Recipe's From Times Cooking

Corned Beef

INGREDIENTS

- 3 to 3 1/2-pound ready-to-cook corned beef, preferably flat-cut
- 1 ¼ cups semi-dry white wine, such as Riesling
- 1 pound red or Yukon gold potatoes, cut into 1- to 2-inch pieces
- 2 to 3 large carrots (about 1/2 pound), peeled and cut into 1- to 2-inch pieces
- 1/2 small head green or savoy cabbage (about 1 pound), core left intact, cut into 4 wedges
- **3 tablespoons Dijon** mustard, plus more for serving
- 2 tablespoons honey
- Flaky sea salt, if necessary
- **Black pepper**

DIRECTIONS

Heat the oven to 325 degrees. Remove the corned beef from its packaging in the sink and reserve the

spice packet. Rinse the beef well under cold running water and pat it dry with paper towels. (If you don't rinse off the brine, the meat will be too salty.) If there is a substantial fat cap on top of the beef, place the beef on a cutting board and trim most of it, if you'd like. (The fat will not completely render away during cooking.) Be sure to leave at least a thin layer of fat on top, about 1/8- to 1/4-inch thick, to keep the meat moist.

Transfer the corned beef to a large Dutch oven with the fat cap facing up. Add the wine and the spices from the packet. Cover the pot and transfer to the oven to cook, 3 hours.

Baste the beef with the cooking liquid. Drop the potatoes and carrots into the liquid surrounding the beef and lay the cabbage wedges on top. Cover and cook until the corned beef and vegetables are tender, 1 to $1\ 1/2$ hours. (A paring knife should slip easily into the beef, but the meat should not be falling

apart.) Heat the broiler to high. Stir together the mustard and honey in a small bowl. Remove the corned beef from the pot and put it on a foil-lined sheet pan. Spoon the honey-mustard glaze all over the top and sides of the beef and slide it under the broiler. Cook until the glaze bubbles and caramelizes in spots, about 3 minutes.

Let the corned beef rest for 5 to 10 minutes, then slice it against the grain into 1/2-inch slabs. Place the beef slices on the serving platter alongside the vegetables and drizzle everything with a little bit of the cooking liquid. Taste the vegetables, and season them with flaky sea salt, if necessary. (The beef will not need to be seasoned with salt.) Season the beef and vegetables to taste with black pepper. Serve with Dijon mustard

Ask Rusty - Does Paying FICA Tax **Now Increase My Benefit?**

Dear Rusty: If a person retires at age sixty-six and continues to work full time, Social Security taxes are still taken out of his weekly paycheck. Will this taxation for Social Security contribute more to the person's Social Security benefit, even if already retired? Signed: **Curious Retiree**

Dear Curious Retiree: Since its inception in 1935, Social Security has been a "pay as you go" program where contributions from those who are working are used to pay benefits to those who are collecting Social Security benefits. That remains true even if, after you start collecting Social Security, you work and pay payroll taxes into the system.

Those Social Security (SS) payroll taxes you are contributing now aren't deposited into a personal account for you, they're used to help pay benefits to all recipients. So, paying SS FICA payroll taxes after you start collecting benefits doesn't affect your benefit payment. However, what might affect your benefit

amount is if your current earnings from working are more than any of those in the 35 years used to originally compute your Social Security benefit when you filed.

When you apply for SS benefits, Social Security adjusts every year in your lifetime earnings record for inflation to bring those earlier earnings up to today's dollar values. They then select the 35 highest-earning years over your entire lifetime, and from those 35 highest-earning years they develop your "Average Indexed Monthly Earnings" (AIME). Your AIME, in turn, is used to compute your Social Security benefit at your full retirement age (FRA).

Social Security examines your earnings every year after your earnings for the previous year are reported to Social Security by the IRS. After your benefits have started, and if your current earnings are higher, Social Security will replace an earlier year's earnings with your more recent earnings and recompute your benefit, resulting in a small benefit increase ("small" because it would represent only 1/35th of the average lifetime earnings used to compute your benefit).

A key thing to remember is that each of your past year's earnings (up until you are 60) are adjusted for inflation before computing your benefit amount. So, for example, \$25,000 earned in 1990 is worth more than \$60,000 in today's dollars, and it is the inflationadjusted amount that your current earnings would need to exceed to cause an increase in your benefit. When I Was A Kid

Now when you get up in the morning or go to bed, you set the thermostat to the degree you feel comfortable and forget it. You are either heated or cooled automatically. Nothing to fuss about as in the summer the air goes on and in the winter heat is at your fingertips. We now live in a comfortable world.

When I was a kid, it was not that easy. Air conditioning to cool the place down, was open the windows and hope for a breeze. Heat was a different story. First over the summer you had to order a ton of coal. The coal man would dump it at the curb and you had to wheel barrow the coal to a designated window and shovel it into the coal bin located in the basement. A ton of coal would not last the winter. You would have to do this at least twice or three times depending on how cold the winter is.

Now when winter comes and the first really cold days it was time to start the coal furnace. Located in the basement it was a huge cast iron stove much like the wood burning stoves you see today. It had a galvanized metal cover to keep the heat in it. This heater was large enough to heat a house. It had huge insulated (covered with asbestos) tubes going to each room. The heat was gravity as there were no blowers. It looked like a fat domed robot with arms going in all directions. It was almost scary looking. In the front of this furnace were two metal doors. The top one you put the coal in and the bottom door to shovel out the ashes. Since it was gravity heat there were square holes in the ceiling to let the heat rise to the second floor.

Okay it is time to light the furnace. No lighter fluid just paper and wood. Lots of paper and lots of wood as you needed a hot fire to ignite the coal. So you start the fire in the furnace and shovel in the coal and it is started. You do not want to do this again so you must keep the coal fire burning day and night. Worst thing that could happen is it goes out at night and you wake up in the freezing cold and have to go down and start the fire again. It happened.

So before you are able to crawl into a warm bed, you must go into the basement, throw a couple of shovels of coal in and damper it to make it last all night. Then in the morning you have to go down and shovel in more coal and stoke it up to heat the house from the cold night. You had to do this all winter to keep warm. Opening the windows for air conditioning was much easier. Could you imagine the kids of today doing this?

In the morning now we just go into the shower and turn the knob to the desired water temperature and enjoy the nice warm water. Not too hot and not too cold. Just right as you can regulate it to your comfort.

When I was a kid we had no shower. We had a bathtub and Saturday night was bath night. Unless you wanted to bathe in cold water this was it. Maybe on special occasions we would light the tank and take a bath but Saturday night was always bath night. There was no hot water just cold. If you want-

ed hot water you had to light the tank. This was a huge galvanized cylinder tank located in the kitchen. It had a gas burner on the bottom and with a match you lit the burner in order to heat the water in the tank. How dangerous was that? You would then feel the tank to see when it was hot enough to draw some hot water. When you could you would take a pail and draw some hot stuff to pour into the waiting cold bath water. Depending on how hot you wanted it would depend on the number or pails. More than one member of the family would use the same bath water. At the time I had three brothers and two sisters. I was one of the youngest so I had to go last. Ugh! It was quite a chore to take a bath as you can imagine so we did it once a week. Could you imagine the kids of today doing that?

One more thing, you got

into your car and turn the key and it starts.

When I was a kid, on cold morning if my dad's car would not start he would call one of us down to crank it. Now this was a 1935 Ford not a model T. Still there were mornings it just did not start. He had to get to work so we needed to crank the SOB to get it started. This meant sticking a crank into a hole in the front grill, and inserting this crank into a designated connection. Then with all the power you had you turned to crank until the engine started. Much like starting a gas lawn mower except this was on a much larger scale. Imagine if the kids today had to do that?

Like I said I had brothers and we all had our turns at doing what had to be done. Maybe that is why they had bigger families back then. Someone had to do the work.
