Garden Walk Buffalo, the largest garden tour in North America, will be held Saturday and Sunday, July 27 & 28, 2019, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days.

Visit gardens from the Niagara River to Main Street, and from Canalside to the Parkside neighborhood. An estimated 60,000-70,000 visitors from around the U.S., Canada and beyond, will visit 435 of the most creative and enjoyable gardens found anywhere in the U.S. Many gardens have appeared in magazines like This Old House, Fine Gardening, Horticulture, Garden Gate,

Real Gardens, Traditional Homes, Country Gardens and dozens more. Many have appeared on TV, in newspapers and written about on travel and garden blogs from around the country.

Kalnitz Awarded Scholarship

North Buffalo resident Max Kalnitz, a 2019 graduate of the University at Buffalo who is pursuing a master's degree at Syracuse University's Newhouse School of Public Communications, has been awarded a local journalism scholarship.

Kalnitz is the former senior news editor of The Spectrum, UB's student-run newsroom. He interned in the newsroom at WBFO Radio and has done extensive freelance work for various entities, including NYup.com and The Buffalo News.

He is scheduled to graduate from Syracuse's graduate program in June 2020.

Fund Chair Brian Meyer, who cut his journalistic teeth as a teenaged correspondent for Rocket publications in the mid-1970s, says Kalnitz's early accomplishments are impressive.

This marks the 41st year that the local organization has awarded annual scholarships to aspiring and professional journalists. Since 1978, 145 scholarships totaling nearly \$127,000 have been awarded. Winners have attended about 30 different colleges and universities in the United States and Canada.

The program helps future and current journalists in Western New York, Northwest Pennsylvania and Southern Ontario. Five trustees, chosen for staggered five-year terms, serve without remuneration. Nearly 100 percent of all fund revenues are awarded as scholarships.

Jonah Heim Next Stop the Major Leagues

As a junior at Kenmore East Jonah Heim was the dominant baseball player in WNY baseball in 2012. The Bulldogs were eager to enjoy Heim's senior season until it was time for registration. That's when the Ken East staff informed Jonah that he would be unable to continue to attend Kenmore East. His parents had bought a house on the Niagara Falls Boulevard, the dividing boundary line between Ken-Ton and Amherst school districts. The house was on the Amherst side so Heim was forced to transfer to Amherst High School for his senior year. This became known at Amherst as "The Lucky Mistake" Amherst H.S. where Heim's jersey was retired after his lone season playing baseball at the school.

Pro scouts watched Heim at every game. A catcher, his pickoff throw to second base was measured by radar guns at 2.0 seconds – the Major League average. Heim was a high draft pick selected in the fourth round by the Baltimore Orioles. At 6'4" with a lanky 185 pound frame he was a top prospect with his defensive game but struggled with his hitting in the low minor leagues. The Orioles kept a positive outlook on his potential with the legendary Earl Weaver telling him that everything was fine with his swing, he just needed to get stronger and the hits would come.

and the hits would come.

Jonah began climbing the ladder of minor league baseball within the Baltimore Orioles, Tampa Bay and Oakland farm systems. In his second season 2014, he was promoted from rookie ball to Short-A. 2015 was the climb from Short-A to Low-A. 2016 was spent entirely in High-A and 2017 he split his season between Low-A and High-A. His hitting had never been a strength but he had a

nice .292/.353/.433 stat line for High-A Stockton tin 2018. From April 20 to May 18, he put together an 18-game hitting streak where he batted .429.

To get an idea of his potential consider that he has been traded twice in his young career for players who rose to the major leagues. Heim was dealt to Tampa Bay at the 2016 trade deadline for Steve Pearce who is now with the Boston Red Sox. He was swapped to the Oakland A's 16 months later for Joey Wendle who now plays for the Toronto Blue Jays.

Heim was promoted to Double-A for the first time in his career last season and assigned to the Midland RockHounds. On June 9 Oakland promoted him to the AAA Las Vegas Aviators. Now weighing a solid 220 lbs. Heim is batting .403 in 25 games and .303 in his last ten. Earmarked for the majors because of his defensive prowess and play calling, it appears that he may fulfill that destiny.



Ask Rusty - Will Social Security Go Bust? Dear Rusty: I'm al- brings in.

ways hearing rumors of Social Security imploding – of people my age getting benefits but not the younger as they have time to do something else. I wonder if I file in December for 50% of my spouse's benefit, and later, before I turn 70 and change to my own benefits, if SS goes bust will I lose what I would have been able to claim under myself? I understand that you would only be guessing to answer that. From what I've read, it seems that 20% reduction will be necessary across the board. I do not trust politicians who love to play Santa to get reelected. Signed: Untrusting Senior

Dear Untrusting Senior: As of right now, Social Security has about \$2.9 trillion in reserves in its Trust Fund. Beginning probably in 2020, SS income will be less than needed to pay all benefits, and money will start to be withdrawn from the Trust Fund to meet benefit obligations. Current projections are that the Trust Fund reserves are sufficient to pay 100% of benefit obligations until 2035, at which time SS will only be able to pay out as much money as it

brings in. According to projections, that would result in about a 21% cut in benefits for all beneficiaries. But those dire predictions are only valid if Congress does nothing to resolve Social Security's cash flow deficit expected to start in 2020.

The solutions for Social Security's financial issues are very well known to Congress. What's missing is a bipartisan agreement on the best way to resolve it. One side of the aisle wants to simply raise Social Security taxes (remove payroll caps and raise FICA contributions), while the other side prefers future program adjustments which deal with the reality that people are living much longer today than they did when SS was first enacted. Most pundits believe that Congress will eventually reach a compromise before the Trust Fund is depleted in 2035 requiring benefit cuts. After all, what politician who wishes to stay in Congress would want to be associated with reducing Social Security benefits for the very large and voting senior citizenry?

To get to your specific question: There is no real danger of SS going "bust," as in not being able to pay any bene-

"lose what I would have been able to claim under myself." The worstcase scenario is that your age 70 benefit (which will be about 32% more than your age 66 benefit) might be reduced, but it would never be totally eliminated. The best-case scenario is that Congress puts the current vitriolic atmosphere aside and does their job to fix the problem before it's a crisis. The last time Social Security had a crisis of this nature was in 1983, and the Democratic-controlled Congress and the Reagan Administration worked together to enact a fix which lasted for decades (until now). It's my sincere hope, and indeed my expectation, that a similar bipartisan effort will eventually take place to resolve Social Security's financial issues for many decades to come. The Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC) has developed a common-sense Social Security Guarantee proposal which has been presented to multiple Congressional representatives for consideration, and which would solve Social Security's financial issues for genera-tions. If you'd like to see that proposal feel free to go to this link: https:// amac.us/social-security/. Will Congress act on this any time soon? I'm afraid that's impossible to predict, but if history offers any insight it's that they will probably act only when the crisis can no

longer be ignored.


