

park scenery, amenities, and special feature areas like the rose gardens. There are additional positions for golf course maintenance and retail operations. Plus, positions may help with athletic fields and courts, and even special event site preparation and clean up. Job assign-

ments can be to one park or across the system as part of work teams.

Simmonds Adds Needed Grit To Sabres Lineup

Sabres GM Jason Botterill finally shipped away disgruntled forward Evan Rodriguez on trade deadline day. E-Rod and Connor Sheary were traded to the Pittsburgh Penguins for center Dominic Kahun.

Rodrigues had career highs of nine goals and 29 points last season, resulting in him getting a one-year, \$2 million con-tract in arbitration. But his role diminished under new coach Ralph Krueger. He averaged 11:19 of ice time this season, down 4:30 from last year. He has only five goals and four assists in 38 games this season. The speedy smallish forward is not much of a goal scorer and plays a high risk game with frequent turnovers from low percentage pass- Wayne Simmonds Buffalo Sabres.

Sheary, 27, is a former Penguin. Sheary was an undrated free agent in Pittsburgh when Sabres GM Botterill was an assistant GM with the Penguins. He played on two Stanley Cup champion teams as a winger on a line with Sidney Crosby.

Sheary had 23 goals and 53 points in 61 games with the Pens in 2016-17 but never duplicated that scoring in Buffalo. Sheary is a solid player especially as a forechecker. But he is a smallish forward who was primarily a perimeter player with an aversion to taking position in front of the opponents net where goals are scored. The Sabres have had too many players with those



attributes and as a pending UFA he was expendable.

Kahun, 24, will also be an unrestricted free agent this summer. He has 10 goals and 27 points this season and was seen as having the potential to be a top six forward with the Penguins. In 132 career games, he has 23 goals and 64 points. He was injured last week blocking

a shot and may need a few days to heal up before playing his first game for Buffalo. He missed eight games earlier this season with a concussion. These injuries may have played apart with his trade as the Pens need healthy bodies assured for the upcoming playoffs.

The Sabres also acquired Wayne Simmonds from the New Jersey Devils for a fifth round pick (aka virtually nothing), with the Devils paying 50% of his \$5.5 million salary. Simmonds is precisely the type of player the Sabres have needed, a gritty physical forward who goes to the net and can inhibit opponents from taking physical liberties with his teammates.

At 31 Simmonds is still relatively young. While he is no longer the 30 goal scorer he was with the Flyers at age 26 he is still valued for his good attitude and locker room presence as well as his attributes on the ice. He is an unrestricted free agent who can sign with any team for next season. He would look good in a Sabres jersey in 1920-21 for about \$1 million.

While the Sabres were expected to be sellers on deadline day, they added players to help them push for a playoff spot. The team has a 7-4-1record in their last 11 games keeping pace with Toronto and Florida for a wild card spot. While they have a 4.4% chance at postseason play Jason Botterill hasn't stopped planning for success.



Boy Scouts of America

It was a little sad to see that the Boy Scouts of America has filed for bankruptcy to kind of save itself from extinction. This organization has been around since 1910. 110 years old. Since I was 12, I have seen or been a part of this program. By either being a member as a youngster, or seeing most of my sons participating.

I could not wait to be old enough to join "Boy Scouts." To make new friends, to learn about the outdoors, to go camping, and just having a place to go every week to have fun and spend time with my peers. times the testosterone surfaces. Just cannot say enough good things about my years as a boy scout. I learned a lot about life and how to enjoy nature.

Ask Rusty – Does Social Security Ever Make Mistakes on Benefits?

Dear Rusty: Can or does the Social Security Administration occasionally make mistakes in determining the benefits due? I'm now 72 but I retired early at age 61 and knew that my benefits would be reduced. I've always wondered if my monthly benefit calculation was incorrect but did not know how to address my concerns. If it is possible, could you direct me in how to handle with the SS Administration? Signed: Skeptical of My Benefit

Dear Skeptical: Can the Social Security Administration ever make mistakes? Of course they can, and do, but not really very often considering that they are dealing with tens of millions of beneficiaries, and especially when it comes to computing benefit amounts.

Since nearly all benefit computations are done by computer, the usual source of any error is almost always from using incorrect input data. The actual benefit computation formula, while complex, is very standard and well proven; if an error occurs in a basic benefit computation, it is usually because a person's lifetime earnings record contains an error. Having said that, let's explore why you feel your benefit may not be correct.

When you say you "retired early at age 61" I assume that means you claimed your Social Security early at age 62 (the minimum age). Since your full retirement age is age 66, that means that by claiming at age 62 your benefit was cut by 25% from what it would have been at age 66. Also, any benefit estimate you had from Social Security prior to claiming made the assumption that you would continue to earn at your current level until you reached your full retirement age. If you "retired" and stopped working and earning at age 61, the benefit you are entitled to is less than that estimate you had from Social Security at age 61.

So, how can you address your concerns? I suggest the first thing you do is get a copy of your lifetime earnings record from Social Security. You can do this by calling them and requesting it or, if you have a "My Social Security" personal account, you can obtain it online. You should verify that all of your lifetime earnings are properly reflected in Social Security's records (SS gets your earnings data from the IRS). Note that only your earnings up to the maximum payroll tax for each year count because that's all you paid SS FICA tax on; if your actual earnings in any year were more than the annual payroll tax cap, only the amount up to that year's tax cap is used. Be aware that if you find an error, you will need to prove it to Social Security by showing them a copy of your W-2 or your Federal Income tax return for the year(s) in question. If your lifetime earnings record is in order, then you are almost certainly getting the correct benefit. When computing your benefit, Social Security adjusts each year of your lifetime earnings to today's dollar value, so inflation shouldn't be a factor either. The highest earning 35 years over your lifetime (adjusted for inflation) are used

to determine your benefit amount.

If you're still uncomfortable that you may not be getting the correct benefit, you should call Social Security directly and ask them to review your benefits to make sure you are receiving the correct amount. Social Security has all of your lifetime earnings data immediately available and can quickly determine if your benefit amount is correct based upon the earnings history shown in your record.


