She was stating the same words spoken by then president Don Morris on the Hallmark Diamond. as the leader of this successful league watched his last parade as the master of ceremonies over an always enthusiastic crowd. Hundreds of North Buffalo families start gathering along both sides of the strip, waiting for the procession to pass by, holding cell phone cameras, a younger child in a stroller and a leashed dog wanting to run.

Besides the Mayor, other local dignitaries from Downtown office build-ings like Councilmembers, legislators or judges come to offer their wishes for success for all the children. They tell stories of when they once played as a child growing up in America's favorite pasttime. Then they step to the mound and in a suit and tie or a pretty blouse and skirt, try to throw a "first pitch" to a 12 year old child.

There's 63 teams that will start playing Saturday and during the week in the park nightly. Boys teams number 39 while the girls stand at 24. They're broken into ten different divisions, five







North Buffalo April 30, 2023

Delaware Avenue - Defendant did punch victim with a closed fist in the face causing pain and swelling to her right eye.

April 26, 2023



Defendant get into driver seat and drove the vehicle away while victim was hanging onto the vehicle. 
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during check-in the day of the event.

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What Could Have Been?

Just drove back from Florida last week alone and in the rain. Done it so many times I have the route memorized. Long trip and being in no hurry I did it in three days. Outside of the rain, it was not too bad. Mostly Interstate and the roads were all in good shape. Even the mountain roads in West Virginia. Those roads are engineering feats. Amazing ups and downs and around. Even a couple of tunnels going through the highest mountains. They were all good until you hit New York State and the Thomas Dewey thruway. Like a lot of things in New York, it is a disgrace. The road was the worst of the 1400 miles. Most of the trip was toll free, except of course New York. Been making this trip for many years and it is always the same, the 100 miles in New York has the very worst road of all. Went to Rochester the other day and that part is even in the worst shape. All the other states have the exits coordinate with the mile marker. Not in New

York. If you travel, you know of what I speak. That makes it so much easier to plan your route and your day. I have personally asked both NY state assemblymen and senators why this state does not have this convenience. The answers were so dumb I do not want to repeat them. So, let's talk about leadership, what could have been in our area alone.

Years ago, one hot topic was expansion of the Peace Bridge as we know it is too slow. There was talk about a second bridge like the one that exists now. Much like the Grand Island Bridges. Then they said maybe a completely new four lane bridge with a huge customs reception and greeting plaza. They had drawings and sketches of what could have been. You can see the results. Nothing happened. Great leadership.

Then we had a signed agreement to build a dome stadium downtown. Someone decided that an open stadium in the snow belt would be better so the powers to be reneged


was never built, and Erie County was sued by the potential builder. They are now proposing to build another open stadium in the snow belt. All the years of experience with the bad weather and the embarrassment it brings nationally to the area must mean nothing to the political. What the Buffalo Bills players had to endure this year, and other years, did not seem to be a wakeup call when considering a new sta-dium in Orchard Park. Having season tickets for 50 years, there were so many games I wished we had a dome, as I sat there bundled up but still freezing. Must be a huge Bills fan to do that.

We then have the half-completed subway system. I say half as it could have been so much more than it is. Never used railroad tracks going into the suburbs were available and could have connected to the present subway's rails and made it twice what it is. Of course, there would have been extra cost involved but it seemed to make sense. Guess not as it never happened for some reason

In all these cases it seemed that it would have meant so much more to have them happen. No one can argue that something needs to be done about the Peace Bridge. My thought is that no football game should have to be played in inclimate weather. Especially snow. To build a stadium where that is going to happen again to me makes no sense. If you are going to build a new stadium, do it right. The subway does serve a purpose, but it is so limited and could have been so much more.

These are just three of the many things that could have been, should have been. They would have been huge for the county. Made a big difference.

Fortunately, we did have Jimmy Griffin and Brian Higgins who did much to develop downtown and the waterfront. I am sure there are others involved who have contributed to what is good about the area and there is much. However, do you agree that so much more could have been done and some still could be? Start by fixing that lousy New York State thruway. With the high tolls that should be easy. Unless some of that money is going south. Maybe that is the answer. We need to elect people without deep pockets.

Ask Rusty – About "Survivor" Benefits vs. "Spousal" Benefits

Dear Rusty: I will be 70 in August and will file my application for benefits in May. I know I'll get my maximum possible amount at age 70, but I need you to clarify things I have read.

Per an award-winning TV host, author, and host of a money podcast "if the higher-earning spouse delays until age 70 to claim Social Security, that guarantees the survivor the biggest possible benefit." But then I read in a different article that if a person delays beyond their full retirement age to obtain a higher person-al benefit (like I have), my spouse's benefit would still be based on my FRA benefit amount. I am confused about which statement is the correct version. Signed: Confused About My Spouse's Benefit

Dear Confused: I'm not surprised that you are confused about these seemingly contradictory statements. It is, indeed, quite logical (and common) for a widow or widower to think they must apply for a "spousal benefit" from their deceased spouse. And while that's technically true, those of us who live in this often confusing world of Social Security jargon would say the widow or widower is applying for a survivor benefit, not a spousal benefit. What's the difference? Well, when you're speaking with a Social Security representative or an advisor, the term "spousal benefit" means something entirely different than the term "survivor benefit."

The two articles you mention are. I believe, referring to two different types of Social Security benefit. The term "survivor benefit" is typically used to describe benefits available to a surviving spouse when the higher earner dies, but the term "spousal benefit" is typically used to denote benefits available to a lower earning spouse when both partners are still living. I agree this is confusing, and that distinction was apparently not clear in the articles you read.

in the articles you read. Therefore, to clear your confusion: • If the higher earning spouse dies and has delayed claiming until

age 70, that does, indeed, "guarantee the surviving spouse the biggest possible benefit." The survivor benefit is based on the full amount the deceased was receiving at death.

• When both spouses are living and the higher-earning spouse delayed until age 70 to claim, their living spouse's benefit, when the higher-earning spouse claims, will be a maximum of 50% of the higher-earning spouse's full retirement age (FRA) amount. While both are living, a spouse's benefit is based on their partner's FRA amount, regardless of when their partner actually claimed.

So, in your case, your wife's spousal benefit from you while you are both living will be based on your FRA entitlement, even though you waited longer to claim. But if you die first, your wife's survivor benefit as your widow will be based on 100% of the amount you were receiving at your death. In effect, both statements you referred to in your question are true considering that they refer to two different benefit types. It is the terminology distinction which frequently causes misunderstanding.






