Critical Blood Shortage Prompts Emergency Call for Donations

The American Red Cross is facing a critical blood shortage and is issuing an emergency call for eligible blood and platelet donors of all blood types to give now and help save lives. Blood donations have fallen short of expectations for the past two months, resulting in about 61,000 fewer donations than needed and causing a significant draw down of the Red Cross blood supply.

Blood shortages often worsen around Independence Day due to fewer volunteer-host-

ed blood drives at places of work, worship or community gathering, and this year is no exception. Overall, the summer months are among the most challenging times of the year for blood and platelet donations as regular donors delay giving while they vacation and participate in summer activities.

New donors and those who haven't given in a while are especially encouraged to roll up a sleeve and help save lives. Nearly one-third fewer new blood donors came out to give last summer than during the rest of the year due in part to schools – where blood drives are held and where new donors give - being out of session during the summer months.

To schedule an appointment to donate, visit redcrossblood.org or call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767). Donation appointments and completion of a RapidPass online health history questionnaire are encouraged to help reduce the time it takes to donate.

Summer Hope at the **Buffalo City Mission**

Are you ready for the hot, hazy days of summer? For the health and well being of the homeless, it can be as dangerous as our region's long, winter months. In our

city under resurgence, a homeless population still exeven ists, during the summer.

Homelessness does not discriminate; it affects people of every race, age, and continues in every season, 365 days a vear.

While most Buffalonians plan vacations, family cookouts, swimming, and work to keep cool in the AC, for those without shelter from the sun, a reprieve from high temperatures, and reliable access to clean water, summer isn't a carefree and fun time; it's a burden.

Willie, a current resident of the Buffalo City Mission, knows the streets of Buffalo all too well, especially during summer, and shared with us the hardships of his personal experience. "No matter

where you try to sleep, on the sidewalk, on the grass, in the woods, or underneath a viaduct, you fear for your safety. You barely ever sleep," he says. Before coming to the

Mission, Willie recalls, "The only way feel clean was to go into

woods with soap when it's pouring rain and hold a garbage bag over your head. Once it's filled, pour it over yourself to rinse off."

Average water intake should be ten cups (consisting of eight fluid ounces) per day, but for a homeless person, drinking this amount is nearly impossible. To hydrate themselves, "You find an outdoor water spigot at night," says Willie. Without access to the appropriate amount of clean drinking water, a person experiencing homelessness can become quickly dehydrated, suffer from thirst pains, heat stroke, fatigue, irritability,



Pominville Returns with Defenseman Marco Scandella

On the eve of the NHL free agency period commencing Saturday July 3rd, new Sabres GM Jason Botterill continued his reconstruction of the roster with a significant trade with the Minnesota Wild. The major components were Marcus Foligno who was exchanged for Wild defenseman Marco Scandella. Also in the mix was an exchange of Tyler Ennis for former Sabre Jason Pominville and reducing Minnesota's salary cap hit.

Scandella, age 27 is a seven year pro, the last four as a regular on the Wild blueline. He is a big defender standing 6'3" and weighs 208 lbs. Known as a solid all around defenseman primarily in a defensive role with little offense but with a big point shot, he had four goals and 13 assists last season.

While Scandella has been unable to crack a strong top four defense corps in Minnesota, he represents an upgrade for Buffalo's defense which was probably the weakest in the NHL over the past two seasons. In order to convince the Wild to send Scandella to Buffalo, the Sabres agreed to help Minnesota out of a salary cap squeeze by re-acquiring former Sabre Jason Pominville and his \$5.6 million salary. In return the Wild took forward Tyler Ennis

and his \$4.6 million salary off the Sabres books.


With Scandella earning \$4 million last season, the Wild shifted \$9.6 million in salaries to the Sabres. Foligno is a restricted free agent who earned \$2.25 million in Buffalo in 2016-17. Coming off a career best 13 goals, lets assume he signs with Minnesota for \$2.75 million a year. Adding Ennis \$4.6 million salary, that's \$7.35 million added onto Minnesota's salary cap for 2017-18. That means the Wild freed up \$2.25 million in cap space.

Pominville should prove to be a valuable addition to the Sabres bottom six forwards who were nearly as woeful as their defensemen last year. While he scored only 13 goals last year his 47 points were good considering his limited ice time and minimal power play minutes. Pommer should anchor the second power play unit as a point

More significantly is what this means for the internal leadership group. Captain Brian Gionta was a productive player with 15 goals and 35 points but at age 38 the end may be at hand. Questions about his leadership have arisen in the national media where one outlet unfairly listed him as the worst captain in the NHL.

There has been talk about a fractured locker room where a group of young players (You can fill in the names- it won't be difficult) disregarded the direction of veteran leaders like Gionta and Josh Gorges along with former coach Dan Bylsma and played the game on the ice in their own style.

The Pittsburgh Post Gazette reported that Sabres ownership wished their young star was more focused on the team rather than himself. Regardless of who is to blame for this situation, the presence of former captain Pominville can help ease the transition as new leadership group asserts itself. This team has plenty of work to do to become playoff caliber and more drama will only impede their progress.

In the center of Shoshone Park, away from any bike path or a tree that could provide shade, lies a green patch of earth reserved for the littlest of a baseball or softball child. These are three, four and five year old boys and girls who are playing under the watchful eyes of their coach, while learning to hold a baseball bat or catch a ball. This is the future of North Buffalo Baseball.

Not long after the season opened, close to 200 boys and girls have been coming to this tiny patch of a diamond, fenced off from the bigger diamonds all around it. This is Diamond #8 and to the people who run the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League, this is the most important diamond in all the Park. For the close to 1,000 kids registered to play this season, this number close to 200, has to keep growing for the League to continue to offer a field of dreams for the baseball youth.

The girls are three and four years old, wearing team shirts that say Bisons, Bandits, Hornets or Grasshoppers. The boys are four and five years old and their shirts say team names like the pros such as Yankees, Dodgers, and Reds. Since the first weekend in June, a dozen boys baseball teams have learned how to throw a baseball to first base. They know how to stop a moving baseball on the ground. They know where to stand next to home base in order to use their bat to smack that baseball or softball off the tee. And they know how to run to first base. Everyone gets a chance to hit, there are no strikes and no one gets out. This is Baseball and Softball for the first time player.

On Monday, July 10, the T-Ball season will end for these boys and girls in the Leagues traditional fashion. They will all move to a bigger Park diamond and celebrate a winning season with all their friends and families.

For many involved in the running of the League, this night is truly a hit for all concerned in striving to achieve the goals of what the League is supposed to be. Each player will receive a miniature trophy of their talents for the game and will eat a hot dog or two while they listen to their coaches one last time before next season, when they can come back as better players. The T-Ball Party for Hertel North Park is a beautiful thing. Everyone walks away feeling young

Last Thursday, June 29th, the league held its annual All-Star games in the Park from all the various divisions. There were nine games played on all the diamonds, including two under the lights. Players were selected from all the teams by their managers and formed a team of All-Stars to play one another in a battle for bragging rights. Each player wore their own team shirt and in the end, received a gold medaillion to wear by their coaches. It was a great night for everyone selected to play as some games proved to be most exciting.

The regular season is coming to an end in most divisions for the House Leagues. Some make-up games will have to be rescheduled before the playoffs can start. Every team will make the playoffs and play in a double elimination bracket. The winner advances while a losing team has to prevent a second loss in order to stay alive for a Championship.

In scores from last Saturday, The Cubs defeated the Dodgers, 5-4 and the Reds beat the Nationals, 10-7 in Major boys. The Cardinals won over the Rockies, 8-7 while the Dodgers defeated the A's in Major girls. The Giants and Orioles won in Minor Girls. The Twins and Yankees won in First Minors and the Indians and Blue Jays won in Rookie boys. It's wrapping up to be an exciting time for Playoffs in Shoshone Park.
