# **Clear the Way**



## NHL Midseason Awards

Here at the Buffalo Rocket we have created a new group of NHL awards;

The Sharpshooter Individual Award goes to the highest scoring player Alex Ovechkin, with 32 goals. The Sharpshooter Team Award goes to the Tampa Bay Lightning, who have scored 183 goals, 20 more than the next closest team San Jose with 163.

The Defense? What's Defense? Award goes to team surrendering the most goals the Ottawa Senators, who have allowed 174 goals so far.

The Best teammate Award goes to the player with the most assists, the Tampa Bay Lightning's Nikita Kucherov, with 51 assists, followed close-ly by Winnipeg's Blake Wheeler with 48.

The Stay on the Ice Award goes to the player with the highest plus-minus rating, Calgary Flames Mark Giordano with a +31.

The Get Him Off The Ice Award goes to the player with the lowest plus-minus rating, Flor-ida Panthers' Defenseman, Mike Matheson, with a -21 rating; followed by Canucks D-Man Erik Gudbranson, with a -20 rating.

The Brick Wall Award: goes to the goalie with the best goals against average (minimum 10 games played) LA Kings' Jack Campbell, with a 2.21 GAA in 15 games. The Dominik Hasek

Award goes to the goalie with the best save percentage, also earned by LA Kings' Jack Camp-bell, who has a save per-centage of 0.930 despite a 0.357 winning percentage playing for the woeful Kings.

The Sieve Award is a shared award going to the goalies with the most goals allowed and the worst GAA. AIt is shared by Ottawa's Craig Anderson (104 goals allowed) and Chicago's Cam Ward (3.80 GAA), narrowly saving Anderson from sharing the award with himself (3.58).

Back to the Minors Award goes to the goalie with the worst save percentage, Calgary's Mike Smith with a save percentage of 0.886.

The Ice Pack Award goes to the player with the most blocked shots, Colorado's Ian Cole, with 115 shots, followed by New Jersey's Andy Greene,

who has blocked 111. The It's Better To Give Than Receive Award goes to the player with the

most hits, Las Vegas' William Carrier with 219 hits (48 more than the next)closest player). The Pass to Nowhere

Award goes to the player with the most giveaways, LA Kings' Drew Doughty with 72, followed by previous winner Mike Matheson with 68.

The Gimme That Puck Award goes to the player with the most takeaways, Ottawa's Mark Stone with 71 takeaways followed by Connor McDavid, with 61.

The Possession Award goes to the player with the best giveaway-takeaway differential. Which is our old friend Ryan O'Reilly of St. Louis Blues with a + 38takeaway to giveaway differential.

The Big Shooter Award goes to the player with the most shots on net Colorado's Nathan McKinnon, with 204 shots.

The He's Seen More Rubber Than A Dead Skunk on the Trans Canada Highway Award goes to the goalie who has faced the most shots on goal, Anaheim's John Gibson, with 1,168 shots, just slightly more than Vegas' Marc-Andre Fleury's 1,112.



# Two

What was it like to start a venture in an unneighborhood, known knowing nothing about running a business, no working capital, on an off street and not familiar with the product you are supposed to produce? Probably in one-word people would say it would be crazy". Having to feed eight kids, myself and my wife, maybe insane would be more like it. Glad now that I did it but going back 50 years ago to the beginning, what was I thinking?

My new printing business was located at 277 Tacoma Avenue in North Buffalo. It was a 20-minute drive from where I came from on 15th street on the West Side. I knew Delaware Avenue and I had heard of Hertel and the Zoo was on Parkside, that was the extent of my knowledge of North Buffalo, or North Park as it was called then. So, to say we started from scratch would be an overstate-More like a pin ment. hole. Determination was the only motivation as being super smart was not one of my major assets. I had to learn first how to print, how to run a business, and sell myself to the neighborhood. Knew nothing about sales tax, income tax, fica, and all

those little things that are there but you do not think about. Always worked for someone so my employer always took care of those incidental items. Not so incidental as I found out later.


I had left a job as a truck driver and dock worker making \$12,000 a year. My salary was \$3,500 my first year in business. This was 50 years ago so \$12,000 was a lot of money. Just to prove it, in this issue of the Rocket I posted a full-page ad for Sunshine's market almost 50 years ago. Compare the prices to now. Sirloin Steak, \$1.59 lb. 4 tomatoes .35. \$225 a week was a livable wage. \$75 not so good with ten mouths to feed. Supplementing my income at Hickey's flea market on Sunday mornings turned out to be a life saver. Doing trade with advertisers and buying cereal, etc. wholesale by the carton helped to make ends meet. Peanut butter and jelly were a staple with baloney sandwiches. Plus, my family supported me almost 100%. Just one was a little shaky and it was none of my kids. Understandable.

There were many times I had considered giving up and going back to work for someone. It was tough and discouraging. Many

doors slammed in your face. Long hours, lots of 16-hour days, 6 days a week. Sunday mornings the flea market with the afternoon always reserved for the family. Even took the real estate exam and worked part time trying to sell real estate. Knocked on every door on Ramsdell Avenue, trying to get a listing. Nothing, so the print shop had to work. Worked hard and used every angle I could think or to bring in business. Joined every North Buffalo group in existence and even founded new ones. Wanted to know and befriend my new community neighbors.

Slowly and painstakingly it started to work. Little by little I started to build clientele. Enough to keep afloat. With the founding of the Rocket which came later, there was a glimmer of light at the end of the tunnel. A co-worker at one of my former places of employment, Moore Business Forms, was being laid off, a deaf mute, but we had become good friends. Offered him a job working with me and he accepted. Had to learn sign language. We worked together for years. He was my first production employee and like me at first, knew nothing about what we were doing. Here we are two newcomers, one trying to teach the other and they cannot even talk to each other. We made it work. Used lots of scrap paper for notes to each other.

I had a brother- in-law who worked as a printer downtown and he helped me learn how to properly run a press. Perhaps it was the size of my family,

but lots of people offered to lend a hand. Could have been my Charisma and charming personality but I doubt that. Want to go on the thought that I was very fortunate to have known some good people who guided and supported me. If space allowed, I could name them all. Those that are still with us will know who they are.

I was off and running but still before the Rocket, things were not going as well as I had hoped. All those little things you must learn. Paying taxes, where and how to buy supplies, selling, producing at a profit, it all becomes necessary. You must learn fast. New York State and the IRS are not trained to

be nice people. It comes with the territory as most business people learn.

Here fifty years later I look back and wonder where I would be if I had given up. Not writing this column for sure as there would be no Buffalo Rocket. Perhaps, not being able to spend my Winters in Florida. Then again, who knows, I could have been rich and famous instead of poor and unknown. Or is it the other way around?

# Ask Rusty - Will My Benefit Be The Same As My Current SS Statement Says?

Dear Rusty: I recently retired after more than 40 years in the construction industry. I'm 60 years young and my wife and I recently moved south to enjoy retirement in a new and milder environment. At this point, we do not plan on receiving my SS benefit until I reach my full retirement age of 66 and 8 months. In my 2018 statement, the Estimated Benefits Section, it states "You have enough credits to qualify for benefits at your current earning rate(If you continue working until your full retirement age of 66 years and 8 months your payment will be ....)." Then it shows an amount for my full retirement age, age 70 & age 62. My question is, if I don't work from now to my full retirement age will that significantly reduce my SS benefit rate that is quoted on my statement? Signed: Retired early

**Dear Retired:** Congratulations on your retirement! The estimated benefits shown on the statement you received from Social Security are just that - estimates. But they make a critical assumption which will, indeed, make a difference in the actual amount of your benefit when you finally claim it.

Those estimates assume that you will continue working at your current income level until you reach your full retirement age (FRA). But since you retired from work at age 60 your actual benefit (assuming you continue without working) will be less than the current estimates you have from Social Security. Whether the reduction will "significantly reduce" your benefit depends on your actual earnings in the 35 years used to compute your benefit when you claim. Your benefit is determined by adjusting for inflation all your lifetime earnings as reported to the IRS (but only up to the annual payroll tax cap for each year).

They then select the highest earning 35 years over your lifetime, total them and divide by 420 (number of months in 35 years) to arrive at your "average indexed monthly earnings," or AIME. This is a number used to compute your actual benefit amount.

Since the highest earning years are usually the ones later in your working career, stopping work before you reach FRA will yield a lower benefit - if the estimated benefit computation used the predicted earnings between age 60 and your FRA to arrive at your benefit estimate. The key parameter used to determine your actual benefit amount is something called your "primary insurance amount" (PIA), which is computed from your AIME and is your benefit at your full retirement age.

If you claim before FRA, your benefits will be reduced according to the number of months before that you claim (reduced by about 6.7% for each of the first 3 years early and then 5% more for any years more than 3 years prior to your FRA). Conversely, if you wait beyond FRA to claim, your benefit will grow at 8% per year until you are 70, when it would be 26.7% more than it would be at your full retirement age.

Of course, you don't have to wait until age 70 to apply, because you'll earn delayed retirement credits (DRCs) of 2/3rds of 1% per month of delay beyond your full retirement age. But the longer you wait to claim, the more your benefit will be (up to age 70), thus possibly easing the impact of any benefits lost by not working until your FRA.

To summarize, if you don't work between now and your FRA, your benefits will be probably be less than shown in your most recent estimate. If you work and have earnings for some years after age 60, and those earnings are more than any of the 35 used to compute your estimate, the higher current earnings will be used to compute your final benefit amount. And if you delay beyond your FRA to claim benefits you may recover (thru DRCs) some of what was lost by not working between age 60 and your FRA. I realize this isn't a specific answer about how much less your benefit might be, but I hope this answers your basic question.


