial Day parades in Western New York, the parade begins at 11:00 am on Delaware Avenue, and goes through the Village of Kenmore, ending on Elmwood Avenue. Even though Memorial Day typically honors those who are no longer with us, the parade also offers special recognition to veterans and active military members to thank them for their ser-

If you're looking for a family-friendly picnic spot with a view of Lake Erie, visit Buffalo Harbor State Park, the newest in the New York State park system. With picnic tables, a marina, places to catch some rays, and an onsite restaurant, the Buffalo Harbor State Park promises to keep improving their facilities in the years to

come. Water sports, such as canoeing, kayaking, stand-up paddle boarding, and windsurfing are permitted here.

For those with an interest in history, it's a great weekend to visit Old Fort Niagara. Built in 1726, there are original buildings still standing from the fort's inception. While the events that took place here span hundreds of years, today you can see special exhibits and demonstrations that give visitors a chance to experience a soldier's life as it existed in the past. On May 28th and May 29th between 9:00 am and 5:00 pm, you can see re-enactments from wars through the 20th century; there are also displays featuring tents, rations, weapons, and equipment.

The Buffalo History Museum hosts its fourth year of Food Truck Rodeo featuring 11 food trucks with menus offering a variety of specialized dishes and desserts.


Alfresco suppertime will take place the first Wednesday of each summer month (June 1sts, July 6th, August 3rd and September 7th) from 5 pm

until 8 pm. The Museum enhances the Food Truck Rodeo experience with free museum admission, extra seating for picnicking, children activities, and DJ music.


In anticipation of an estimated average attendance of 500 people per rodeo, folks are encouraged to bring a blanket and/or lawn chairs to enjoy the


