Madras Maiden Flying Over Buffalo



The World War II Boeing B-17 Flying Fortress "Madras Maiden" will take to the skies over Buffalo. As the B-17 flies around town this weekend, its famous silhouette and unique sound will draw a great deal of attention.

The Liberty Foundation's B-17 "Madras Maiden" is one of only 12 B-17's that still fly today. The B-17 dubbed the "Flying Fortress" as a result of her defensive fire power, saw action in every theater of operation during WWII. The majority of all B-17's were operated by the 8th Airforce in Europe and

participated in countless missions from bases in England deep into enemy territory.

The Liberty Foundation's B-17 provides visitors the opportunity to take a step back in time and gain respect for the men and women who gave so much to protect our freedoms. At each stop, flight "missions" are available in the "Madras Maiden" which allow people to take flights in this historic aircraft. During flight operations, there will be a designated, secure area for those who would like to watch the aircraft flights at no charge. This Day In Hockey History

This day in hockey history, August 20th 1946, Al Hamilton was born in Flin Flon, Manitoba. Hamilton was an original Buffalo Sabre. He spent his junior career with the Edmonton Oil Kings. He was one of the rare players to play in the Memorial Cup tournament for three seasons in a row. His Oil Kings won the Memorial Cup 1966 led by Hamilton who scored a whopping 82 points in 55 regular season and playoff games, and was compared with Bobby Orr of the Oshawa Generals. In Hamilton's Memorial Cup winning final junior year, Hamilton and Orr highlighted the championship game by trading end to end rushes.


In his NHL debut with the New York Rangers against the Toronto Maple Leafs with Frank Mahovlich skating down the boards, Hamilton entered the game from the bench on a line change and knocked out the unsuspecting Mahovlich with a thundering shoulder check that required smelling salts to help him regain consciousness. He then settled into the minor leagues including two seasons with the AHL Buffalo Bisons.

Hamilton finally cracked the Rangers' lineup in 1969, playing in 59 games, but he had arrived at a time when the Ranger defense was stacked and a new kid named Brad Park was turning heads. Hamilton was left unprotected for the 1970 NHL Expansion Draft and was selected by the Buffalo Sabres as their third choice.

When the World Hockey Association was formed in 1972, Hamilton jumped to the fledgling league, sign-

ing with the Alberta Oilers for their first season. Named the team's captain at the age of 26, he immediately responded with a 61-point season, his best as a pro, A superb defender and leader, he captained the Oilers for four seasons and was chosen to represent Canada in the 1974 Summit Series against the Soviet Union. Hamilton was the leader of the Oilers' defense corps for the whole of the WHA's history.

Hamilton finished his career back in the NHL, playing 31 games with the Edmonton Oilers in 1979–80 then retired at season's end. His number 3 jersey was the first retired by the franchise. Hamilton is the only Oiler not to be a member of the 1980s Stanley Cup teams to have his jersey retired.

Then again it is kind of sad as the parents that you have spent your life with will no longer be physically there to talk to. To share your day with and to give you advice. Requested or not. Tears again begin to flow.

Third emancipation. It was expressed to my eight children that when they reached the age of 18, they were given their freedom to move out if they choose, but of course were welcome to stay. For a while anyway.

Four of the eight went off to college, one joined the Navy, two boys decided to get their own apartments. Both had serious girlfriends to kind of explain the desire to do that. The third girl was off to New York City to become a professional model. So the age eighteen year old limit for emancipation turned out to work.

Two returned home after their emancipation. One daughter who had gone off to college. The son in the Navy. Then we experienced for the first time, a sibling moving out to get married. A last and final emancipation. Even though this $\bar{w}as$ by far the happiest of all the siblings departing the nest, tears still flowed. A house once filled with laughing, singing, running, joking people, was now going silent. Did not think much of it at the time, but I did not like any of the goodbyes. I cry at K Mart openings so even though I kept a stiff upper lip, I cried inside. Those final moments when they leave hurt for some reason. Why do they have to be emancipated? again I sure wouldn't want them all living home with me. What a thought. Hmm, maybe emancipation is a good thing. I kind of like the peace and quiet.

experience on this legendary aircraft, these participants receive a pre-flight safety briefing containing the historical significance of the aircraft and a spectacular scenic air tour around the city. During the flight, passengers enjoy the unique opportunity of moving about the aircraft to the different combat crew positions to see the viewpoint that thousands of our heroes saw in combat over 70 years ago. World War II was the single greatest challenge to freedom in the 20th Century.

Through the 46 months of war, over 300,000 American soldiers, sailors and aviators died defending the beliefs that they held dear, with many more sacrificing in other ways. These men became our heroes through their struggles and came home to a grateful nation. Over the half century since, those heroes became our husbands, uncles, fathers and grandfathers; in many cases their stories were never shared with their families.

Estimates place

number of World War II veterans dying each day at over 1,500. With each death, another story of courage, honor and sacrifice is lost forever. aircraft represents that legacy of courage and valor." The B-17 flight experience takes 45 minutes with approximately half hour in flight.

Indians scored four wins to tie the game at 5-5 on a big hit by Elizabeth Hornung.


Julia Vuich took the mound for the Indians in the top of the eighth and kept the Yankees off the scoreboard. The team got excellent play from Gabrielle Gruehauf, Yasmin Kennedy, Claire McGillicuddy, Madelyn Lipowski, Taylor Dowell and MacKenzie Gunnarson. But in the bottom of the eighth, Abigail Armento knocked in Elisabeth Gannon from third base for the winning run, and the 6-5 final.

"It was an exciting season," said Indians coach John Hornung after the victory. "The girls all played hard and played their best when it count-

ed. You can't ask for anything better than that.' Offensively, the team was led by Amelia Cline, Chloe Claeys, Madison Marchiole and Alana Waikiki. The Indians finished in first place in the division and with the Yankees, drew a bye in the first round of the post season. 


