The YMCA Turkey Trot is a time-honored Thanksgiving Day tradition. The oldest consecutively run footrace in the world, the YMCA Turkey Trot is an 8k race that attracts 14,000 runners and walkers annu-

ally. Proceeds raised help fund vital YMCA programs and services that empower youth, improve community health, and provide support to our community's most vulnerable.

Javier Rosa remembers. ship again in Shoshone Park by knocking off

Back in 2014, he coached his 11 year old son's Cubs team to a Major Boys Championship victory in the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League. His son, Javier Jr. and a dozen more boys were a team of destiny that season and is still remembered to this day.



Last week, that memory was replaced when his team, a Rookie Boys Orioles squad of 12 young boys, ages six and seven won a house Champion-

ship again in Shoshone Park by shocking off the number one cede Athletics team, 14-0 in an offensive burst like no other. The orange and black uniformed O's defeated a team that hadn't lost a game in the regular season.

"It was amazing," said Javier Rosa Sr. afterward. "What these boys did this year was truly amazing. They listened, they learned the game and played well. Everyone of them. I am so proud."

His grandson, Jayce Ernest was one of the reasons the Orioles became so dominant in the playoffs. He and teammates Evan Scott, Carter Tronolone and Paul Harold Jr, were the heart of the Orioles batting order that led the team at the plate. Defensively, Ernest and his left arm was like a cannon, throwing out runners at first base. The team finished the regular season in third place with eight wins and just three losses but in the playoffs, the birds won four straight games, including two wins over the A's.

"We tried to teach them 'old school baseball'", said Rosa, "you know, like the old days. Just the basics. If they made mistakes, we didn't let them get their heads down. It wasn't the end of the World."

But in four straight games, beginning on July 9th and 13th, 23rd and 30th, they took care of the Baseball and won it in front of all their family and friends. They topped the Angels in the first round and then met the Royals before two meetings with the A's.

Rosa credits all the parents of the boys who have been with him since day one. "Anything we asked for all of our boys, they were there for us in support of them. I can't thank them enough."

Besides Ernest, Scott, Harrod Jr and Tronolone, other players include Tommy Amar, Charlie Koehn, Tommy Bowling, Enzo Cicero, Jack Denny, Trey Laconte, Messiah Robbins, Gwil Brick and Michael Anderson III.

After the game, red, white and blue medallions were presented to the Athletics before the Orioles received their winning trophies at home plate.

Ask Rusty - What Are My Wife’s Benefits While I’m Living & as My Widow?

Dear Rusty: I will be 70 in January and my wife will be 65 in February, at which time we will both go on Medicare. I am currently working, and my approximate Social Security benefit will be around \$2,900. My wife was a stay-at-home mom and, therefore, has minimal Social Security benefits on her own. At 65 she is eligible for \$870 and at full retirement age will qualify for \$990. A few questions: if she starts to draw benefits at 65, what would be her total spousal benefit? If she waited until her full retirement age, what would the amount be? Of greater concern, what would be her survivor benefit given the same criteria as mentioned above. **Signed: Planning Ahead**

Dear Planning Ahead: Based on the Social Security amounts in your email, your wife is eligible for a spousal benefit while you are both living. Her spouse benefit when she claims will consist of her own Social Security retirement benefit plus a spousal boost to bring her payment to her spousal entitlement. Spouse benefits are computed using full retirement age (FRA)

benefit amounts, so if your age 70 benefit is “around \$2900” then your FRA (age 66) benefit amount (known as your “primary insurance amount”) should be around \$2,225. Your wife’s base spousal boost would be the difference between her FRA amount and 50% of your FRA amount, so her total benefit, if taken at her full retirement age, would be about \$1,112 (her \$990 plus a \$122 spousal boost). But taken at age 65, both her own benefit and her spousal boost would be reduced. At age 65 your wife’s total benefit would be around \$963 (her own \$870 plus a reduced spousal boost of about \$93).

Regarding your wife’s survivor benefit as your widow, if she has reached her full retirement age (66 years and 8 months), at your death she would get the same amount you were getting when you died – the \$2,900 you will get by claiming at age 70. Your wife’s survivor benefit as your widow will replace the smaller spousal amount she was receiving while you were both living. Since your wife will be already collecting a spousal benefit from you, if she

has reached her FRA when you pass your wife will be automatically awarded her survivor benefit at that time. If she hasn’t yet reached her FRA when you pass, the spousal portion of her benefit will stop but she can request a reduced survivor benefit early. In that case her early survivor benefit will be actuarially reduced by .396% for each month before her FRA it is claimed. If you were to die in the month your wife turns 65, her early survivor benefit would be about \$2668.

One final thought about Medicare: if you continue to work and have “creditable” healthcare coverage from your employer, you can defer enrolling in Medicare Part B (coverage for outpatient services), thus avoiding the Part B premium until you stop working. If your wife is covered under your “creditable” employer healthcare plan, she can also defer enrolling in Medicare Part B until that coverage ends (“creditable” is a group plan with at least 20 participants). However, enrolling in Medicare Part A (coverage for inpatient hospitalization services), for which there is no premium, is mandatory to collect Social Security after age 65.

Tribute Paid To Purple Heart Recipients During Flag Raising



Erie County Clerk Michael P. Kearns pays tribute to the 2022 Purple Heart Recipients being added to the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Book of Merit that is kept on permanent display in the Erie County Clerk's Office during a Dedication and Flag Raising Ceremony that included honorees, family members, area veterans, and the Military Order of the Purple Heart, Chapters 187 and 264.

In honor of Purple Heart Appreciation Day, Erie County Clerk Michael P. Kearns recognized Erie County Purple Heart Recipients being added to the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Book of Merit for 2022. No formal record of Purple Heart Recipients in Erie County existed prior to 2018 when Kearns originated Erie County's version of the "Book of Merit."

"An estimated 1.8 million service men and women who fought and lost their lives or received life-altering injury protecting our great country and have earned the Purple Heart," stated Kearns. "These selfless individuals come from all walks of life and backgrounds, and more specifically, from all across Erie County. While the majority of veterans do not seek our thanks and praise, I firmly believe we owe them both."

National Purple Heart Day is observed August 7th of each year and dedicated to remembering and honoring the brave men

and women of the United States Armed Forces who were wounded on the battlefield or lost their lives ought in combat operations.

The Purple Heart is a United States military decoration awarded in the name of the president to those wounded or killed while serving, on or after April 5, 1917, with the U.S. military. Originally called the Badge of Military Merit, the Purple Heart was created by George Washington on August 7, 1782. In addition to receiving a purple heart shaped award, the honoree's name and regiment were inscribed in the "Book of Merit" which was lost after the Revolutionary War and the award was largely forgotten until over 100 years later. The Purple Heart is the oldest military decoration still awarded to members of the U.S. military.

"It is my esteemed honor to present the 2022 Purple Heart Recipient Names being added to the

William J. Donovan Purple Heart Book of Merit," said Kearns. "The lack of records on Purple Heart recipients was always a surprise to me. As the chief document and records holder for the county, I wanted to create a way for the names of Purple Heart Recipients to be acknowledged and remembered."

The 2022 volume of the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit will now hold the names of five hundred eighteen (518) Purple Heart Recipients from across Erie County, with the additional fifteen (15) added at today's ceremony.

The book is named after Buffalo native and leading advocate for the Central Intelligence Agency, William J. Donovan. Prior to becoming known as the "Father of American Intelligence", Donovan served in the United States Infantry and was one of the first units deployed to Europe during World War I. Donovan would receive three Purple Hearts during his service in the military, and would go on to heard the predecessor of the CIA, during World War II.

This year's ceremony was held at Old County Hall, home to the Erie County Clerk's Office, in the Ceremonial Court Room, followed by a Purple Heart flag raising observance at the statue of President George Washington. The ceremony began with a welcome from County Clerk Kearns, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by World War II Veteran Dr. John Long, and the National Anthem was performed by local lyricist George Miller. Kearns presented Certificates of Recognition and Purple Heart pins to recipients or their family members as the honoree's names, branch of service, and war was read aloud.

The William J. Donovan Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit will be on permanent display at the Erie County Clerk's Office inside Old County Hall at 92 Franklin Street. Along with the book, there are also historical photos of William Donovan, a portrait of Donovan, and a World War I era Purple Heart with two oak leaf clusters donated to the Clerk's Office. Submissions for the 2023 Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit are currently being accepted online at erie.gov/clerk/purpleheart-form or by contacting the County Clerk's office at 716-858-6787.

Walk For Kidney Health Supports Patient Programs

The Walk for Kidney Health will return to the Buffalo Outer Harbor on Sunday, August 21. The annual event is an opportunity for the community to show support for people with kidney disease, share health information and honor organ donors. The walk is this year’s main fundraiser for the Kidney Foundation of Western New York.

“Kidney disease is common but often invisible,” said Walk Chairperson Christine Stolzenburg. “Our walk brings together individuals and families to show that they’re not facing these challenges alone.”

The Kidney Foundation of Western New York conducts educational programs, offers free screenings and provides support to patients.

Recognizing risks to kidney health, taking preventative steps, and detecting problems early can improve outcomes for people with kidney disease. Awareness and education give people opportunities to slow the progression of kidney disease, explore treatment options and improve their quality of life.

Nearly one in eight Western New York adults have been diagnosed with chronic kidney disease. Many others have undiagnosed kidney problems. A person can lose about 90 percent of kidney function before noticing symptoms, so awareness and medical testing are important for those at increased risk. Someone who reaches kidney failure will require dialysis or a kidney transplant to stay alive.

“A diagnosis of kidney disease can be overwhelming, but we work to help people understand the disease and their options,” said Kidney Foundation Director Jeremy Morlock. “The August 21 event will include a 5K at 8:00 a.m., a one-mile fun walk at 9:30 a.m., outdoor games, health information and a basket raffle. Participation in the walk is free, but advance registration is requested at www.kfwny.org/walk or by calling 716-529-4390. Registration for the timed 5K is \$25.

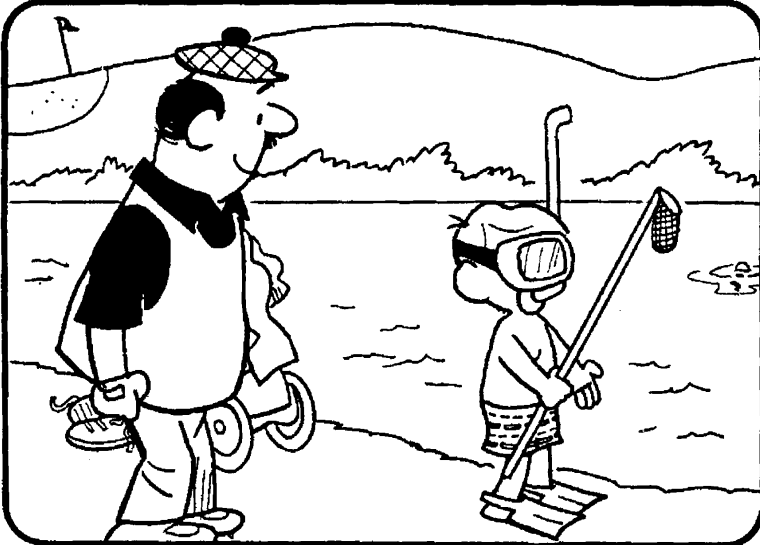

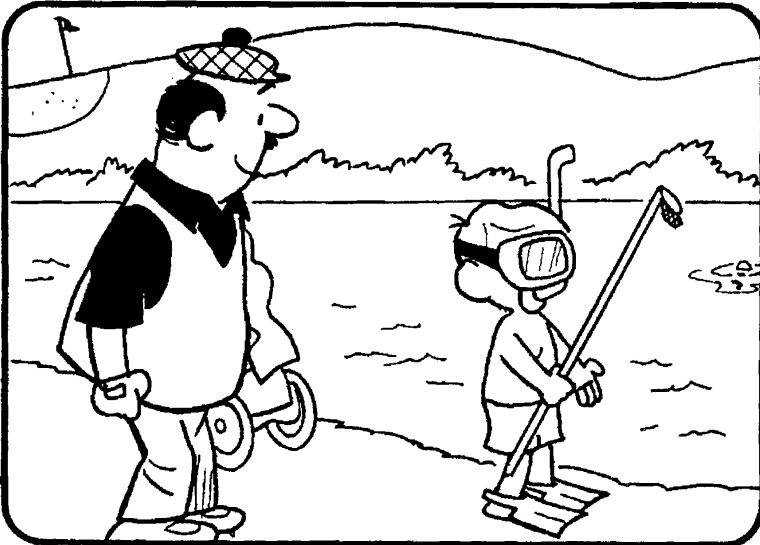

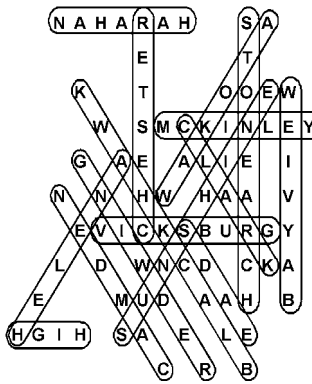
