Breast Cancer Awareness Month



Early Detection Saves Lives & Can Find Cancer Before Symptoms Appear.

October National is Breast Cancer Awareness Month ("NBCAM"). Erie County Department of Health ("ECDOH") wishes Department of to remind residents of the vital importance of early detection screenings which save lives.

All women are at risk for breast cancer. A woman in the United States has a 1 in 8 chance of developing invasive breast cancer in her lifetime and the risk of developing breast cancer increases with age. In addition, women whose close relatives have had breast cancer, especially at an early age, are more likely to develop breast cancer.

In 2012, 826 Erie County women were newly diagnosed with breast cancer and 176 succumbed to the disease. When breast cancer is caught early and treated, survival rates can be near 100 percent. "The importance of women having regular mammo-

grams cannot be emphasized enough," stated Erie County's Commissioner of Health, Dr. Gale Burstein.. "Breast cancer treatment has its best chance for success when it is detected early, often before a lump or other symptoms appear. On average, between 2006-2010, only 66% of the breast cancer cases in Erie County were diagnosed at an early stage, so we have a great deal of room for improve-Continued on page six.

These models include 100% virtual learning and hybrid learning with both in person and virtual instruction. On days when children, specifically those between the ages of 5-12, are expected to participate in virtual learning, working parents throughout the county are grappling with how to support their children's education, while also physically reporting to work. 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When Will Hockey Come Back?

Now that the NHL season is over the big question is the proverbial elephant in the room, when will NHL hockey come back. The realistic issue is whether the teams are obligated to pay the players for the 2020 season whether their season or not. Certainly if the league locked out the players or if the plyers went on strike there would be no obligation to pay the players. But this is not such a situation.

The NHL teams generate about 60% of their revenue from ticket sales. Add in the concessions, parking and souvenir sales and the number gets even bigger. Curently New York state prohibits fans from attending professional sporting events. Many other teams face the same situation or will have atttendance severely limited. With empty buildings there is no revenue stream and there is no way to pay the players without going into deficit spending which will not happen. The situation is worse in Buffalo where the team gets nearly 50% of it's ticket revenue from Canadian customers. With border crossing restricted to essential travel, that revenue stream is not available. So this is likely the end of indoor professional sports until a vaccine is developed and proven effective.

While playing in the bubble worked for the Stanley Cup playoffs, the players were nearly unanimous saying they do not want to endure that grind again, being isolated for so long and away from their families.

NHL President Gary Bettman shas stated that mid-to-late December or January start was possible. NHLPA Director David Fehr said that December 1st was the "earliest conceivable date" the season could start. Realitically it would be later.

The NHLPA is organizing a committee to study the issues involved in beginning the next season. Negotiations between the league and players on the length and commensurate salries will begin, similar to how MLB and their players agreed to start up the baseball season. Both side will take the time necessary to get this right. "Nobody is going to rush it," Fehr said.

"Players are adults.

They understand, may not like it. They may grumble, and they may wish it was different. I'm sure owners do. I'm sure fans do. I'm sure everybody does. Nobody likes what we're living through. But you don't gain anything by sugar coating or being less blunt than otherwise would be the case. What we have to do is basically proceed on the assumption that there will be a season, that we can figure out how to do it and how do we do it in a way which provides the requisite health and safety for players and staff and broadcasters and the fans once we can get them back in the arenas, but at the same time has some integrity. That'll be the task."

The Stanley Cup playoffs would need to end before the planned start of the 2021 Tokyo Olympics. NBC is the NHL's U.S. TV rights holder and also will broadcast the Olympics.

Hence if you liked animals, you would take one of these cute little four-legged creatures. Back then we used to feed them table scraps as we could not afford dog food. They were loved but not like the pampered dogs of today. A friend once told me they had a dog, but it was just there, nothing special. Only time you knew they were there was when they barked at strangers.

It is not like that today. Our first pedigree was a German Shepard. Friend of mine had a female and wanted to breed and instead of having two dogs, let me raise and train the male. They have an unshakable love for each other. She has certainly changed our lives. Our goal is to make a good life for this new member of our family. She loves the car so I accommodate her wishes and go on long rides in the country. We want her to be as happy with us as we are with her.



Ask Rusty - Can I Get Social Security with My Municipal Pension?

Dear Rusty: I retired from a municipal Fire Department seven years ago at the age of 54. It is a private pension, and I was exempt from Social Security while I was working. I receive about \$50,000 per year in pension benefits. I recently got a letter from Social Security saying I needed 8 more credits of work to qualify for Social Security benefits. I was wondering if I worked two more years, paying into Social Šecurity, would I qualify for benefits, since I am on a municipal pension? Signed: Retired Fireman

Dear Retired Fireman: Although your municipal Fire Department pension would reduce your Social Security benefit, it will not eliminate it. So, if you work and earn those additional eight credits you will be entitled to a Social Security benefit.


Because of your non-cov-

ered municipal pension your Social Security benefit will be affected by the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP), which affects anyone who has a pension from an employer which did not participate in Social Security (neither the employee nor the employer paid into Social Security). WEP uses a special benefit computation formula which will result in you getting a smaller benefit, but you will, nevertheless, get some benefit amount if you have accumulated at least 40 quarters of Social Security credit. Note that your ŠS benefit amount will be further reduced if you claim it at age 62, or any age prior to your full

retirement age.
You earn Social Security credits by working in a job where you pay FICA payroll taxes on your earnings, and you can earn a maximum of four SS credits per

year. For 2020, you'll earn one credit for each \$1410 of earnings, up to a maximum of four credits for the year, but you don't need to work the entire year to get the credits. For example, if you work yet in 2020 and earn \$5640 (4 times \$1410) you'll earn the maximum four credits for this year.

You need a total of 40 quarter credits to become eligible for Social Security, and those credits never expire, so even old credits earned before your Fire Department career still count. And, even if small, this would be a benefit you have earned by contributing to Social Security, so there's little reason not to pursue it by gaining the needed additional credits.

Through the ECDOH Cancer Services Program, uninsured and underinsured individuals 40 years and over can receive cancer screening, diagnostic, treatment, and support services for breast, cervical and colorectal cancer. The ECDOH Cancer Services Program will determine eligibility, assist with scheduling screening examinations, and provide information at no cost. Residents can contact the Cancer Screening Program at (716) 886-9201, or visit the Cancer Services Program website, www.cspwny.org.

Commissioner Burstein adds, "Erie County provides free screening mammograms for residents who do not have health insurance or are underinsured. I urge women in those situations to not wait and to contact our Cancer Screening Program as soon as possible to arrange an appointment."

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
