



"I've just tried to be the best teammate I could possibly be whenever I've played to get a win wherever I've played."

Those were the words of Nardin Academy pitcher Julianna Verni Monafternoon when dav asked how she felt about being named again to the All-Western New York Girls High School Soft-ball Team. The eighteen year old Senior was selected to the All-State first team in Class A for the second year in a row after leading the Gators from the mound of Catholic School play. This fall, she will attend Division I School Purdue University in Indiana to continue her stellar pitching career with the Boilermakers in the Big-Ten Division.

"It's an honorable feeling," she continued, "having my story be recognized by this Community in North Buffalo. The Sport has really grown these last couple of years. It's up and coming and I'm just grateful to everyone who has helped me reach this level."

A North Buffalo resident, she became a standout player on the diamonds of Shoshone Park, playing in the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball and Softball League. She learned the game in the same Park that her father, Dominic did when he was a young boy, growing up in the early 1980's. She had some fine volunteer coaches along the way which led her to the Girls Wildcat Travel Program. Her father has been with her all the way. "I can't say enough

about some of the coaches that I had in Shoshone Park besides my father," she recalled. "A few of them were instrumental in my development as a player. Kelly and her husband Sean Kilonsky stand out right away. Trey Gardner was very caring and listened. Tim Robertson and even Joan Cavanaugh, who herself was a star player and was helping her daughter, Erin in the process."

But it wasn't as easy for Julianna as one would think. In June of 2018, she walked across the stage as a graduate of St. Mark's School on Woodward Avenue. In the fall, she attended Nardin Academy and was already thinking softball in the Spring. But in February of 2019, while playing indoors, she felt a pop in her lower torso while delivering a pitch and became uncomfortable afterward. After meeting with several doctors and orthopedic surgeons, it was soon discovered that she had suffered a stress fracture in her lower back and would need physical therapy to help strengthen her vertebrae.

After a grueling six months, Verni felt better enough to play but then COVID-19 hit and 2020 was a year to forget. By 2021, Verni was the Monsignor Martin High School Athletic Association's Pitcher of the Year and had 89 strikeouts and limited opposing hitters to a .135 batting average in 44 innings. A three year starter, she drove in 25 runs, belted four home runs and had a .475 onbase percentage as she helped the Gators reach the Monsignor Martin Championship game.

Presently as she prepares to leave for Indiana next month, she meets with up several young girls here and across the U.S. for individual pitching clinics, giving back to the sport she has grown to love.

North Buffalo July 4, 2022

Kearns Calls On Purple Heart Recipients To Be Honored

Erie County Clerk Michael P. Kearns will again honor veterans that have been bestowed the Purple Heart by adding their name to the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit. Kearns is asking veterans who were awarded the Purple Heart or their surviving family members to submit their request to his office by July 29th in order to be added to the 2022 edition and be part of this year's ceremony.

Purple Heart veterans or their families must complete a short application that can be obtained online at erie.gov/clerk/PurpleHeartForm or by email at salutes@erie.gov as well as provide proof the award was issued. Those with additional questions can call the Erie County Clerk's office at 716-858-6787.

"I think it is important to honor the brave men and women who have served and sacrificed for our Country. They deserve to be recognized and I am pleased we are able to maintain a record of our local heroes at the Erie County Clerk's Office", stated Kearns.

The 2021 volume of the

William J. Donovan Purple Heart Book of Merit is on display at the Erie County Clerk's Office in Old County Hall located at 92 Franklin Street, Buffalo. It presently holds five hundred three (503) names of those honored with the Purple Heart from Erie County.

Kearns established the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit in 2018 and has committed to add to the book each year with new recipients. The book is named after Buffalo native and leading advocate for the Central Intelligence Agency, William J. Donovan. Donovan would receive three Purple Hearts during his service in the military, and would go on to heard the predecessor of the CIA, during World War II.

The Purple Heart is the oldest military decoration awarded to members of the United States military who were wounded or killed while serving, on or after April 5, 1917. Kearns will also honor Purple Heart veterans during a ceremony on Friday, August 5th and more details will be available closer to the event date.

Ask Rusty – I'm Getting Spouse **Benefits – What Happens to My Own?**

Dear Rusty: I was born in late 1951. When I retired 5 years ago, I was made aware that my own Social Security benefit was less than half of my husband's SS Benefit. So, I chose to take half of his. What happens to my undispensed SS dollars? On the off chance the balance increases beyond the amount I am now collecting, can I eventually switch to my own full SS amount? Signed: Curious Senior

Dear Curious Se*nior:* Much depends on exactly how you claimed your SS benefits five years ago and your age when you claimed. Because you were born in 1951, if you had reached your full retirement age (FRA) of 66 when you claimed SS five years ago and your husband was already collecting his benefits, you had the option to file a "restrict-ed application for spousal benefits only" which would have enabled you to collect only your spouse benefit while letting your own benefit continue to grow. But if you were not yet 66 when you claimed, the FREE PIZZA: Angela Piraino, 247 Commonwealth Ave., 14216

"restricted application" wasn't available to you, so you are now receiving your own benefit plus an additional amount to bring your payment to your spousal amount.

I expect that the latter is the case (that you didn't file a "restricted application"), which would mean that your current payment amount consists of two parts - your personal benefit (from your own lifetime work record) plus a "spousal boost" to bring your payment to your spousal entitlement. Except for the restricted application, Social Security always pays your own benefit amount first and then supplements your own benefit with an additional amount to give you what you're entitled to as a spouse. Thus, your personal benefits aren't "undispensed" – you're already getting them, plus a spousal supplement.

Just to complete the picture, if you did file a "restricted application" at age 66, then your own benefit continued to grow until you were 70 (at which point it reached

maximum). The growth amount would have been 8% per year addition-al benefit, so at age 70 your own benefit would have been 32% more than your FRA amount. If you know what your own FRA benefit amount was, then increase that by 32% to see if your own amount is now higher and, if so, contact Social Security to apply for your own higher benefit.

If you don't know what your personal FRA amount was and/or are uncertain if you filed a restricted application, you'll need to contact Social Security directly to see if you're entitled to any additional amount based on your own lifetime work record. You can contact Social Security at either the national center (1.800.772.1213) or at your local office (find the number at www.ssa. gov/locator). If you are currently getting spouse benefits only under a restricted application and your personal benefit is now higher, since you'll soon be 71 you should request six months of retroactive benefits when you switch from the restricted application to your own benefit.



I Seen It Happen

One of the obvious things about growing old is that you see so many changes in the immediate world around you. I can go back over 50 years and recall how things were then and even before. One of the fortunate people who still has a memory. Not like it used to be but still have vivid recollections of the past. Started writing my memoirs before it was too late, and things are still fresh in my mind.

One of the things that have stimulated my reminiscing is the Buffalo Rocket archives on Facebook. To see pictures of people who I dealt with and knew who are no longer with us. How they looked back then. Back in the beginning 1969, It was just me who went up and down Hertel and Delaware selling ads for my newly formed weekly, the North Buffalo Rocket. Went in every business big or small with good and sometimes bad results. Had enough good people to make it work and it did.

Met so many people and some even became good friends with me and my family. North Buffalo was great.

Born and raised on the West Side, North Buffalo, or North Park as it was called then, was like a foreign country to me. Raising eight kids before going into business, I used to do anything to make a dollar. Landscaping, driving an ice cream truck, and even wallpaper hanging. My dad had taught me as he used to also do it. My customers for this just happened to be in North Park. My first exposure to the north. As expected in the sixties the area was Jewish and so were my wallpaper customers.

When I bought the building on Tacoma my first intentions were to convert it into four apartments and rent it out. Due to local laws, I could not do that. Decided to move my basement print shop into the storefront and the rest is history. My story here is

the transition of the neighborhood. As I mentioned, the area was mostly Jewish residents and businesses. Being from the West Side I had little or no exposure to our Jewish brother. Maybe I did as we never asked who anyone was. After WWII we were all just Americans. No bias, you were what you were, and no one seemed to care. It was not till I started my business in North Park did I realize I was in the Jewish part of Buffalo. There were synagogues all over the place. However, the transition had started.

Better than half the merchants that I called on were Jewish. The Bunises at the Sample, Sunshines, Marvin Gross the Cleaners. Up and down the street. But now there were new people moving in. My goombahs from the West Side. Sam-my's, Passanisi, Vezos to name a few. It soon became at least 50/50. Even the residential areas became full of Italian Americans. Some of my friends from the old neighborhood. As more of the Jewish population moved out to Amherst more Italians moved in. Soon all North Park was North Buffalo, and the politicians were all Italians. North Buffalo slowly became little Italy. We even had the Italian Festival move from the West Side to good old North Buffalo.

Now how much more Italian can you get?

Like I said in the beginning I was here to see it all happen. The transition from one ethnic group to another. Did not happen overnight. It took many years. Back when there were no Italian restaurants and few pizzerias. The stores were huge like the Sample and North Park Furniture, and Mendelson's Furniture gallery. It was a neighborhood for the affluent and well to do. Yet it was changing. It was fun to watch as I was here to see it. Met so many good people, helpful people, who advised me through the murky waters of entrepreneurship. I had no clue as to what I was doing but was doing it anyway.

Yes, the neighborhood has changed. It is different than it was 50 years ago, but you can say that about any locality. Time changes everything. People change, things change, businesses come and go. And the bad part is all those good people I worked and ate with are now gone. One of the downsides of growing old. You lose those who have become close to you. You attend more wakes than weddings. Just be thankful if you still have the memories. Precious memories, there is nothing better than reliving a happy moment of the past.




