Sabres off Season Moves Key To Improvement

While the fans base is excited about the imminent arrival of Rasmus Dahlin as the NHL's next superstar in waiting, the Sabres are still in need of substantial changes to make the team a playoff contender.

1. Team Speed – Other than Jack Eichel the Sabres lack skilled forwards with high end speed. Justin Bailey and Nick Baptiste push the pace with their skating but primarily in a straight line. They do not have the lateral movement to weave through defensive players nor do they show an NHL scoring touch. Ryan O'Reilly, Kyle Okposo and Sam Reinhart are slow afoot but O'Reilly and Rhinehart overcome their slow speed by producing points. They need help from the draft.

2. Defensive Depth – Dahlin will push everyone down the depth chart where they belong. Rasmus Ristolainen and Maro Scandella would make a good second pair, Brendan Guhle and Casey Nelson slot in as the third pair. Zach Bogosian would make a good veteran mentor to pair with Dahlin while he learns the NHL game. That leaves Jake McCabe as an extra. Newcomer Lawrence Pilut is the top defenseman in the Swedish league (ahead of Dah-

lin) and an offensive specialist. At age 24 he will get a roster spot in Buffalo.

3. Locker room must change – All of the unrestricted free agents must go; Jacob Josefson has already signed to play in Sweden, Jordan Nolan and Josh Gorges are at the end of their careers. Justin Falk may be aggressive but is too slow. Chad Johnson had a poor season in goal. Nathan Pouliot may have played himself out of the league. Get the losing culture out of locker room. Players like Zemgus Girgensons and Adam Larsen have been part of the losing culture and don't contribute much here. A new start in another organization is best for them and the Sabres.

4. Prospects – It's now or never for some young players in Rochester. Hudson Fasching is big and slow. He was a healthy scratch in Rochester in the playoffs at age 22. Nick Baptiste hasn't shown much. Justin Bailey was their best playoff player but has not shown that he belongs in the NHL. William Nylander looks lost. Linus Ullmark gave up 16 goals in three straight playoff losses with a poor 0.800 save % but played reasonably well and was beaten by a lot of open shots. He will be the Sabres starting goalie next

season.

5. Should the team look to trade Sam Rhinehart? He had 44 good games (20 goals 39 points) and 38 bad games (11 points). Which is the real Sam? His trade value will never be higher.

6. Developing Jack Eichel – He has become a point per game producer but has a lot of room for improvement. His -25 ranked 775th out of 802 players last season. He needs to learn that you don't win by scoring goals, you win by outscoring your opponent. It will be difficult for this franchise to move forward when the franchise player in one of the leagues worst performers at even strength.

His faceoff winning percentage is 41.7 which is unacceptable for a third year pro. Teammate Ryan O'Reilly is the leagues best faceoff man. Why isn't this skill being taught to Eichel? Despite his considerable offensive skills, he has scored only one shootout goal in his career and the team doesn't use him as a primary shooter in tie games. He needs to commit himself to mastering faceoffs and playing solid two way hockey with defense being the priority.

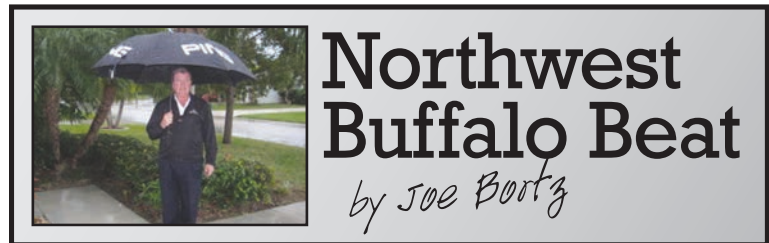

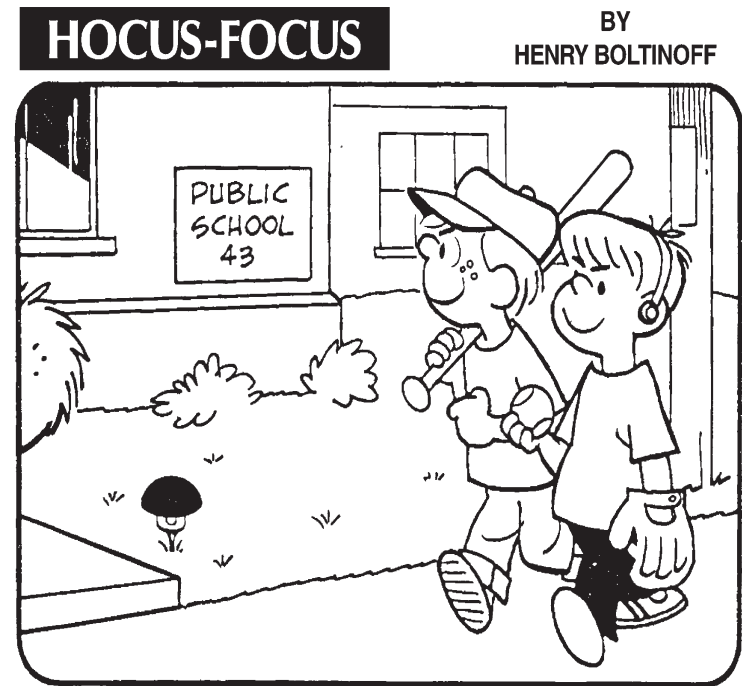

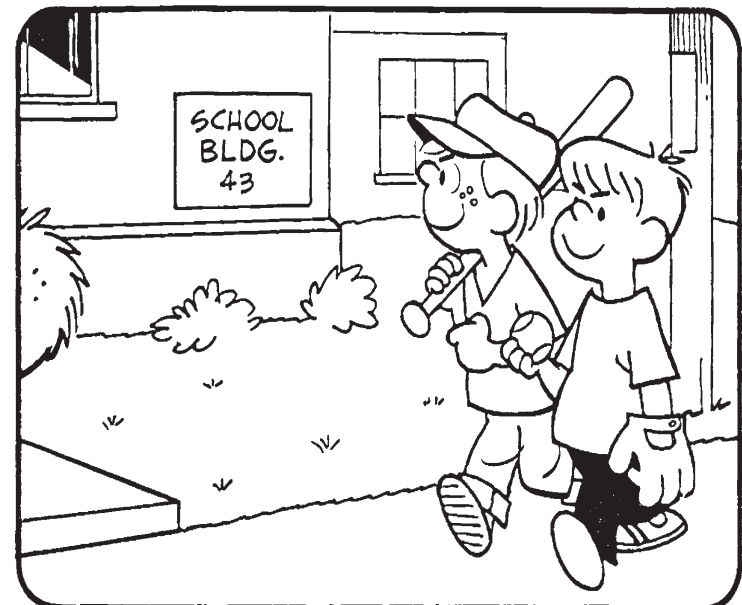

May is Older Americans Month

Dan is president of the Association of Mature American Citizens [AMAC] and points out that seniors are living longer and in better physical and mental condition than ever before.

“Men and women who turn 65 these days can expect to live well into their 80s and, according to the statistics, 40 year olds are increasingly likely to live to 100 or more. Meanwhile, modern medicine is making strides as researchers seek treatments and even cures for the most devastating illnesses that still plague humans, including cancer

and dementia.”

The country celebrates Older Americans Month in May and Weber called on AMAC’s membership, the over 50 crowd, to reflect on the “positive side” of growing old in the 21st-Century. And, he asked the country, as a whole, to be mindful of the contributions seniors have made to the success of “American Exceptionalism.” Remember also that the past is prologue to the future and that the knowledge, experiences, values and guidance of previous generations are an invaluable asset for future generations.

“Therefore, it is imperative that we remain mindful of the wealth of understanding parents and grandparents have of the hows and whys

of success and failure. They can testify to the trials and errors of the past so that our kids and our grandkids will know the right paths to take in their lives. And, that is a key element of the task of preserving our nation’s heritage and ensuring its future,” according to Weber.

Older Americans Month, says the AMAC chief, doesn’t get the attention it should. “Some among the younger generations may not be keen on celebrating the fact that some individuals in their lives have lived to a ripe old age and have important life lessons to pass on to them. They’ve got it wrong. That’s not what it is all about. It’s about those senior citizens who can and who are willing to offer insight, perspective and guidance that will stand the younger folk in good stead as they mature and get on with their lives. So, the onus is on we seniors to take the initiative and reach out to them.”
