Shoshone Pool **Tearing Down A Memory**



Work begins on the indoor sports complex in Shoshone Park. The 75,000-square-foot complex is expected to be completed next year.

Work has begun on the proposed site for a two story building planned for Shoshone Park to be used as an indoor practice facility for community sports. A demolition crew arrived late last month and began to re-move one of the City of Buffalo's venerable pools used by thousands of area residents at one time,







Sabres Ten Game Report

With an 8-1-1 record in the seasons first ten games the Sabres lead the NHL standings with 17 points, one point ahead of the second place Washington Capitals. Unlike last seasons fluky ten game win streak, their current success is the real deal and sustainable.

Here's why. The most important statistic in tracking and predicting performance is High Danger Chances. According to NaturalStatTrick. com, the Sabres ranked second

in the league en- Carter Hutton Buffalo Sabres. tering play Tuesday with a high danger scoring chance percentage of 61.90%, which means they generate 61.9% of these chances while their opponents generate only 38.1 %. This reflects coach Ralph Kruegers defense first philosophy. He has tasked his players with a responsibility to defensive zone play. Upon a turnover in the attacking zone the players are instructed to beat the puck back to their own blueline. Once they establish this position then they are to identify their responsi-

bilities and protect their defensive zone IE limit those high danger scoring chances.

Jeff Skinner led the team with eight high scoring chances in five on five play through six games and was tied for fourth in the league. Last sea-



son Skinner was tied for ninth in the league with 94 high danger scoring

> chances. The Sabres are playing sound two way hockey. They rank fourth in the league in scoring with 3.70 goals per game and sixth in defense with 2.40 goals against. As a result the Sabres lead the league with a plus 14 goal differential.

> Carter Hutton earned the NHL Third Star of the Week after posting back to back shutouts. He earned his first shut-

out as a Sabre on October 14th against the Dallas Stars. On October 17th he established a franchise record for most saves in a shutout after blocking 47 shots in a shutout at Los Angeles, joining Bob Suave (1979-80) as the second Sabres goaltender with two shutouts in his first five games of a season

Hutton is third among all NHL goaltenders with a 1.65 goals against average and third in save percentage with 0.943 and even strength save percentage at 0.966. He leads all goaltenders in shutouts with two and tied for

> second in wins with six. He has won every game he has played so far this season.

Jack Eichel is tied for fifth in scoring with 14 points in ten games. He is showing that he is truly among the elite scorers in the league. Under

Ralph Krueger's coaching Eichel's Lollygagging on line changes and in the transition game have disappeared. As a result his presence in the defensive zone is more noticeable and effective.

With an exciting 4-3 overtime victory against the San Jose Sharks Tuesday at Keybank Center, the Sabres have a 5-0-0 home record for the first time since 1984-85. The team's record for most consecutive home wins to begin a season is six, set in the 1975-76 season.





haunted houses or the many scary places they have now. It was unique and one of a kind.





Ask Rusty – What Should I Know About Social Security?

Dear Rusty: I'm 59 years old. When do I need to start looking at what's available for me – when I start getting closer to age 65? Signed: Planning Ahead

Dear Planning Kudos to you Ahead: for thinking about Social Security in advance! Fifty-nine years of age is a great time to start planning. Your strategy may be different, depending on whether you are married, if you plan to continue working well into your sixties (or later), your health, and your expected longevity.

You have an 8-year window between ages 62 - 70 during which you can claim your benefits, and the age you claim will greatly influence the amount of your benefit. If you claim at age 62, your payment will be 30% less than it would be if you wait until your full retirement age (FRA), which for you is age 67. If you choose to delay past your FRA until age 70, your benefit will be 24% more than it will be at your FRA. Your full retirement age is when you get 100% of the benefit you have earned from a lifetime of working claiming earlier will result in a lower benefit and claiming later (up to age 70) will mean a higher benefit (8% more per year of delay).

The age you claim should consider your plans for working, because if you claim earlier than your FRA and

The person must say this prayer 3 consecutive days. After 3 days, the request will be granted. This prayer must then be published after the favor is granted.

continue to work you'll be subject to Social Security's earnings limit until you reach your FRA. If you exceed the limit (\$17,640 for 2019), SS will take back \$1 for every \$2 you are over the limit by withholding future benefits. The earnings limit goes up by about 2.5 times during the year you reach your FRA and goes away once you reach FRA. If you exceed the earnings limit SS will withhold benefits for as many months needed to recover what is due, which means you could go months without receiving any benefits. Although, at your FRA, you will get time credit for any months withheld (thus a benefit adjustment), it could (depending upon the amount) take many years to recover any withheld benefits.

Your health and expected longevity are key factors in determining the age to claim SS. The life-expectancy for the "average" man your age today is about 84. If your health and family history suggest you will enjoy at least average longevity, then delaying your claim to a later age will yield more in cumulative lifetime benefits, as well as a higher monthly payment. Conversely, if you're in poor health and expect less than average longevity, delaying may not be a practical option for you.

If you are married there are special considerations if your wife is, or was, a lower-earner or stay-at-home mom and has a smaller SS benefit than you. Your wife may be eligible for a spousal benefit from you and will also be eligible for a survivor benefit if you should predecease her. The widow's benefit your wife would be entitled to is based upon the actual amount you are receiving at your death. If you claim at age 62, your widow would get your age 62 benefit, but if you wait until later (up to 70) to claim, your widow gets the higher benefit you were receiving because you delayed claiming (if that's higher than her own).

Finally, your financial needs should be included in your planning. If your circumstances are such that you do not urgently need your Social Security benefits to live comfortably, then delaying your claim will provide you with a higher monthly benefit in retirement. If, on the other hand, you need the extra money to make ends meet, then claiming early makes sense (but beware of the earnings limit mentioned above).

By setting up your personal online account at www.ssa.gov you'll be able to see the benefit amounts you are estimated to receive at age 62, at your FRA, and at age 70. Having these numbers, and taking the above points into consideration, should allow you to develop a strategy for when you should claim your Social Security benefits.



Since 2016, Edra Soto has turned her daily dog walks into what she has likened to urban beachcombing: collecting discarded liquor bottles. The artist carefully strips her findings of their branded labeling, playing up the simple elegance of the bare bottles by displaying them on decorative panels inspired by rejas, the painted wrought-iron screens that commonly adorn homes in her native Puerto Rico. As part of special artmaking activities, visitors will be invited to adorn the bottles with cast clay seashells, reimagining the definition of beauty in our personal and shared spaces.

A series of Rodney Taylor's paintings inspired by homes near his studio on Fillmore Avenue in Buffalo's East Side completes

the exhibition. Like both Hart and Soto, Taylor is interested in revealing the complexities at the heart of such everyday structures. In his paintings, he transforms the architecture of the homes into virtual frames, suggesting buildings under stress.
