Talk to any girl or boy playing baseball or softball in the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League and they'll tell you. Saturdays are the best day of them all.

Kids can't wait to get to Shoshone Park on a Saturday, especially if the sun is out and it feels like a Spring Day. Their coach may want them there 30 minutes to game time, but some get there earlier to meet friends, or get a hot dog or candy before the game.

This past Saturday, games began playing on diamond #5, reserved for boys ages 13-15. It's a Senior Division of high school players who will battle it out on a 90 foot diamond. The teams include the Athletics, Diamondbacks, Dodgers, Mariners, Mets, Phillies, Pirates and Tigers. They play seven innings and you're sure to see some

fine plays made around the diamond and big hits at the plate. Most, if not all the guys are graduates of the little league house program, where they have learned the game since t-ball.

Soon, another Division will start for Senior Girls, ages 13-16. Those teams are Athletics, Blue Jays, Pirates and Yankees. That brings the total number of competitive house Divisions to nine. Then of course there's boys and girls travel. The boys are nicknamed the Blaze and the girls are Wild Cats. Add your boys and girls t-ball teams on Diamond 8 into it and you'll soon discover that 1,100 boys and girls are playing in North Buffalo, most of them in Shoshone Park.

This column is meant to highlight certain games during the past week of boys and girls who the coach feels have helped the team win either at the plate or in the field. Every attempt is made to talk to the coaches and possibly the players. The final score is recorded and the entire league can see your win or loss in the standings. At no time is a certain boy or girl or a team highlighted on a regular basis. No favoritism will be shown.

In Rookie Girls, Nora Ryan doubled in teammates Abigail Cannon and Morgan Warham in the bottom of the sixth inning to lead the Angels to a come from behind, 5-4 victory over the Diamonds last Saturday afternoon. It was the Angels fifth win in the young season after losing their first game to a tough Stars team. Jubilation exploded around the plate as the entire team welcomed both girls home. The Rebels got by the Ravens and the Stars defeated the Devils.

In Rookie Boys, the Athletics are undefeated after seven games and look unstoppable. But look out for the Red Sox and possibly the Twins. After losing their first two games, the Twins have won five in a row, including a 2-1 win over the Red Sox last friday night that included an unassisted triple play made at first base by David Hannon. The Orioles shut out the Blue Jays. The Angels topped the Rays and the Indians beat the Yankees.

Steven Kyser made the defensive play of the game at shortstop to end a Braves victory over the Nationals, 11-7 with a fine double play. The Cardinals beat the Mets. The Giants shut out the Padres and the Cubs defeated the Dodgers in Major boys.

In new Senior Boys action, Derek Gottler struck out 11 Mariners over four innings and teammate Jonathan Rodriguez pitched two innings of shutout ball to help the Tigers win their first game, 10-0. The A's exploded on the Mets and the Diamondbacks shutout the defending Champ Phillies.

Ask Rusty – I'm A Widower With 3 Minor Children – What About Social Security?

Dear Rusty: My wife passed away a few days ago and I have three children – ages 15, 11, and 10. Is there anything I need to do? Signed: Suddenly Widowed

Dear Suddenly Widowed: We are so sorry to hear of your wife's passing; please accept our condolences for your loss. Here's what you need to know about Social Security:

rity:
 Your wife's minor children will all be eligible for a survivor benefit, which will be based upon the Social Security benefit amount your wife had earned up to the month she died. The children can collect their survivor benefit until they are 18 years old (or 19 if they are still in high school).

• The standard minor child benefit amount is 75% of your wife's "primary insurance amount" (or PIA, which is the ben-

efit she had earned until she died) but, since there will be three children collecting, the Family Maximum will apply. The Family Maximum limits total survivor benefits to between 150% and 180% of your wife's PIA. Typically, with 3 survivors, the Family Maximum should come out to about 175% of your wife's PIA. Social Security will determine these numbers when you apply for benefits for the children, which you should do by calling 1.800.772.1213, or making an appointment at your local SS field office (find it at www.ssa.gov/locator). The funeral home which handled your wife's arrangements will send a copy of her death certificate to Social Security, but SS will probably require you to provide each child's Social Security number and birth certificate, and you may also need to provide

your wife's death certificate if they ask for it. As each child becomes age-ineligible for minor child benefits, the benefit for each remaining minor child will automatically increase, up to their maximum 75% of your wife's PIA.

• Because your children are minors, you will need to act as their Representative Payee. Social Security will guide you through that when you contact them to apply for benefits for the children, but it essentially means that their benefits will be paid directly to you and you will be obligated to use that money on behalf of the children. You can review Social Securi-

ty's Representative Payee rules at this link: www. ssa.gov/payee/

• Regardless of your age, as your wife's surviving spouse with minor children you could be eligible for a "child in care" surviving spouse benefit until the youngest child is 16, but you should be aware of the following:

If you are working full time, you probably will be ineligible for child-in-care spouse benefits because of your earnings. Social Security imposes an earnings limit for those collecting early spousal or survivor benefits.

If you are eligible for child-in-care benefits and collect the same, it would detract from the benefit amount each of your children will get because of the Family Maximum discussed above. In other words, the Family Maximum amount (which Social Security will determine based on your wife's PIA) is the total amount that can be paid out on your wife's record, regardless of how many survivors are collecting.

As your wife's spouse, you will also be entitled to a one-time lump sum death benefit of \$255, which you can request when you speak with Social Security. Once again, please accept our condolences on the loss of your wife. I hope the above information is helpful at this difficult time.



School #18, West Side, Buffalo

"Where Niagara's shining waters, roll majestically, stands 18, our alma mater, glorious to see, proudly every son and daughter, views her spacious halls, straight and true and firm-ly founded, rise her sheltering walls."

Part of our alma mater song at good old school eighteen on Hampshire Street on the West Side of Buffalo. Written by one of the teachers. My gram-

mar school for nine years and like all, we remember good and bad days in grade school. Lots of good friends, like Joe Pandolphino who recently passed. Better known for his Christmas decorated house on Colvin which every North Buffalo resident knew of. And there were bad days, like being bullied and some really mean teachers.

I have told this story before but want to add a

different finish. My fifthgrade teacher was an older woman and a spinster. She walked to work every day from wherever she lived. Found out later and I do not remember how it is that she wore woolen underwear to walk to work. All the teachers back then wore dresses, no slacks, no long pants at all. So, in her walk to keep warm, she wore wool. Now wood in those days was scratchy and could be uncomfortable. When she arrived at her classroom she would proceed to the back of the room to her locker and change her underpants from wool to cotton. Which was much more comfortable. Lifted her dress, dropped her wool drawers, and pulled up her cotton ones,

Most of the class did as directed and faced front. All but one mischievous bov who chose to watch. He paid for the show (which was not worth it) as it infuriated her, and she retaliated. The boy was me and being late and being in an extremely bad mood she

came up to me and gave me a big slap in the face. Enough to make my nose bleed profusely. All over the place, my shirt, my desk, my books, it was one big mess. In today's world she would have been in big trouble. Not back then as I received a sizable number of slaps from different teachers. Not that I was bad, just bad enough. Still, some of the slappers liked

So, I was a bloody mess and needed to go home and change. We were quite poor at the time, and I did not have a second clean shirt. My mother had to wash it and no dryer, so I did not return to school that day. The teacher did stop at our house on her way home to see if I was ok. My mom was non-confrontational and did not want to see her, but my dad did. They chatted nicely as he was also a non-combative type. Seems I was the only one upset with her and what she did to me.

Like I said I had written before about this incident with a little more to it. This time I wanted to add my revenge. Probably the worst thing I did as a kid, but I got satisfaction out of it. One night me and a friend were walking down Hampshire across the

street from good old school eighteen. There it was with all these glass windows addressing the street we were on. There on the second floor was my fifthgrade teacher's room. The underwear changer, the slapper, the not nice person. I stood there like any ten-year-old would do and shouted at the room and called her a few names. I then proceeded to pick up a rock and toss it through one of the windows in her room, then ran like hell. Waited a while and went back and broke four more, just in her room.

The next morning the class had to go to the library to meet as they had to clean up the glass and fix the windows. The teacher knew who did it and so did most of the class. She could say nothing as it would have all came out about the beating. She did not want that so all she could do was simmer as I sat there with a smirk on my face. Bet she wanted to give me another couple of slaps. Sometimes revenge is so sweet. I certainly do not condone what I did. I was ten years old and an adolescent not knowing any better. However, it sure was fun and no one got hurt.


