## Mother's Day 2023



**Mother's Day is right around the corner this Sunday, May 14<sup>th</sup>.**

Mother's Day is a holiday honoring motherhood that is observed in different forms throughout the world. In the United States, Mother's Day 2023 will occur on Sunday, May 14. The American incarnation of Mother's Day was created by Anna Jarvis in 1908 and became an official U.S. holiday in 1914. Jarvis would later denounce the holiday's commercialization and spent the latter part of her life trying to remove it from



the calendar. While dates and celebrations vary, Mother's Day traditionally involves presenting moms with flowers, cards and other gifts.

Once a major tradition in the United Kingdom and parts of Europe, this celebration fell on the fourth Sunday in Lent and was originally seen as a time when the faithful would return to their "mother church"—the main church in the vicinity of their home—for a special ser-

vice.

Over time the Mothering Sunday tradition shifted into a more secular holiday, and children would present their mothers with flowers and other tokens of appreciation. This custom eventually faded in popularity before merging with the American Mother's Day in the 1930s and 1940s.

It is a day which makes people remember the importance and significance of mothers in their life and is observed as a day to give special emphasis to the motherly figures around the world.

## May Is Motorcycle Safety & Awareness Month

Warmer weather has arrived, daylight hours are longer and it is finally spring. Motorcycle riders across Erie County are tuning up their bikes and getting ready for the riding season on the open road. Motorcycles are inexpensive to purchase,



fuel efficient, fun to ride and easy to park. In Erie County alone, there are more than 21,000 registered riders who use their motorcycles for commuting, touring and other recreational activities.

According to the National Safety Coun-

cil, although motorcycles make up only 3% of all registered vehicles and 0.6% of all vehicle miles traveled in the United States, motorcyclists accounted for 14% of all traffic fatalities, with fatalities among motorcycle riders and passengers increasing by 8% from 2020 to 2021.

## The Albright Knox Art Gallery Is Set To Re-Open On June 12th

The now closed Albright Knox Art Gallery will reopen Monday, June 12th at The Albright Knox Art Gallery, 1285 Elmwood Ave, Buffalo, NY with an new wing with other new attractions, as well as a bunch of new programs. The new attractions are set to create a conducive atmosphere for interactive learning with creative play.



The museum — formerly known as the Albright Knox Art Gallery — has been closed since late 2019 for a \$168 million expansion project. The museum's vast expansion was funded by a \$230 million capital campaign — the largest in the history of any Western

New York cultural institution.

The art museum, now renamed Buffalo AKG Art Museum, is set to include the new Jeffrey E. Gundlach Building which will provide approximately 50,000 square feet more of exhibition space, in addition to five classroom studios, a new Ralph C. Wilson Jr. Town Square and more than half an acre of new public green space.

Bright Sunshine and warmer temperatures helped the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League open their 66th season in North Buffalo this past Saturday morning, May 6 as boys and girls flooded Hertel Avenue in their annual parade that stretched for at least ten blocks.

They were sisters Julia and Kira Kilonsky, Emma Mahoney and Genevieve Mucitelli. Each received beautifully framed jerseys of theirs when they played in Shoshone Park.

"This is one of the most meaningful honors I've ever received," said Mucitelli afterward. "Being a part of Shoshone Park has meant so much to me and I've learned some

## Felonies

From "D" District

**North Buffalo**  
**May 8, 2023**  
Kenmore Avenue – While attempting to pull defendant over for having no plates, defendant did take off from officers. ## May Is Motorcycle Safety & Awareness Month

I ask all motorists, especially new drivers, to be alert to the presence of motorcycles and to share the road safely. Motorcyclists often ride to one side of the lane and at times the rider can hide in your vehicle's blind spot. Always look twice before turning or changing lanes to be sure your path is clear. Allow more following distance for motorcycles -- two or three car lengths is recommended, more if the roads are wet or visibility is poor.

Riders should follow motorcycle safety protocols: wear protective gear at all times, including a helmet that meets or exceeds the U.S. Department of Transportation standard, ride within your skill limits, avoid riding in poor weather conditions, use turn signals, and never ride impaired or distracted. Riders can also benefit from any motorcycle safety programs offered to learn the critical skills needed to ride safely, including seasoned riders who want to reinforce safe driving practices. Course graduates may also qualify for insurance premium discounts with

some insurers. Class locations and fees can be found at nysmsp.org. Before hitting the road this driving season, I remind motorcyclists that their motorcycle registration expires annually on April 30th, so take time to visit the Erie County Auto Bureau to 'Renew Local'. In addition, those who drive a motorcycle need to be properly licensed, as 43% of fatal bike accidents involve an unlicensed driver. Take the time to get properly licensed – not only because it's the law, but because doing so may save a life.

I urge everyone to use caution when sharing the road this summer. When we share the road, we share the responsibility of keeping each other safe. Together, the more we raise awareness and follow the rules of the road, the safer everyone is. Let's ride smart, ride safe, and enjoy the season.



## No Border, No Nation

I'm the proud son and grandson of Polish and Ukrainian immigrants that came to America the right way, legally documented, and eventually became citizens of our great nation. Having grown up during the apex of the Cold War between the United States and the Soviet Union, former President Ronald Reagan is credited for ending this "conflict" by enabling a foreign policy of peace through strength. This apparent paradox of building arms and strengthening our military worked brilliantly considering Russia could not keep up, faced disastrous economic hardships, and eventually cratered.

I remember going through the citizenship paperwork of my Baba (grandmother) and Dido (grandfather) when coming to the United States. Their extensive paperwork listed them as farmers. When my Baba passed away I found old notebooks in her handwriting very similar to the old "Dick and Jane" books. They were from her English classes. Granted, I half jokingly say they quickly learned the language from numbers 1-75 and B-I-N-G-O. No problems at all with those letters and numbers.

While my Ukrainian grandparents never forgot where they came from and passed down our native culture and heritage to me, they were also proud to be Americans, having despised the communist regime and Iron First of the Iron Curtain that killed and persecuted millions of Ukrainians. I even helped my Baba study for the citizenship test she took in order to be finally called an American. She beamed with pride at her citizenship ceremony, when she led the Pledge of Allegiance before the Honorable William Skretny, who swore her in as a citizen.

It wasn't easy to become an American citizen for her on so many different levels. She faced insurmountable hardships fleeing a communist regime during World War II. Saved enough mon-

ey to come to America. Then filled out all proper documentation to become a U.S. citizen. The struggle made her much more appreciative of being Ukrainian born and eventually dying as an American.

As for President Ronald Reagan, he was also known for being incredibly protective of our Southern border, famously stating "A nation that cannot control its borders is not a nation." His words ring true decades later, as Title 42 expired this week. It allowed the United State to expel illegal immigrants for health reasons pertaining to the COVID pandemic. It allowed Migrants to be returned to their native countries or sent back to Mexico.

With its expiration, tens of thousands of migrants are expected to freely flow across the southern border into the United States. More than likely detained migrants will be released into the United States, won't return for their court dates, and their first action in our country will be breaking the rule of law by simply being here.

There has to be a better way.

Our great nation was built on legal immigrants that were properly documented, vetted, and accounted for at numerous ports of entry into the United States, most notably Ellis Island. Legal immigration is perfectly acceptable for anyone wishing to leave their native land for a better life in the United States, just like my grandparents.

What is not acceptable is the free flow of fentanyl across a porous border that is killing people in communities in every corner of our country. What is not acceptable is an open border that encourages tens of thousands of people to enter our nation illegally.

Politicians of all parties must work together to find a solution. What's taking place now is a crisis of epic proportions that is damaging the fabric of what it means to be an American. My family came here the right way. There's no reason why

others can't do the same. Until then, we come precipitously close to becoming what Ronald Reagan warned us about: that we no longer are an identifiable nation by having tens of thousands of unidentifiable people crossing a "border" that no longer exists.

Ask Rusty – Should Octogenarians Tell Social Security They Married?

**Dear Rusty:** We were married two years ago at ages 78 and 81. Do we need to do anything with Social Security? **Signed: Blissfully Happy**

**Dear Blissfully Happy:** Congratulations on your fairly recent marriage and, yes, there are some things you should do. Specifically, you should contact Social Security to inform them of your marriage, see whether any additional benefits are available, and to make any changes needed to your contact information. Here are some things to consider:

- If a name change has occurred for one of you, that person should contact Social Security to report the change. A copy of your marriage certificate (and other ID) will be required, and a new Social Security card will be issued.
- If a change of address has also occurred for one or both of you, that must be reported. It's important that Social Security has the correct mailing address, email, and contact phone number for every beneficiary.
- If there are any other changes to the Contact Information on file with the Social Security Administration for either of you (e.g., your banking information), the affected person should inform Social Security of the

changes needed.

- Social Security will evaluate whether any benefit increase is available as a result of your marriage, which may be the case if one of you is entitled to a "spousal boost" (an additional amount from the other now that you're married). A spousal boost may be available if one has a monthly Social Security payment that is more than twice the other's benefit. Social Security can answer that question for you when you call.

You can contact either your local Social Security office (find the number at [www.ssa.gov/locator](http://www.ssa.gov/locator)) or call the national number at 1.800.772.1213 and tell them you need to inform them of your marriage and update your contact information. If you have (or if you create) an online "My Social Security" account at [www.ssa.gov/myaccount](http://www.ssa.gov/myaccount), you can initiate changes to your contact information online, but you will need to call Social Security directly via phone to record your marriage and see if any changes to monthly benefits are available. All of this can likely be done without requiring a visit to your local SS office.

It is very important that Social Security be made aware of your new marital status and to ensure that they have

the correct contact information for both of you. Even if the contact information is unchanged for one of you, the other should contact Social Security as described above to update their contact information and to determine if any changes to monthly benefits are appropriate as a result of your marriage. Doing so now will avoid future issues and will make sure you are both getting the correct monthly Social Security payments as a married couple. And if one of you is entitled to a higher spousal amount, you should ask for the increase to be applied retroactively (SS will pay up to 6 months retroactively). I suggest you call Social Security as soon as possible to inform them of your marriage and make any necessary changes to your contact information.
