Heads up! Valentine's Day is right around the corner, taking place on Tuesday, February 14th, 2023.

Valentine's Day occurs every February 14th of each year since 270 AD. Across the United States and in other places around the world, candy, flowers and gifts are exchanged between loved ones, all in the name of St. Valentine. The ancient Roman ritual of Lupercalia welcomed spring to the card-giv-ing customs of Victorian

England. The Catholic Church recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred. The English poet Geoffrey Chaucer was the first to record St. Valentine's Day as a day of romantic celebration in his 1375 poem "Parliament of Foules," writing,
""For this was sent on Seynt Valentyne's day / Whan every foul cometh ther to choose his mate."

Today, according to the Greeting Card Association, an estimated 145 million Valentine's Day cards are sent each year, making Valentine's Day the second largest card-sending holiday of the year (more cards are sent at Christmas).

Let The Wheels Of Justice Turn

Every time a police officer kisses their spouse or kids goodbye when they leave for a shift, they never know whether or not they will ever come home again.

That is a cold, hard fact concerning the challenges law enforcement face to protect and serve communities, whether it be in Buffalo or Memphis. All of us have friends and family that are police officers. No matter how in depth they share with us the challenges they face arresting criminals on the streets and keeping us safe, we can never know the true dangers of being a police officer unless you wear the badge and work in that profession.

Speaking to the Financial Guys Media Network, retired New York City Police Detective Marq Claxton, who now serves as the Director of Public Relations and Political Affairs for the Black Law Enforcement Alliance, bluntly described the brutality that led to Nichols' death at the hands of five Memphis Police Officers.

If the United States of America is to have an honest discussion on law enforcement reform to ensure something like this never happens again, the last thing left-wing political pundits should do is try to fit a square peg in a round hole and ridiculously claim racism is to blame for five African American police officers attacking an African American citizen.

Let us have a frank discussion on how attacks by radical socialists and the awful "defund the police" movement have decimated morale and the ranks of police officers across the country.

According to United States Congressman Clay Higgins, Minneapolis cut its police budget by \$8 million, New York City reduced their police budget by \$1 billion, and the City of Los Angeles enacted cuts to its police department to the tune of \$150 million. A total of 14 cities across the country that are run by Democrats and defunded the police saw a massive spike in homicides and violent crime. Surprise, surprise.

The disturbing trend of defunding the police and the disastrous consequences it brings is still being felt today. Fox News Digital ana-

lyzed data from major U.S. cities run by Democratic mayors, and the information is alarming: violent crime is up in Baltimore, Chicago, Los Angeles, New York City, Philadelphia, Seattle and Washington, D.C.

The ripple effect of the "defund the police" demagogues not only made American streets less safe, it caused a massive spike in officers leaving the profession altogether. According to the New York Times, police retirements increased a whopping 45% in 2021.

According to the New York Post, a record number of NYPD officers, more than 1,500 quit or retired last year.

In order to improve and increase the ranks of the men and women who become police officers, every level of government, local, county, state, and federal, needs to fully fund law enforcement so they have the right staffing, tools, and training to

keep our communities safe. There must be a serious discussion followed by legislative action to scrap socalled bail reform laws that coddle criminals and handcuff cops, prosecutors, and judges. Even in some cases of violent offenses, criminals are arrested and practically back on the streets within minutes, thanks to a revolving door put in place by "bail reform" laws. What incentive is there for police to make arrests, knowing the very same person they have in custody will be right back on the street in no time, committing crime after crime after crime? It is killing morale in the ranks of police.

Èven after arrests are made and police present ample evidence to charge and convict criminals for offenses, some woke, soft on crime District Attorneys refuse to prosecute cases, further damaging morale amongst police.

Add in the stress of defending frivolous lawsuits against police for even the slightest claim of negligence, and you have officers walking on eggshells their entire shift, never wanting to be the next cop on the evening news, the target of a litigious society, or even worse, charged with crimes by left leaning prosecutors who care more about currying favor with socialists

rather than putting criminals behind bars.

The negative consequences for some communities: mass law enforcement retirements, police leaving in droves, and some cities lowering hiring and training standards to fill their depleted ranks.

This is a recipe for disaster.

"Not everyone can be and should be a police officer. We need to enter into the recruitment process understanding that," added Claxton, the retired NYPD Detective.

All of the factors just laid out have led to experienced officers opting to quit and retire, being replaced by younger, inexperienced individuals, who in some cases, do not have what it takes to adequately "protect and to serve." Lowering standards, enacting hiring quotas, and lessening training is a recipe for failure in any industry, more so in law enforcement.

Is racism to blame for some issues within some police departments? Yes, it is.

But to solely blame racism for the death of Tyre Nichols and all problems plaguing police departments, will do absolutely nothing to improve the quality of police officers on the streets. As a matter of fact, it will only make the problem worse, because it's an easy "out" rather than tackling the serious issues that led to challenges in law enforcement over the past two years.

The solution is simple and straightforward: strengthen bail laws, eliminate "no bail" policies that keep criminals on the streets, elect tough as nails prosecutors that do their jobs, fully fund police, increase training for police officers, and never ever lower hiring standards.

Police put their lives on the line to protect us. They command and deserve our respect and appreciation.

If we as citizens attack someone on the street and that beating leads to the death of that individual, we should be held accountable by the long arm of the law and face criminal consequences for our law breaking behavior.

Please do not judge all law enforcement by the actions of those heinous, despicable, reprehensible Memphis Police Officers.

When in the meantime, in addition to thanking police officers every day for the job they do, let us not repeat the mistakes of defunding the police, lowering hiring and training standards, and implementing ill advised quotas in law enforcement, That will only lead to more retirements, more officers quitting, and lowering the standards of who should be wearing a police uniform.

Ask Rusty – Will Social Security Be There for Me?

Dear Rusty: I am a 62-year old Canadian expat who has lived in the U.S. for the last 30-years. I worked in both Canada and the U.S. throughout my career. I came to this country, worked hard and contributed faithfully to the tax base, but I am being cheated for what is rightfully owed to me. Everyone else's Social Security calculation is based on lifetime earnings; mine should be calculated using the same parameters, with the only difference being that some of my earnings were in Canada. I have filed an appeal to that end, but the end result is that I get taken to the cleaners. Why would they intentionally put in place a Totalization scheme with Canada which results in me receiving thousands of dollars per year less than someone who has the same lifetime earnings? This is just wrong and terribly unfair. Is there any legal recourse for me? Signed:

Angry Ex-Pat Dear Angry Ex-Pat: The so-called "Totalization Agreement" between Canada and the U.S. isn't "unfair" - rather it is a way for those who don't independently earn full Social Security eligibility in one country to still get benefits in that country using credits (not earnings) from the other country to gain eligibility. It also allows a citizen of one country to work in another country without paying Social Security taxes in their home country on those foreign earnings. If you have worked in the

U.S. long enough to become eligible for U.S. Social Security on your own U.S. work record, the Totalization Agreement between the U.S. and Canada doesn't apply to you nor affect your U.S. Social Security benefits. Overall, Totalization Agreement is there to help those who work in both countries but aren't fully eligible for benefits. So, it's likely not the Totalization Agreement you take issue with - rather, it is a U.S. Social Security provision called the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP).

WEP reduces the Social Security retirement benefit of anyone who has a pension earned while not contributing to the U.S. Social Security program. That includes those with foreign pensions, as well as retirees with pensions from US employers who do not participate in the US Social Security program, including older US Federal retirees as well as state-retirees from any of the 26 U.S. state governments which have chosen to exempt their employees from paying into the national Social Security program.

Without getting into the details of how the WEP reduction is computed, suffice to say your US Social Security benefit is based only on your earnings from working in the United States but, because you also have a Canadian pension earned without contributing to U.S. Social Security, and you apparently have less than 30 years of U.S. earnings, WEP reduc-

es your U.S. benefit – just as it does for nearly 2 million U.S. citizens who also have a non-covered pension. Legislation for WEP reform (or repeal) has been introduced in just about every U.S. Congress since WEP became law in 1983, but no such reform legislation has ever been enacted. Most in Congress understand that, although the formula isn't perfect, WEP better equalizes benefits paid to all Social Security

recipients, thus helping to fulfill Social Security's original purpose – to mitigate poverty in our elderly population.

Do you have any legal recourse? If you mean recourse that will exempt you from WEP or change the U.S. benefit formula to include both your U.S. and Canadian earnings when computing your US Social Security benefit, I do not believe you do. Many U.S. unions repre-

senting WEP-affected retirees have been wrestling with this issue for decades, to no avail. WEP can only be changed by an act of Congress, and Congress – for nearly 40 years – has been unwilling to change it. So, while I fully understand your frustration and respect your opinion, unfortunately I cannot be optimistic that your current appeal, nor any legal action you might take, will be successful.

Buffalo Arts Studio Presents: "Making Accessible" Community Forum

The community is invited to attend and participate in Making Accessible, a panel discussion centered around accessibility to creative and cultural institutions and experiences. Making Accessible will take place in the Buffalo Arts Studio Community Space at 6:00 pm on Friday, February 24, 2023. Exhibiting artists George Hughes and Jodi Lynn Maracle, along with Savion Mingo, co-founder of D.O.P.E. Collective, and Maria Ta with Frontline Arts Buffalo (FAB) will discuss some of the so-

cial, economic and physical barriers they have experienced as artists.

George Afed-Hughes was born and raised in Ghana and studied painting at The Nkrumah Kwame






