## 9/11 Never Forget Mobile Exhibit Comes To The Erie County Fair

The Tunnel to Towers 9/11 Never Forget Mobile Exhibit will be escorted by local law enforcement, fire departments, EMS squads, along with veteran and first responder motorcycle groups from McKinley Mall to the Hamburg Fairgrounds. The exhibit will be located outside of Showplace from August 9th-14th during the Erie County Fair.

We invite the community to line up on the sides of McKinley Parkway (off the roadway) to welcome the exhibit on its procession to the Fairgrounds.

The Tunnel to Towers Foundation is committed to ensuring that Americans never forget what happened on September 11, 2001. Since 2013, the mobile exhibit has traveled the country educating Americans. Tours of the exhibit are conducted by retired New York City Firefighters who responded on September 11, 2001. They share their stories and bring history to life.

The 83-foot-tractor-trailer transforms into a 1,100 square foot exhibit which features World Trade Center Steel, aluminum façade from the buildings, radio transmission recordings, and items found in the rubble after the Twin Towers collapsed.

Tunnels to Towers Foundation recently provided a mortgage-free home to the family of local firefighter Jason Arno. Arno, 37, a three-year member of the Buffalo Fire Department, was killed in the line of duty while battling a 4-alarm fire on March 1, 2023.

Luke Kuwik, Daniel Hannon, Michael Randazzo and Cormac Dean led the Cardinals to the Double AA Division Championship for 8U Boys this season with a 5-4 victory over the Dodgers in House Baseball last

Monday night, July 31 in front of an endearing crowd.

The four big bats of the red shirted team, were part of an offense all season that drove in

many runs at the plate and carried the team to a first place finish in the Division with

a 10-2 record at the end of the regular season. Against teams like the Braves, Brewers, Mets, Phillies and Pirates, the Red Birds won their first seven games to start the season and maintained first place in the Division.

New Manager Connor Dean and two others watched as twelve boys played well all season with sportsmanship, teamwork and support in the field and at the plate. "Believe me, we just wanted them to have fun," said Dean earlier this week. They made the plays when we needed them and it was a joy to watch this season unfold.'

Three other players, James Bevilacqua, Dean Riordan and Gio Garcia were key contributors

this season with time-ly hits and excellent defense around the diamond. Even first year players like Gio Nigro and Henry Johnson got into the scoring spree in several games that made this season for the

birds. Jay Randazzo and Chris Riordan both worked with Dean to hone pitching skills. Kuwik was the ace of the pitch-ing staff of two

others, Hannon and Dean, who kept opponents off the basepaths and threw strikes on the mound. When not pitching, the trio was strong up the middle of the infield at Second or Short to shut down base hits. Bevilacqua led off the inning and handled the hot corner at third base all season. Riordan had the team's second most hits and played a stellar first base.

At Seasons end, the Dodgers became a formidable opponent. The team was ceded last in playoff bracket on July 12and faced the number 2 ceded Pirates in the first round. John Catanzaro had three hits for five RBIs and closed out the game on the mound for a 7-5 victory. Then against the Phillies five days later, Christian Carnevale's homerun was the difference in a 3-2 victory. That set up two games against the Cardinals, where the surprising blue and white team fought hard for an upset over the Champ Cardinals.

"It was a great Series," said Dean. "These Car-dinals had a blast. They played hard all year and deserve these trophies. I'm proud of them and I hope to coach some of them again. I wish to thank Jay (Randazzo) and Chris (Riordan) for their help this season.

Four other House Divisions have finished their seasons with Championship victories in Rookie Girls Softball, Rook-ie Boys Baseball, Major Softball and Triple AAA Girls. Detailed information in coming weeks while Major Boys and Triple AAA Boys conclude their seasons.

Two other Divisions, Senior Boys and Senior Girls have yet to start their playoffs because their seasons don't start until after the Memorial Day Holiday. While many teams have gone home, the season is still alive in Shoshone Park.

Early last week, North Buffalo and the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League received great news from the Common Council Downtown in City Hall when they officially approved the contracts to construct the new Shoshone Park Fieldhouse, slated to have a fall ground-breaking on the project after the HNPYBL season. The decision is the result of years of community meetings, discussions and planning between the architect, contractors with City Officials since 2017. It has been described as a Gamechanger for the Community ever since the idea was proposed by then president Donald Morris of Hertel North Park. Thisdecision prompted the over 1,300 boys and girls playing in the League this season to thank all parties involved in this memorable event to occur within the next two years.

#### West Side August 5, 2023

Penfield Street – Complainant and the defendant did get into a verbal dispute which led to the defendant scratching the complainant's neck and biting him numerous times on his left arm.

The defendant stated that he was 103 Henrietta to inquire about his vehicle being fixed and proceeding to tell officers that the vehicle he was operating was not his vehicle but a rental car rented to his girlfriend. For officer safety, defendant was asked to

the vehicle. The defendant refused command to exit the vehicle, was advised that Supreme Court case, Pennsylvania V. Mimms required him to exit the vehicle on traffic stop if instructed to do so and that failure to comply would result obstruction. The defendant still refused to exit the vehicle. After a short time, defendant did exit the vehicle, began reaching back inside of vehicle refusing commands to walk to the rear. The defendant was placed under arrest for obstruction, an inventory search h of the vehicle subsequent to arrest was conducted. The inventory vielded a large amount of various narcotics including four (4) individually packaged bags of cocaine totaling 115.94 grams. Also recovered was a scale with residue, a box of plastic sandwich bags, \$622.59 in USD cash and four (4) cell phones. Officer recovered the cash from defendant's person while patrol officer recovered and submitted all other property. Vehicle was impounded to 166 Dart Street. Narcotics were recovered from center console and scale from driver side door.


#### August 1, 2023




The Festival

#### Ask Rusty – Why Is Social Security Withholding My Monthly Payments?

Dear Rusty: I have been working since I started collecting Social Security when I turned 62. Last year I was apparently overpaid because of my job. I made \$37,000 and now the Social Security Administration says I owe them \$8,800 dollars because I made too much, and they have withheld my \$2000 monthly Social Security payment. I am close to the maximum allowable again already this year. So, I am looking at quitting my job so I don't go over, but they are holding my payments so then I would have no money. Any help would be appreciated. Signed: Frustrated by Social Security

Dear Frustrated: You are being affected by Social Security's "earnings test" which applies to everyone who collects early Social Security and also works before reaching their full retirement age (FRA). If your earned income exceeds the annual limit (which was \$19,560 for 2022), Social Security will withhold \$1 in benefits for every \$2 you are over the limit. If you earned \$37,000 in 2022 you were more than \$17,000 over the limit and owe half of that back to Social Security. They usually recover what you owe by withholding your future benefit payments, so they won't pay you benefits until they have recovered that \$8,800, after which your benefits will resume – but only for a while.

If you are working full time and also collecting early Social Security benefits, the earnings test lasts until you reach your full retirement age, which for you is 66 years and 8 months. The earnings limit goes up a bit each year – for 2023 it is \$21,240 – but if you continue to work full time, you'll receive another overpayment notice and have more benefits withheld. A better approach might be to contact Social Security in advance and tell them what your 2023 earnings are expected to be, thus permitting them to suspend your benefits in advance and avoid overpaying you. I'm afraid there is no way around this - collecting early benefits while working full time means the "earnings test" will af-fect your benefit payments.

The "good news" in all of this is that when you reach your full retirement age, you will get time-credit for all months your benefits were withheld. By that I mean they will, at your FRA, recalculate your benefit entitlement as though vou had claimed later (later by the number of months you had benefits withheld), which will result in a higher monthly payment after your FRA. In that way, you may eventually recover some or all of the benefits withheld by receiving a higher monthly amount for



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I suggest you contact Social Security at 1.800.772.1213 (or at your

1.800.772.1213 (or at your local office) and tell them you want to provide them with an estimate of your 2023 earnings because you are working and collecting early Social Security benefits. They will work with you to suspend your benefits for an appropriate number of (additional) months to avoid another overpayment situation. Note, you'll likely need to do this each year you continue to work full time, until the year you reach your full retirement age when the earnings limit more than doubles. The earnings limit goes away when you reach your full retirement age.

# **Kearns Pays Tribute To Purple Heart Recipients**



County Clerk celebrated veterans added to the William J. Donovan 2023 Purple Heart Book of Merit and announces Old County Hall will be lit up purple in support of Purple Heart Appreciation Day, held annually on August 7th.

In honor of Purple Heart Appreciation Day, Erie County Clerk Michael P. Kearns recog-nized Erie County Purple Heart Recipients being added to the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Book of Merit for 2023. No formal record of Purple Heart Recipients in Erie County existed prior to 2018 when Kearns originated Erie County's version of the "Book of Merit.'

"An estimated 1.8million service men and women who fought and lost their lives or received life-altering injury protecting our great country and have earned the Purple Heart," stated Kearns. "These selfless individuals come from all walks of life and backgrounds, and more spe-cifically, from all across Erie County. While the majority of veterans do not seek our thanks and praise, I firmly believe we owe them both.'

National Purple Heart Day is observed annually on August 7th and dedicated to remembering and honoring the brave men and women of the United States Armed Forces who were wounded on the battlefield or lost their lives in combat operations.

The Purple Heart is a United States military decoration awarded in the name of the president to those wounded or killed while serving, on or after April 5,  $191\overline{7}$ , with

the U.S. military. Originally called the Badge of Military Merit, the Purple Heart was created by George Washington on August 7, 1782. In addition to receiving a purple heart shaped medal, the honoree's name and regiment were inscribed in the "Book of Merit" which was lost after the Revolutionary War and the award was largely forgot-ten until over 100 years later. The Purple Heart is the oldest military decoration still awarded to members of the U.S. military.

"Ít is my esteemed honor to present the 2023 Purple Heart Recipient Names being added to the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Book of Merit," said Kearns. "The lack of records on Purple Heart recipients was always a surprise to me. As the chief document and records holder for the county, I wanted to create a way for the names of Purple Heart Recipients to be acknowledged and remembered."

The 2023 volume of the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit will now hold the names of five hundred forty (540) Purple Heart Recipients from across Erie County, with the additional twenty-two (22) veterans added at today's ceremony.

The book is named after Buffalo native and advocate leading for

the Central Intelligence Agency, William J. Donovan. Prior to becoming known as the "Father of American Intelligence", Donovan served in the United States Infantry and was one of the first units deployed to Europe during World War I. Donovan would receive three Purple Hearts during his service in the military, and would go on to head the Central Intelligence Agency, during World War II.

This year's ceremony was held at Old County Hall, home to the Erie County Clerk's Office, in the Ceremonial Court Room, followed by a Purple Heart flag raising observance at the statue of President George Washington. The ceremony began with a welcome from County Clerk Kearns, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by World War II Veteran Dr. John Long, with the National Anthem performed by local lyricist George Miller. Kearns presented Certif-icates of Recognition and commemorative Purple Heart pins to recipients or their family members as the honoree's names, branch of service, and war was read aloud.

The William J. Donovan Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit is on permanent display at the Erie County Clerk's Office inside Old County Hall at 92 Franklin Street. Along with the book, there are also historical photos of William J. Donovan, a portrait of Donovan, and a World War I era Purple Heart with two oak leaf clusters donated to the Clerk's Office. Submissions for the 2024 Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit are currently being accepted online at erie. gov/clerk/purpleheartform or by contacting the County Člerk's office at 716-858-6787.

"I believe it is important we pay tribute to our military heroes who were injured or killed in the line of duty, then bestowed this national honor. They deserve to be recognized for their service and sacrifice and I am happy we are able to keep such record of our local service men and women at the Erie County Clerk's Office," added Kearns.

Additionally, County Clerk Kearns announced Old County Hall will be lit up purple, August 7-13th, in honor of Purple Heart Appreciation Day and in solemn recognition for all service members injured or killed in action.
