The American Red Cross strongly urges healthy, eligible individuals who are feeling well to give blood or platelets to help maintain a sufficient blood supply and prevent shortages as concerns about the outbreak of coronavirus disease 2019, or COVID-19, rise in the U.S.

Cold and flu season has already impacted the nation's ability to maintain its blood supply. As the number of coronavirus cases grows in the U.S., the number of people eligible to give blood for patients in need could

pare for this public health emergency, it's critical that plans include a readily available blood supply for hospital patients," said Chris Hrouda, president, Red Cross Blood Services. "As fears of coronavirus

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For Sabres

Dominik Kahun has been a pleasant surprise since joining the Sabres in a trade deadline deal. Kahun was acquired fro the Pittsburgh Penguins for Connor Sheary and Evan Rodrigues who were both unrestricted free agents and sure to be gone at the end of the season.

Kahun is a skilled forward with upside, a definite asset for the Pens. But the Penguins with Sydney Crosby and Evgeni Malkin are in a win now situation. They don't have the luxury of watching Kahun develop over the next few seasons. He has also suffered some injuries and was on the shelf at the time of the trade. Sheary was attrac-tive to the Pens because he has experience playing and scoring on a line with Crosby. He and Rodrigues give Pittsburgh depth as they prepare for a playoff run.

As a rookie with the

Chicago Blackhawks last season, Kahun scored 13 goals and 24 assists for 37 points in 82 games playing mainly with Hawks Captain Jonathan Toews and sniper Alex DeBrincat. After a trade he scored 10 goals and 17 assists for 27 points in 50 games with the Pens this season.

Kahun is a speedy skater. He is a plus eight so far this season and a plus 18 for his career.

Standing 5'11" he has below average size and is not a physical player as evidenced with 14 PIM in 123 NHL games. He has looked strong on an all European line with Viktor Olafsson 1-1-2 and Marcus Johansson 2-3-5 over six games with Kahun.

With only 31 goals in 123 games, he is not a remarkable scorer but he does have excellent passing ability. In six games with Buffalo he has six points on two goals and two assists along with a plus two rating. His biggest contribution so far was the game winning goal in the seventh round of a shootout against the Washington Capitals at Keybank Center on Monday night. Unfortunately shootout goals don't count on the scorers stats.

Where do mothers get the energy?

wonder Ever how mothers have the ability to just keep on going, no matter what? My Mom left us suddenly at a picnic in Akron Falls over 50 years ago. Still the memories remain of all she did as we were children growing up. She was the mother of eight children, I also had eight, and we lived through some pretty rough times. My childhood was following the great depression years, without a lot of money, so my mom had to do with what we had. My wife had the same problem as we also had eight children. They had to cook for a large family, provide clothes to wear, keep the house clean, endless food shopping, with little or no time to relax while making every penny count. Where did they get the energy?

My mother was a full blooded Italian and like most Italian women, loved to cook and feed you. She made her own bread, ravioli, spaghetti, baked cakes and pies constantly. With the bread dough she made sweet rolls, pizza, and bread sticks. After we had our own families, and there were lots of us, every Sunday was pasta day at Mom's. We would have as many as 27 people on any given Sunday for sauce, spaghetti and meatballs, homemade bread and frosted cinnamon rolls. Later on in the day, dessert of home baked apple pie and ice cream. My one sister and my sisters in law would help with the clean up, but the cooking was done by momma mia.

My dad provided the money to buy the food and pay the rent so he

was exempt from doing anything. And he was good at it. He was good at three things, drinking beer, smoking cigarettes, and reading comic books. Other than that I do not recall him doing much of anything except pace from one end of the house to the other. No cooking, no housework, no fixing anything broke, just hanging out. He was a good guy though, and easy going. Him being Irish, he did not like spaghetti, so my mom would have to cook him steak and mashed potatoes every meal. That is in addition to doing the regular meals for us. My Mom also excluded her sons from cooking and housework. The only thing I learned how to do was peel potatoes and iron hankies. Seemed like so many potatoes to peel, so many handkerchiefs to iron. There were no tissue boxes back then. My wife was the same with me as far as stay out of the kitchen, but not the five sons. They all know how to cook. I still have to learn how to boil water.

Back to the question, where do they get the energy? This is not a nine to five day with mothers, as there are demands every

waking hour. Not only do they have to take command and make things work, they have to do most of the work themselves. Now so many years later, I recall the days when I was a youngster. We had no washing machine, no microwave, no wash and wear clothing, everything had to be washed and ironed with an iron. My mother's day started early in the morning, making breakfast for all of us. House cleaning, wash and iron every day and fix lunch as we all came home from school to eat. No school lunches or we could not afford them. Shopping in the afternoon and preparing dinner for the onslaught of hungry humanity that was my father, brothers and sisters. She loved it and never ever complained. The more you ate of her food, the more she liked it.

Maybe that is why she left us so suddenly in her mid sixties. My dad passed almost to the day one year before her. Perhaps the energy she needed for most of her

life had left her. Maybe she just got tired. So her last words were "I'm going" and left us. She deeply loved my dad and would and did anything for him. He was like the king of the house. He was the original Dr. Doolittle. He would better fit Dr. Do-nothing. Let there be no doubt, we all still loved him. Mom and Dad were happy with their lives together and there was never ever any threat of separating. She was content in taking care of her man and her kids.

Again I wonder where do moms get the energy. That was my mom, how many have moms like mine?



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Ask Rusty – About the Dreaded "IRMAA" Provision

Dear Rusty: About a month or two ago I was notified that my Social Security was being reduced from \$1,583 a month to about \$1,283 a month a \$300 deduction! They said it was because my income was over the limit on my last return. I filed my taxes "married - filing" separately" because my wife has her own income. If we had filed jointly, I would not have had the reduction. My question is why wasn't this told to us when we filed our Income Tax last year instead of a last-minute thing? I am a 77-year old and a 100% disabled veteran, which probably has no effect on this, but wanted to add that information. Any light you can shed on the matter will be very much appreciated. Signed: Irritated Senior Dear Irritated Senior: First, I want to thank you for your service to our country. Allow me to explain what I believe happened. Your net (not gross) Social Security benefit payment was probably reduced as a result of a rule known as "IRMAA" - the "Income Related Medicare Adjustment Amount." This is a supplement added to your Medicare Part B premium as a result of higher income, and a higher Medicare premium would mean a lower net Social Security payment.

Although filing your taxes separate from your wife does mean a lower income reported to the IRS for you, it also reduces the clip levels at which the IRMAA rule kicks in. For those who file income tax as an individual, IR-MAA applies if your "pro-

visional" income from all sources, including IRA or 401(K) withdrawals and half of your SS benefits for the tax year, exceeds \$87,000. For those who file taxes jointly as a married couple, IRMAA applies if your combined income is more than \$174,000. Incomes above those clip levels result in corresponding higher IR-MAA premiums, up to a maximum of \$491.60 (for 2020). So apparently your income for your filing status exceeded one of the higher IRMAA clip levels, which resulted in your monthly Medicare Part B premium going from the standard \$144.60 to an IRMAA premium about \$300 higher. Note that if your income in a sub-sequent year falls below the IRMAA clip levels, your Medicare premium will also go down to the level appropriate for your more recent income level.

As far as why you weren't told this in advance, neither Medicare nor the IRS (nor any other Government agency) will advise you in advance on such matters; the onus is upon you (and your tax preparer or financial advisor) to understand the implications of your income on your Medicare premium as well as your income tax obligation. You may want to speak to your tax advisor to see if there is a tax-filing option for eliminating the IRMAA. Once again, thank you for your service to our country, and I hope the above clarifies what happened to your Social Security benefit.

Donating blood is a safe process and people should not hesitate to give or receive blood. There are no data or evidence that this coronavirus can be transmissible by blood transfusion, and there have been no reported cases worldwide of transmissions for any respiratory virus, including this coronavirus, from a transfusion.

The Red Cross only collects blood from individuals who are healthy and feeling well at the time of donation – and who meet other eligibility requirements, available at Red-CrossBlood.org. At each blood drive and donation center, Red Cross employees follow thorough safety protocols including wearing gloves, routinely wiping down donor-touched areas, using sterile collection sets for every donation, and preparing the arm for donation with an aseptic scrub. These mitigation measures will help ensure blood recipient safety, as well as staff and donor safety in reducing contact with those who may potentially have this respiratory infection.

Blood drive hosts also play a critical role in maintaining a sufficient blood supply and are asked to keep hosting blood drives for patients who rely on lifesaving blood. The need for blood is constant, and volunteer donors are the only source of blood for those in need of transfusions.

The Red Cross, with the help of its blood drive hosts and blood donors, can help ensure the safety and availability of the U.S. blood supply for patients including accident and burn victims, heart surgery and organ transplant patients, and those receiving treatment for leukemia, cancer or sickle cell disease.

A blood donation takes about an hour from start to finish, but the actual donation itself only takes about 8-10 minutes. Donors can also save up to 15 minutes at the blood drive by completing a RapidPass[®]. With Rapid-Pass[®], donors complete the pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of donation, from a mobile device or computer. To complete a Rapid-Pass[®], follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood. org/RapidPass or use the Red Cross Blood Donor App

To donate blood. individuals need to bring a blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification that are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also must meet certain height and weight requirements.
