Happy Easter



Churches all over Buffalo are getting ready for their Holy Week services. Easter is this Sunday.

Easter is a Christian holiday that celebrates the belief in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. In the New Testament of the Bible, the event is said to have occurred three days after Jesus was crucified by the Romans and died in roughly 30 A.D. The holiday concludes the "Passion of Christ," a series of events and holidays that begins with Lent, a 40-day period of fasting, prayer and sacrifice, and ends with Holy Week, which includes Holy Thursday (the celebration of Jesus' Last Supper with his 12 Apostles), Good Friday (on which Jesus' crucifixion is observed), and Easter Sunday.

The Buffalo Zoo is happy to announce the birth of two healthy lion cubs!

Both cubs were born to mother Lusaka on March 7, 2021. The cub's arrival

The Zoo's animal care team began monitoring Lusaka closely in the days before her giving birth. As the keepers started their day on March 7, she went into labor. Cub number one was born at 9:52 am, and cub number two was born a few hours later at 2:47 pm. Both cubs began

Erie County Celebration 200 Years In The Making



On April 2, 1821 New York State officially recognized Erie County. After the American Revolution, the Holland Land Company purchased 3.2 million acres of land from the Seneca nation of the Haudenosaunee (Iroquois). In 1808, New York organized the western-most land as Niagara County. By 1821, the population had increased so much that Niagara County was split. Erie County, the land south of Tonawanda Creek, consisted of ten towns and the Buffalo Creek Reservation. Today, Erie County has twenty-five towns, three cities, two tribal territories and a population of approximately 920,000.

Erie County has ties to several U.S. Presidents. Millard Fillmore practiced law in East Aurora before serving as President. He returned to Erie County and helped establish the University of Buffalo, Buffalo General Hospital and the Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society. Grover Cleveland practiced law in Buffalo before becoming Erie County Sheriff, Buffalo Mayor and Governor of New York. He married Buffalo's Frances Folsom. In 1901, President William McKinley was assassinated at the Pan-American Exposition in Buffalo and, on September 14 of that year, Theodore

April Is National “Donate Life” Month

April is National Donate Life Month and the staff at the Erie County Auto Bureau are pleased to join in the effort to alert customers of the donor crises and encourage everyone to enroll in the Donate Life Registry. The average citizen gets very few chances to save the life of another. Through organ and tissue donation you can be someone's hero. The Gift of Life comes in many different ways through many different stories, personalities, lives and backgrounds. Few things we leave behind in life could be as important.

As many as 10,000 New Yorkers are waiting for a life-saving transplant, including close to 800 people here in Western New York. Thousands more are waiting for life-enhancing tissue and eye donations. Each year, approximately 500 men, women and children in New York State die due to the shortage of donors.

One person who donates organs (hearts, lungs, liv-

er, kidneys, pancreas and intestines) can save up to eight lives, while a tissue or eye donor (corneas, bone, skin, heart valves, tendons, veins, etc.) can improve more than 75 lives by restoring eyesight, helping fight infections in burn patients and preventing the loss of mobility and disability.

The Erie County Auto Bureau plays a significant role in saving lives through the New York State Donate Life Registry. Since 2017, over 170,000 Erie County motorists enrolled in the Donate Life Registry at the local Auto Bureau. Erie County has also surpassed the state-wide statistic by registering 55.7% of customers when they checked the box “YES” to this life-saving cause compared to 42.5% state-wide. These unprecedented enrollment numbers are something the staff of the Erie County Auto Bureau is very proud of.

According to Connect-

Life, 80% of people that become organ donors register through their DMV. To enroll in the Donate Life Registry, add “Organ Donor” designation to your driver license or ID by checking “YES” and signing the New York State Organ, Tissue and Eye Donation consent on the application or renewal form.

When you enroll through this method, a symbol of a heart and the words “Organ Donor” will be printed on the front of your driver license or non-driver identification card at no extra cost.

The average citizen gets very few chances to be a hero and save the life of another person right here in our own community.

nursing and are currently showing signs of good health.
"We are thrilled to welcome these cubs to the Buffalo Zoo family," said Lisa Smith, General Curator, Buffalo Zoo. "It's never a guarantee that newborn animals will survive, but Lusaka is an experienced mom, and she has been doing everything right. Both cubs look healthy and are growing fast."
Lusaka and Tiberius were paired based on a breeding recommendation from The Association of Zoos and Aquariums, Species Survival Plan (SSP), and this is the pair's second litter. In 2016, Lusaka gave birth to three cubs, Asha, Amirah, and Roary.

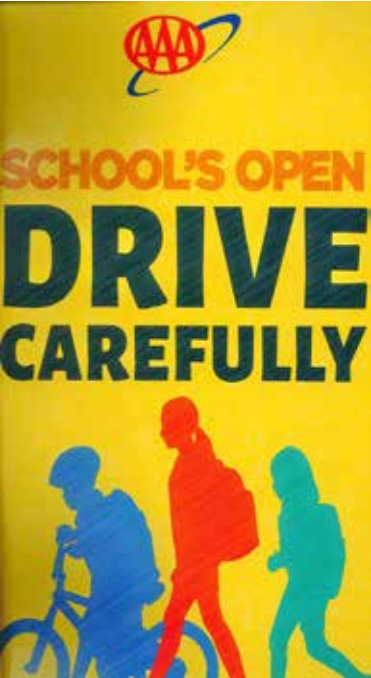

Ask Rusty- Will My Widow's Benefit Replace My Own SS?

Dear Rusty: My husband is 76, retired for 4 years, and receiving Social Security. I am only 59 and still working. We are both in good health and I'd like to think we still have many years to enjoy retirement. My question: Is it true that if I start SS at 62, I can switch to my husband's SS when he passes? If this is true (and his amount is slightly higher than my FRA amount), wouldn't it make sense for me to begin collecting at 62? **Signed: Younger Spouse**

Dear Younger Spouse: Yes, it is true that if you start your reduced personal SS benefit at age 62, and your husband (collecting a benefit higher than your own) predeceases you, you can switch to his higher benefit amount. But there are some other factors which come into play when dealing with survivor benefits, especially with an age difference:

You must be at least 60 years old to claim your survivor benefit (or 50 if you are disabled). Your survivor benefit will be reduced if you haven't yet reached your own full retirement age (FRA) when you claim it. The reduction is 4.75% for each full year earlier than your FRA that you claim the survivor benefit.

You do not need to take your survivor benefit immediately upon your husband's death. Your survivor benefit as your husband's widow reaches maximum at your FRA, and you can choose to delay claiming your widow's benefit until you reach your FRA (to get the maximum amount).

If you claim any SS benefit before your FRA (your own or your survivor benefit), and you are working, you'll be subject to Social Security's "earnings test" which limits how much you can earn before SS takes back some of your benefits.

Considering the above, if your eventual benefit as your husband's widow will be the highest benefit you will be entitled to, then claiming your personal SS benefit at age 62 may be a prudent strategy. It

allows you to collect your own benefit earlier (albeit reduced) until your higher survivor benefit kicks in to replace the smaller amount. However, your plans for working prior to your full retirement age are key to deciding if you should claim benefits earlier. If you exceed the earnings limit (\$18,960 for

2021), SS will take away some of your benefits, which could mean you go without benefits until they recover what you owe. Indeed, if your earnings are high enough, you may find that you would get no SS benefits because the amount you owe for exceeding the earnings limit would completely offset your Social Security benefit.

So, as you can see, if you are working with a high income, the earnings limit might imply that waiting until your FRA to claim any SS benefit is the smartest move. But if you don't work after you claim SS then taking your own benefit early and later switching to your higher widow's benefit at or after your FRA would be a sound choice.

When I Was A Kid Part Four

Coming from a large family during the war years, there was no such thing as an "allowance". I do not recall ever getting one as a youngster. Which meant that in order to have any "spending" money, you had to go out and earn it? Back then and maybe even now if you wanted a paper route, you had to be twelve years old. I did get one as soon as I reached that sought after age. What happens before age twelve? There were a number of things that would bring revenue into the pockets of young entrepreneurs.

In the summer it would be either collecting old newspapers for recycling or delivering groceries for elderly women. I would go out on garbage day and accumulate old newspapers that people left at the curb. Then when the "ragman" came around in his horse drawn wagon, I would sell it to him and make a few pennies. Grocery delivery was a bit easier. My wood wagon was my money maker. I used that to collect the newspapers with it. During the day, weather permitting I would walk over to the A&P on Grant Street and wait outside for women who needed help in getting their groceries home. These were war years and there was a lack of men for the more simple chores.

Since cars were scarce, the mode of transportation

was mostly on foot. It was often that the older women had to struggle to carry their groceries home after doing their shopping. Not if we could help them. With our trusty wagon we would load the bags of groceries and proceed to walk home with them and unload the items into their homes. I use the term we as one would expect there were usually a number of us lined up and waiting and ready to go. This usually gave us enough revenue to do the things we wanted as a kid. Like movies, soda pop and candy bars.

In those days everything was free admission, the Zoo, Museum, Historical building, etc. The only thing that was not free was the movies. It was cheap but you still had to pay. Movie theatres were everywhere. I could walk to three in under ten minutes. Another three theatres within fifteen minutes to a half hour away. I lived on Fargo and Massachusetts on the west side. Two blocks away was the "Senate" On West and Rhode Island. The "Victoria" theatre was on Grant and Ferry and the "Rialto" was down the street. We also had the "Elmwood", the "Niagara", and the "Ellen Terry" within extended walking distance. Plenty of movie theatres with lots of movies to see. This was before television so it was the favorite form of entertainment. One thing they

did was show serials every week in order to get you to come back. At the end of the episode the Hero or heroine would be in peril, like tied to a railroad track with the train coming. You had to go back the next week to see how they escaped. They also gave out free dishes to encourage attendance to their theatre. My mom got a whole set.

One thing that I remember as a kid that is not so pleasant. When a member of the family passed, they were laid out in the home. That's right; the body would lie in state in the front room of the house for three days. I do not know what the procedure was but I know the person was prepared to last the three days for viewing. Whether they took them away and prepared them and returned them in the coffin I was too young to know. Imagine if you would the remains of a loved one laying in the front room of your house. Friends and relatives would come over to offer their condolences. Usually they had cookies or snacks for visitors. You had to cook and eat in the same house that a mother or father or relative was lying in state. Then go to bed in that same house and expect to go to sleep. The home reeked with the smell of flowers. Flowers have a pleasant odor but when there is a lot the fragrance is overwhelming. Almost nauseating. If this sounds like something out of a horror movie, it is not. It was the way things were done and accepted and lived with.

Like I have stated before, some things are much better now than they were back then. In this case it seems the more humane thing is to take the deceased person away. Funeral homes have taken over. That is a good thing.

Then again going to the movies three times a week was fun and to be able to buy a large Hersey bar for a nickel and sometimes even being able to afford a Coke. Did not get much better than that.

Continued from page one. Roosevelt was sworn in at the Wilcox Mansion as the nation's twenty-sixth President.

Once heavily-forested frontier, the region changed as the Erie Canal brought prosperity and made the Niagara Frontier one of the largest shipping and rail centers in the country. Erie County is home to numerous inventors and inventions such as the Ball Jar, Barca Lounger and air conditioning all originated in Buffalo. Wilson Greatbatch developed the implantable pacemaker in Clarence, and Bell Aircraft was one of the nation's largest suppliers of aircraft during WW II. Erie County boasts many major works by both local and national architects including Frank Lloyd Wright, Louis Sullivan, H.H. Richardson, E.B. Green, William Wicks, and Louise Bethune. Famous writers like F. Scott Fitzgerald, Mark Twain and Lauren Belfer have all called the area "home". Erie County has also given the world Fisher-Price toys and the chicken wing.

Erie County, in collaboration with numerous partners, is preparing to celebrate its bicentennial

with a year of programs, self-guided and group tours, musical performances, museum exhibits and much more. Over two hundred partners and volunteers from across the county are taking part in the bicentennial observation, EC200, which will kick off on April 2 (the 200th anniversary of Erie County's recognition as a county) and will continue for a full year, through April 2022.

Planning for EC200 began almost two years ago with an organizational effort that included the County Executive's office along with Executive Director of the Buffalo History Museum Melissa Brown, Erie County Historian Douglas Kohler, and a few dozen local historical, cultural, and community stakeholders. The group has since grown to include hundreds of volunteers working on programming, marketing, inclusion and outreach for the year-long bicentennial celebration. Committee work is focused on Education, Programming, Marketing, Media/Social Media, and Diversity and Inclusion.

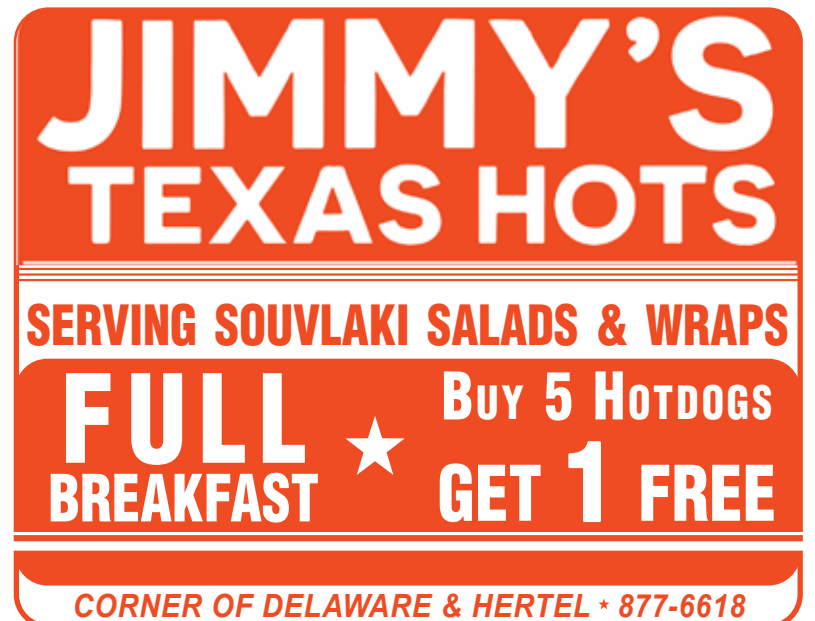
