Buffalo Zoo to Welcome Guests Back

After closing in March due to the global coronavirus pandemic, the Buffalo Zoo will re-open on Thursday, July 2, 2020, with enhanced health and safety measures in place to protect guests, team members, and animals alike. The Buffalo Zoo Safe Steps were created using the directives outlined in NY Forward: Guide to Reopening New York & Building Back Better and guidance from public health agencies and experts.

On Thursday, July 2, the Zoo will open to Members only. The Zoo will open to the general public on Friday, July 3, 2020. The Zoo will be closed on Tuesdays for deep cleaning and disinfection.

Buffalo Zoo Safe Steps include:

1. Temperature checks using no-touch forehead thermometers for all guests and team members; 2. Required masks/face



coverings for all guests age two and above;

3. A dedicated cleaning and disinfection team and a closure every Tuesday for deep cleaning and sanitation:

4. Reduced daily guest capacity to assist with social distancing;

5. Required advance online ticket purchase at BuffaloZoo.org, timed en-try and touchless, cashless transactions;

6. Modifications to some guest pathways and closures of some exhibit features.

When it re-opens, the Buffalo Zoo is excited to introduce a brand new Member benefit -- Buffalo Zoo Member Mornings. Each day the Zoo is open, Buffalo Zoo Members can wakeup with the Zoo and enter one-hour before the general public at 9:00 a.m. "We are ecstatic to welcome our members and guests back after our extended closure. Old Fort Niagara To Reopen

Old Fort Niagara is pleased to announce that it will reopen to visitors this Friday, July 3, following its 15-week closure due to the Covid-19 pandem-ic. Daily hours of operation have been shortened slightly from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. to allow for extra cleaning before and after hours. Hourly musket and living-history demonstrations and seasonal food service will resume following proper health and social-distancing guidelines. "We are really happy

that we can welcome visitors back and do so in a safe way for them and our staff," said Robert Emer-son, Executive Director of the Old Fort Niagara Association. "Old Fort Niagara is an open, spacious and scenic site where people can easily keep their distances. Even still, we are taking extra measures to keep indoor areas open and clean because the

health and safety of our visitors and staff are our first priorities."

Capacity will be capped at 25 percent in indoor spaces, such as the Visitor Center, museum, and historic buildings. Staff will monitor building capacity and encourage visitors to tour the fort grounds in a clockwise direction to reduce the chances of groups overlapping.

Old Fort Niagara would like visitors to note the following:

• If you are sick, please do not enter the fort and encourage your family not to enter until you are all well.

• Wear face coverings as per New York State law.

• Maintain minimum 6-foot social distance.

• We are committed to keeping you healthy and safe, but we cannot guarantee you will not be exposed to COVID-19. We Continued on page four.

Keeping Pets Safe This Summer

The following tips will help keep animal companions safe in hot weather:

• Keep animals in-doors, and leave them at home when it's hot outside. Unlike humans, dogs can sweat only through their footpads and cool themselves by panting, so even brief sun exposure can have life-threatening consequences.

• Never leave an animal inside a hot vehicle. Temperatures can quickly soar in parked cars, and a dog trapped inside can die from heatstroke within minutes - even if the car is in the shade with the windows slightly open, which has little to no effect on lowering the temperature inside the car

 Avoid hot pavement. When outdoor temperatures reach the 80s, asphalt temperatures can to 140 degrees, climb

causing pain, burns, and permanent damage to dogs' paws after just a few minutes of contact. Walk dogs on gr<mark>a</mark>ss whenever possible, and avoid walking in the middle of the day. Never run with dogs in hot weather—they'll collapse before giving up, at which point, it may be too late to save them.

The following tips will help to calm dogs during fireworks:

• Walk them during daylight hours to avoid times when fireworks are likely to be set off.

• Close windows and curtains to muffle the sound of fireworks.

 Put on some music or TV to mask the firework sounds

• Create a quiet space where your dog can feel in control.

• Create some hiding places around your home.

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Memorable Sabres Moments


On June 30th 2001, Dominik Hasek was traded by the Buffalo Sabres to the Detroit Red Wings for left wing Vyacheslav Ko-zlov, a 2002 1st round pick (#30-Jim Slater) and future considerations which consisted of a 2003 conditional draft pick which was not exercised by Buffalo.

This was the biggest loss in team history. The franchise player, arguably the best goalie in league history orchestrated his way out of Buffalo just days after team Captain Michael Peca was traded to the New York Islanders after sitting out the season in a salary dispute.

Seeing the way the team cut ties with Peca showed

that the Sabres were not committed to winning. Hasek threatened to retire or return to his native Czechoslovakia if GM Darcy Regier did not move him to a contender. Hasek wanted a chance to play on a Stanley Cup championship team and he saw that opportunity with Detroit.

The Red Wings signed Hasek to a three year contract at \$8 M per season. Detroit was coached by Hall Of Famer Scotty Bowman and featured Hall Of Fame players like Nicklas Lidstrom, Chris Chelios, Steve Yzerman, Brett Hull and others. This was a team built to win championships.

"Our highest and first responsibility is to provide exceptional care for the animals that reside at the Buffalo Zoo, even amid a global pandemic. While we have reduced many expenses, our animal care and veterinary teams had to remain on-site during our temporary closure," noted President and CEO, Norah Fletchall. "The cost of admission or membership to the Zoo not only gets you a fun and memorable experience but also contributes to our long-term survival."

In addition to a visit to the Zoo or the purchase of an annual membership, the public can still make a donation to the Buffalo Zoo Emergency Response Fund. One-hundred percent of contributions to the Fund go to keeping the animals cared for and employees working.

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

In case you did not know, the Rocket pages are posted on Facebook every week and that includes this column. Last week the story about the Long killing by two off duty Police officers and another man got more hits than any that have ever appeared. The incident took place 43 years ago but some must not have known about it. It was a big story at the time as it was looked on as a horrible case of police brutality. Is that what drew the readers?

In contrast, the week before I also wrote about a policeman, from the former Precinct 17. This officer died in the line of duty. Shot and killed in a gun battle with a known violent criminal. Both took place in North Buffalo, usually a pretty quiet safe neighborhood. Almost no one read that column online as Social media gives a count. I wondered why there was so much interest in it. Maybe because it involved an incident of misbehavior by our men in blue. The previous


story drew little attention as it made the officer a hero.

Ask Rusty-Widow Unsure About Her Social Security Benefits

Dear Rusty: I am looking for information on my Social Security survivor benefits from my husband. I just turned 65 and have been collecting my Social Security widow's benefit since I was 60. Someone told me that I should take my own Social Security and half of my deceased husband's. I am not sure if that's what I should do. Should I stay as I am until age 70 and then look into this option? Is it even an option? I'm just not sure. I work part time because the widow's benefit just isn't enough to pay my bills. I know there must be others out there as unsure as I am. Signed: Unsure Widow

Dear Unsure Widow: It appears that you have been given some inconsistent information. If you are currently collecting a widow's benefit from your deceased husband and have


been since you were 60 years old, you cannot "take my own Social Security and half of my husband's." You only have two options now - to continue your current surviving widow's benefit (which was reduced because you claimed it before your full retirement age), or to claim your own SS retirement benefit if that is more.

If you are now collecting your survivor benefit (only), your benefit from your own work record is still growing. The key question is whether your own benefit from your own work record will ever be more than you are now collecting from your deceased husband as his widow. If your own SS retirement benefit will be more, you can switch to it whenever it has grown to be more than your current widow's benefit. Your own benefit

will reach maximum at age 70, so never wait beyond that to claim it. But if your current survivor benefit as a widow is more than your own benefit will be at any age, you should simply stay on that widow's benefit.

The easiest way to find this information out is to request a Statement of Estimated Benefits from Social Security. That statement will show you the amounts you are due on your own at your full retirement age and also at age 70 (if you were born in 1955 your FRA is 66 plus 2 months). If either or both of those amounts are more than your widow's benefit, you can continue to collect your widow's benefit until it makes financial sense to switch to your own. To request your Benefits Statement, contact Social Security directly at 1.800.772.1213, or your local office (find it at www. ssa.gov/locator). You can also get this online if you have a "my Social Security" account, and which you can create at www.ssa.gov/ myaccount.




