impacting the City of Buffalo and municipalities across the U.S.," Mayor Byron W. Brown said.



Coach Jim Daley's status in the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League has grown. Ever since his daughter and son both played in the North Buffalo League, Daley has latched on to this Baseball and Softball empire in Shoshone Park long after both have left the program.

A few years ago, Daley was asked to become the League's Travel Director for Boys for ages eight to eighteen. Battling a Pandemic virus that cancelled a season, he managed to put in place the types of boys who would represent North Buffalo well on the diamonds of Shoshone and other Parks against Leagues like Lou Gehrig in Amherst.

Last season, the youngest Travel team at eight and under in this 65 year old League, made up of North Buffalo boys, won a Babe Ruth State Championship for the first time, ever since the League came into existence back in 1957. An impressive accomplishment for boys always hungry to play the game with love

from their hearts. The team finished the season with an overall 26-15 record and gave the Park a great beginning for future game victo-

Players on the team included all boys who had signed up to play last season, the first year back from the 2020 cancellation. Among the thousand that had registered last year, the most in the League's history, 17 were chosen by Daley and two other coaches, to represent North Buffalo in 8u competition. They were: Bennett Armstrong, Brady Roberts, Brayden Westfield, Brody Huard, Christian Cipolla, Cole Shatzel, Colin Poppenberg,

Connor Gunnarson, Connor Smith, Dominic Sabia. Rhoney, George Hunter Gallagher, Jack Kleeh, Leo Scott, Lucas Adamczck-Turkovich, Maddox Beale and Patrick Lea-Kelly.

An amazing roster made up of players from the Double AA Division of House Baseball teams like the Brewers, Cardinals, Dodgers, Marlins and Pirates. Three players, Hunter Gallagher, Leo Scott and Connor Smith played in the lower Rookie Boys Division last season but met the challenge for the Travel

This past Sunday, after attending the Buffalo Sabres hockey game against the Los Angeles Kings, the team gathered at Coles Restaurant on Elmwood Avenue for dinner and a special presentation. Some hadn't seen each other since last season but the memories were fresh from the Summer where they hoisted a Championship trophy for North Buffalo.

But Sunday, a special green and gold banner was hoisted to the ceiling of the infamous West Side Restaurant for all to see the accomplishments of these young boys last season. All the players names were printed on the huge sign that will now hang along with the many others that adorn this family Sports bar, long in the tradition of recognizing

and honoring youth sports.
"It's our pleasure to do this for this team of great boys who gave their all last season," said Michael Shatzel, an assistant coach for the team and owner of Coles Restaurant. "We've done this for others in many sports in Muny, Randy Smith, Police Athletic League or Catholic Schools in the past. There's no reason North Buffalo couldn't be included.'

Manager Jim Daley is most proud of this team and a major reason why Hertel North Park has grown in these recent years. With 65 house teams last Summer and Travel programs for both boys and girls softball teams at almost all age levels, the League is looking forward to this new season.

Currently there are over 600 boys and girls registered to play thus far. That's a great start for a season due to begin on Saturday, May 7. The League is working on finding umpires for house and travel games, politely asking area businesses to sponsor a boys or girls team and refining its league rules for all games played at Shoshone. After Friday March 12, there are only 57 days left until Opening Day. There's no lock-outs in Little League Baseball.

Ask Rusty – Please Help Us With Social Security Planning

Dear Rusty: Would you please advise on my wife and my Social Security planning? I'm 69 & 2 months, my wife is 66 & 2 months, so we both hit full retirement age. We both plan on starting to take SS next month. My benefit would be about \$3,300 per month, and my wife's benefit would be about \$1,900

per month. Spousal benefits confuse me. Should I start Social Security now so my wife can get a spousal benefit from me? Is that even possible? Or is it better for each of us to get our own? Signed: Uncertain

Dear Uncertain: From what you've shared, it doesn't appear that your wife will be entitled to a

spousal benefit because her own benefit at her full retirement age (FRA) is more than half of your FRA benefit amount. If your age 69 benefit is about \$3300, then your FRA (age 66) benefit amount was about \$2660). Half of your FRA amount (\$1330) is less than your wife's FRA amount (\$1900), so no spousal benefit will be available to your wife.

In your specific circumstance, both you and your wife should consider your individual objectives in deciding when to claim Social Security. If you plan to claim next month at age 69, you will get a benefit that has increased by about 26% due to the Delayed Retirement Credits (DRCs) you've earned since you reached your FRA of 66. Claiming at her FRA, your wife will get the full SS retirement benefit she has earned from a lifetime of working.

Although your current strategy is a good one because you were born before 1954 and haven't yet filed, you have another option. If your wife claims her SS first, you will be eligible to file a "Restricted Application for Spousal Benefits Only." You could use the restricted application to collect a spouse benefit from your wife (half of her FRA benefit amount) while al-

lowing your personal benefit to grow for another nine months to the maximum at age 70.

If financially feasible and your longevity suggests, both you and your wife might consider waiting even longer to get a higher benefit, but that is a personal choice that you each need to make. Claiming now at age 69 will reduce your payment by about 6% from your age 70 maximum. Since your wife isn't eligible for a spouse benefit but has reached her FRA, she might also consider delaying a bit longer if her financial needs and her estimated longevity suggest that is wise.

Malgorzata Sztolff, niece of Father Walter Grabowski and Polish baker Waldemar Jaszczur show people back in Buffalo how their donations were used to buy food, medical supplies, and clothing for Ukrainians.

Poland has become the global epicenter of transporting donations, money, and supplies to Ukraine. It is now estimated there are 1.5 million Ukrainian refugees and climbing. Many in Western New York with direct contacts in Eastern Europe send donations and money to those they know in Poland, who in turn drive them across the Ukrainian border.

Father Walter Grabowski, Pastor at Saint Gabriel's Roman Catholic Church in Elma, New York, came to America in 1983. Following the Russian invasion of Ukraine and a mere minutes before a recent Mass, he felt compelled to make a personal plea to parishioners: I have friends and family in Poland, please be generous to the Ukrainian people, we can help them from right here in Elma, New York.

Many of the 5,715 people in the tight-knit church community responded with an outpouring of donations for suffering Ukrainians, with thousands of dollars

already in the hands of refugees.

The response was overwhelming. People even ran to their cars in the parking lot to empty their consoles with whatever money they had. The result: The faith filled of this Catholic community in Elma donated thousands of dollars per day. On Wednesday, March 2nd, 2022, Fr. Grabowski wired the first round of donations to his niece in Przemy□l, Poland. The total amount is now \$23,503 and climbing.

Father Grabowski chronicled the generous efforts in the latest church bulletin, and are encouraging parishioners to view their efforts on the Parish Facebook page. Fr. Grabowski is posting photos from Poland and Ükraine, giving people a direct view of how their donations are helping Ukrainian refugees. The use of Facebook to show photos of how resources are spent also gives donors peace of mind knowing their support is going straight to Ükraini-

ans. "The Angels of Saint Gabriel" logo is placed on the photos of volunteers delivering medical supplies, food, and clothing directly across the border to Ukrai-

"I always knew that St. Gabriel's parishioners are very generous and caring. "You are awesome, you are terrific, you are the best, and I am proud and hon-ored to be your Pastor. I love you, my people, I love my parish, I love all of you because, when tragedy strikes, you always respond with love," wrote Father Grabowski in the Sunday, March 6th, church bulletin.


