Mountain Climbing in Switzerland Last week I mentioned transportation methods

traveling to Europe. On one of those trips my wife requested that we go to Switzerland and the city of her heritage, Zug. We did that and soon realized you have not seen mountains till you have seen Switzerland. Not only are there cities in the valleys but homes built into the side of these mile high piles of rock. The scenery is breathtaking and something to behold. We took a trip up to one of these mountain homes for a visit. Traveling the road up leaves one with an extra heartbeat. It is one lane to go either up or down. Leaving a slight problem if a car is coming in the other direction. They have dugouts in the mountain for you to pull into and get out of the way. Down in the valley below we could see the town of Zug, in all its glory.

When in Switzerland you do what the Swiss do, climb the mountains. There was a tourist attraction where you climbed to the top of a two-mile-high peak. Not on foot but in a series of

transportation methods. Once you have reached the bottom of the mountain you board a bus. Common bus like any other but the trip up the one mile is an adventure. Naturally you cannot go straight up, you must go slowly up the side on winding roads. Just a mile but that was far enough. You leave the bus and board one of those up hill trains on tracks. These follow the slope and go straight up. You sit facing backwards. Like climbing the first hill on a roller coaster but you are looking down instead of up. They have these in Pittsburg. This is the second leg of the climb. The last step is the best, most exciting and scariest.

Once you get off the train you board a cable car. Looks like a small San Francisco trolley car inside. Windows all around, wood interior and lots of bars to hold onto. You get on in at a loading station, like a cave. You are inside the mountain about to embark on to the last step of the climb. Did not expect

what was to come next. The cable car starts moving out into the open with a lurch. Once you are out of the cave and into space all you see is down two miles. The cable car sways a bit in the wind, and I can understand the panic bars all over the place. Not that holding any of those makes a difference. Once you are out there it is like flying without a plane. A certain part of your anatomy puckers. After the initial shock it is kind of a pleasant ride. Quiet, once the screaming stops, drifting closer and closer to our destination, the peak.

The top was a typical tourist stop. No fences, if you fall, you fall. Some railing for the more dan-gerous lookouts. There was a small restaurant and if you were hungry you ate and drank what they had. Bruns wager on a roll with mustard. Take it or starve. Soft drinks and water. The one other thing that was offered was a zip line ride to an adjacent mountain and back. You are strapped on looking down both ways. I got in line to try it but gave in to my wife's pleas to not do it. Did not take much. She panicked when I took the luge ride at Lake Placid. This looked a little more intense. Looking around at the mountains and the valleys from that far up is a once in a lifetime experience.

On the decent, the first stop back is the cable car.

Again, you board on the inside of an enclosed station. And again, you experience the sudden impact of out into space. This time you know what to expect. You would think. Right in the middle between the two mountains, the cable car stops. Here we are two miles up hanging by two cables, swaying in the wind, not moving. Where are the parachutes? If it broke down, how do they rescue us? It paused for about a minute but that seemed like an hour. Turns out it

was part of the program. One last look at the beauty of nature from as close to heaven as most of will ever get. Once it began to move again, and we started to breath normal, the rest of the decent was uneventful. How much more can your poor heart take? It was fun and glad we did it. I think some people would rather be in a boat on the warm waters of the Caribbean. With flat islands on good old solid ground. But that could be boring! Did that also.

Ask Rusty - Will My Husband's **Income Affect My Benefits?**

Dear Rusty: Since it looks like a good option for me to retire at 62 and my husband (who is younger than me) to retire at 67, will the income he makes after I retire affect my benefit amount by way of income taxes if we continue to file jointly? Also, how would receiving an inheritance affect my benefit amount if I file at 62? Signed: Worried Spouse

Dear Worried: Your husband's income won't directly affect your monthly Social Security benefit payments at all, but it may affect the tax liability on your Social Security benefits. Only earnings from you working will affect your monthly Social Security

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benefits, but whether the benefits you receive become taxable income to the IRS depends upon the level of your "combined income" for your IRS fil-ing status. "Combined income" is your Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) as reported to the IRS, plus any non-taxable interest you may have, plus 50% of your yearly Social Security benefits. This is also known as your "modified adjusted gross income" or "MAGI."

If you file your income taxes as "married – filing jointly," and your com-bined income for both you and your husband is more than \$32,000, then up to 50% of your Social Security benefits will become taxable income.

If your MAGI is over 44,000 then up to 85%of your Social Security benefits will become taxable. What that means in tax dollars depends upon your normal income tax rate as defined by the For information, IRS. the MAGI clip levels are lower when filing as an individual – if filing "single" MAGI over \$25,000 means that up to 50% of Social Security benefits are taxable and MAGI over \$34,000 means that up to 85% of Social Security benefits are taxable. But the advantages of filing jointly versus filing single usually more than offset the difference (though you may want to consult a tax advisor to confirm that).

As to your last question, an inheritance won't affect your monthly Social Security benefit (only your earnings from working will affect your Social Security benefit), but if that inheritance is taxable by the IRS, then the portion of your Social Security benefits which are taxable could be affected, as described above.
