
party on Saturday, February 25.

SPRING INTO SAFETY: Time To Change Your Clocks—And Check Your Smoke Alarms

On Sunday, March 12th (Daylight Saving Time), New Yorkers will set their clocks forward one hour. The Firefighters Association of the State of New York (FASNY) is urging everyone to check their smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors at that time. Homeowners with alarms that have sealed, non-remov-

able batteries should test the alarms to see if they are functional and check their expiration dates. Alarms equipped with removable batteries should have their batteries replaced and then test the

New York State currently leads the nation in home fire deaths, with 36 deaths in the first

two months of 2023. In an emergency, working smoke detectors are a resident's first line of defense and can give people critical time to escape. According to the National Fire Prevention Association (NFPA) three of every five home fire deaths occur in homes without working smoke alarms or Continued on page two.

SPRING INTO SAFETY: Time to Change Your Clocks—And Check Your Smoke Alarms

Continued from page one. in homes lacking smoke alarms.

"The additional time a smoke or CO alarm provides can be the difference between life and death. says FASNY President Edward Tase, Jr. "We encourage everyone to check their smoke and CO alarms monthly to ensure that they are functioning properly. In addition, fire sprinkler systems are proven to save lives and these systems should be installed when possible."

New York State has banned the sale of smoke alarms with removable batteries. This was an important step to increase public safety, but individuals must also be diligent about installing these more user-friendly alarms and ensuring that they are in working order.

There is legislation awaiting introduction for this session that will

allow home life safety products, like smoke detectors, to be tax-exempt. This legislation also includes fire extinguishers, heat, and carbon monoxide alarms purchased for residential use. These devices can mean the difference between life and death, and FASNY supports the elimination of any economic barrier in obtaining these products. The Senate and Assembly should move this legislation without delay.

Smoke Alarm Tips from FASNY and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA):

Test alarms at least once a month by using the test button.

If you have an alarm with a removable battery, be sure to check the batteries every six months, and change the batteries every year. If a battery is starting to lose its power, the unit will usually chirp to warn you. Do NOT disable the unit.

Vacuum or blow out any dust that might accumulate in the unit.

NEVER borrow a battery from an alarm to use somewhere else.

NEVER paint a smoke or CO alarm.

Install at least one smoke alarm on every floor of your home, including the basement, and in, or near each sleeping

Smoke alarms should not be installed near a window because drafts could interfere with their operation.

Families should also develop and practice a home fire escape plan.

Always follow the manufacturer's instructions for testing smoke alarms and replacing the batteries.

Ask Rusty - Cutting Social Security Will Make Me Lose My Home!

Dear Rusty: Politicians are talking about taking money from Social Security, but I need that money to support my daughter and pay for my home. I'm a widow, and my husband passed in 2017. I'll lose my home if my Social Security benefits are cut. Please help. Signed: Widowed Senior

Dear Widowed Senior: Despite what you might read or hear in the media, the main threat for you to lose any of your Social Security money is if Social Security is not reformed. In that case, everyone who receives benefits will see a cut of about 23% to their monthly benefit starting in about 2034. The way to avoid that is by updating the current Social Security law to address two primary issues:

People now live much longer than when Social Security was enacted in 1935 and when the last major program change occurred in 1983. Average life expectancy of beneficiaries today is mid-80s, compared to mid-60s when the program started. In other words, people now collect benefits for much longer (often decades longer) than the program is designed to support.

The number of workers contributing to the program is growing much slower than the growth in beneficiaries receiving benefits. That means the ratio of contributors to recipients is much less now than it has been in the past, which means program costs are growing faster than incoming revenue.

The reality is that reform is necessary now to avoid cuts to everyone's benefits later. But here's a very important point that should comfort you – any reform enacted will almost cer-tainly affect only those who have not yet claimed their Social Security benefits. That means you should not be affected because you're already receiving benefits, and you will continue to do so at the same amount except for the increases you will get from Cost of Living Adjustments (COLA). Every Social Security change ever made has affected only future beneficiaries, not current ones. The only real threat to your Social Security benefit is if no changes are made and, even then, any cuts wouldn't happen until about 2034.

So please rest assured that your personal Social Security benefits will not be cut. Anything you hear now implying otherwise is a scare tactic designed to make headlines for political gain. The program must be reformed or face insolvency in a bit more than 10 years, and that is what both Republicans and Democrats want to prevent. The difference between the parties is that one side wants to solve the problem mainly by raising Social Security payroll taxes on workers, whereas the other side wants to adjust the program to deal with the above two factors causing the problem. What is needed is bipartisan cooperation to reach a compromise,


which Congress will hopefully eventually achieve. They already know how to fix Social Security; they just need to find the bipartisan spirit needed to do so. For its part, the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC) has, for years, proposed changes that would restore Social Security to full solvency without raising taxes on American workers, and AMAC's proposal has been well received by many in Congress. In any case, contrary to what you might hear in the media, your current Social Security benefits should not be negatively affected by any future Social Security reform enacted.

That Others May Live

It was approximately 10:05 AM on Wednesday, March 1st, when yours truly and Erie County Republican Chairman Michael Kracker walked outside of GOP headquarters located on Main Street in downtown Buffalo, right next to Tupper.

We are old friends, and decided to catch up for coffee. Nothing seemed out of the ordinary when we walked towards the front of the building, where my car was parked right outside on Main.

I covered a lot of "spot news" as a television news reporter back in Syracuse and here at home in Buffalo, and saw the best and worst of humanity, along with many shootings, accidents, and plenty of fires.

As soon as Michael and I opened the door and turned right, we saw thick, massive clouds billowing from a building right next to us. Fire trucks and police cars were rushing to the scene. We heard lots of breaking glass, an explosion, and screeching sirens.

This fire was far different than anything I experienced as a news reporter. More often than not we approached "breaking news" after it happened. In the old days an Assignment Editor or Producer had to listen to police and fire scanners for emergencies.

They would in turn dispatch us to cover news like a fire.

Since my brother was a retired Buffalo Firefighter, I knew a lot of the firemen in my reporting days. We were always respectful in trying to obtain video and information from a structure fire, without impeding the important job of first responders whose main mission was to save lives.

Most times we stayed behind police tape or took video a safe distance away.

When Michael and I saw the raging fire and smoke billowing from the Main Street building in downtown Buffalo, nothing impeded us from walking right up to it. We didn't, but it just felt so strange being right there as this structure was fully engulfed.

I immediately called and texted a dear family friend who is a Captain in the Buffalo Fire Department, someone I knew would be at this fire. I went to high school with Buffalo Firefighter Jonathan Croom, who made the ultimate sacrifice battling a blaze in 2009. My friend who is a Captain also knew Jonathan well. Any time there's a big fire or massive emergency, I always think of and pray for both of these guys.

Every single time first responders leave their homes to protect us and keep us

safe, they have no idea whether or not they will make it back safely to their own homes.

Tragically, Buffalo Firefighter Jason Daniel Arno lost his life in that fire. He leaves behind his wife Sarah-Liz and their threeyear-old daughter Olivia.

The heroes of both the Buffalo Fire Department and the Buffalo Police Department do not "protect and serve" for the paycheck. Their selfless sacrifice and mission goes far deeper than that. They risk life and limb so that we can live freely and safely. Tragically, this became a harsh reality once again for the Buffalo Fire Department.

Our collective hearts break for Arno's surviving family. A little girl will only know her father from stories passed down from loved ones about what a hero he was in life, and how he will never, ever be forgotten in death. Her father will not be there to celebrate birthdays, walk her down the aisle at her wedding, or just hold her hand when she needs it most.

As for Arno's surviving family, you can support his wife and daughter via Go-FundMe. Using a search engine, type in "The family of Buffalo Firefighter Jason Arno" and "GoFundMe." If that's not possible, that's ok. The power of prayer is strong, needed, and doesn't cost a thing.

The Latin motto adopted by the Buffalo Fire Department is "Ut Vivant Alii:" that others may live. May God bless Jonathan Croom, Jason Arno, and all first responders who valiantly put their lives on the line just so that "we may live."

The 2023 Hertel Alley Mural Fest is returning this summer! The two-day event, taking place on June 10th and 11th, will showcase live installations on 16 buildings along the Hertel Alley.


