Re-Treeing Buffalo

The intrepid group of hardy volunteer tree planters will be picking up their shovels this Saturday for the fall tree planting coordinated by Re-Tree.

It has been twelve years since the devastating October 12, 2006 storm removed thousands of trees from the Western New York landscape.

A dozen City of Buffalo organizations will be pitching in to replace those trees, adding 106 more to streets and parks in the

city's neighborhoods. "We are inching ever-closer to the goal of 30,000 trees planted by our volunteers," stated Paul D. Maurer, founder and chairman of Re-Tree, a program of the Buffalo Green Fund. Each tree planted by volunteers has been matched by municipalities so that the nearly 60,000 trees lost in the storm's wake are replaced when the goal is reached.

This Saturday's reforesting is being done on Ketchum, York, and Jer-

sey Streets in the area near Kleinhans Music Hall. In the Allentown section of the city, new foliage will be planted on College, North, Days Park, Hud-son, Arlington Park, Sym-phony Circle, Virginia, Ed-ward, and Pennsylvania Street. The largest planting will be in the University District, with 25 trees going into Godfrey, Mar-tha, Roosevelt, and other streets with the "Re-Tree the District - The University Heights Collabora-Continued on page four.

Flames Burn Sabres 2-1 In Overtime

The Sabres were outplayed by the Calgary Flames Tuesday night at the Keybank Center but led 1-0 into the last minute before the Flames rallied for a last minute tie and then winning in overtime. The loss was in spite of a strong effort by goalie Carter Hutton with 36 saves. Jack Eichel ended an eight game goal drought scoring Buffalo's only goal on a rising shot from the off wing.

The Flames had appeared to even the score at the start of the second period. After a sensational stick save by Hutton that prevented a Calgary shot from crossing the goal line, the puck went into the net on a second opportunity but the referee had already blown the whistle and the goal was disallowed. A replay review upheld the decision.

Late in the game the Sabres failed to clear their zone four times on the left wing as Calgary sealed off the wall keeping the puck in the Sabres defensive zone. The last failed attempt proved fatal with Flames goalie Dave Rittich on the bench for an extra attacker, the puck was worked to the opposite side where Matthew Tkaczuk scored to tie the game deflecting a shot by Elias Lundholm that also deflected off Rasmus Ristolanien's stick and the ice before slipping past Buffalo goalie Carter Hutton.

The Sabres had opened overtime on a two minute power play courtesy of a tripping penalty by Tkaczuk as time expired in the third period. But the Sabres failed to generate any scoring opportunities and Calgary seized the remainder of the OT with Johnny Gaudreau scoring at 2:40 on a two on one off a neat give and go with Mark Giordano as Jack Eichel was back defending because defenseman Rasmus Ristolanien had been caught up ice. Gaudreau took a long pass at the Sabres line and then fed Giordano on the left wing. Hutton committed to Giordano who then slipped the puck across to Gaudreau for the winner.

Hutton lost the win and his shutout after playing a strong game which was not adequately supported by his teammates. He was rather upset after the game and snapped at a couple of reporters in the locker room for criticizing his play. "I just feel bad for him," Sabres coach Phil Housley said. "He's really given us some really good, solid goaltending and he's been asked to stand on his head and that's unfortunate. He was our best player once again. He gave us a chance to win."

"We didn't play well," Eichel said. "Obviously, they outplayed us and we didn't deserve to win that game." Jason Pominville assisted on Eichel's goal for his 500th point with the Sabres, tying him with Danny Gare for ninth in Buffalo history. It also extended his point streak to five games with four goals and five assists. The Sabres have earned at least a point in five straight games (3-0-2) for the first time since a nine game point streak in 2012, but have lost their last two including last Saturdays 5-4 OT loss in Columbus.

The Sabres open a series against the Ottawa Senators on Thursday night in Ottawa followed by a 2 pm matinee in Buffalo on Saturday.



Seniors In The Workplace

AREA SENIOR CENTERS

The oldest segments of the population are also the fastest growing segments of the American labor force, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. The BLS reports that younger members of the workforce have a stable, lower level of participation but the numbers of older workers - those 65

to 75 and older - are expected to increase steadily through 2024

"It's a good thing," says Dan Weber, president of the Association of Mature American Citizens. "The reason: an older workforce is a more engaged workforce. Gallup says that older workers are more 'involved in and

enthusiastic about their work and are more productive in their workplaces - than younger workers. People are not only living longer these days, they're living healthier, more active lives. That, combined with the greater freedom at home that comes with reduced family obligations, makes older employees more focused on the satisfaction of a job well done."

Weber also points out that employers gain a competitive advantage by utilizing the experience and know-how of older workers and taking advantage of the knowledge they've gained over the

vears.

The Society for Human Resource Management conducted research and "found that the top three advantages of older workers, compared with other workers, are more work experience (77%), higher level of maturity/ professionalism (71%)and stronger work ethic (70%).'

In addition, working seniors have a positive effect on the economy. They have more disposable income and, as a result, have created a growth market for private sector companies catering to their needs.

Ageism is still a prob-

lem for older workers, according to Weber, but there are signs that employers are waking up to the reality that there are a lot of benefits to keeping senior employees on their payrolls and hiring from the fast-growing pool of older job seekers. "They are beginning to realize that seniors can adapt to new ways and that they can be excellent role models for younger workers, that their enthusiasm is infectious, that in most cases the work means more to them than their paychecks and, of course, that they have had a lifetime of learning from their mistakes."
