

There's something quite heavenly going on in Shoshone Park every season for the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball and Soft-ball League. The Angels won the Championship in the Rookie Girls Division of five, six and seven year old girls this season, with a 6-4 victory over

fifteen girls began the season,

ready to play on May 6th, some for the very first time, and put together an undefeated year with 14 wins in a row without a loss, including the Championship game played Monday night, July 31 in front of their fans. It was an amazing finish to a great season that even left team coaches in awe of their accomplishments.

We huddled before each game and told the girls to have fun," said An-gels coach Matt Ryan, afterward. "We wanted them to hustle on the basepaths and support each other at the plate and on the diamonds. It didn't matter if they struck out or missed a catch, they were there for each other.

Ryan has been the latest architect for the Angels success the past few years now and has succeeded in one of the initial levels of Hertel North Park play, when the new girls all get their first hits of the Summer after play-

ing in the t-Ball Division last year. He singled out a first year player, Holly Stambach, with her amazing run of base hits at the plate after the first six games. "It was truly an awesome beginning for this new, young girl. She is destined to become a great player.'

Besides Stambach, six other girls began play this year, including his youngestdaughter Charlotte Ryan and Teagan Sassone. The trio just

watched and listened to older girls lead them to victory. Against teams like the Comets, Devils, Rebels or Stars, every girl in the Angels line-up contributed in some way to this great season.

Three of Ryan's Angels led the team to victories this year and were playing their last season's in the Rookie Division. They were Caroline Peterson, Mia Pizzuto and Nora Ryan and all three put runs across the plate and played excellent defense. Pizzuto was the Shortstop and scooped the ball up for the throws to first base. Ryan played near the mound and Peterson was at third. The three will move up to the Double AA Division next year.

The Shamrocks had a tremendously successful year as well. They got off to a slow start with just two wins in the month of May. Coach Brooke Woods worked with several new

girls to the League this season and told them all their green jerseys worn meant "Go !" when it came to running around the basepaths. They were ceded fifth in the Division for the playoffs and defeated the Devils in round one, 8-4. After losing to the Angels 10-7 in round two, the team rebounded to win three games in a row against the Stars, the Wolfpack and a 9-7 victory over a tough Rebels team. The 6-4 loss to the Angels in the Championship game was pure excitement for the two, competitive teams.

Ryan is grateful for all the parents on his team who have stepped up to help him coach these last few seasons. He credits Adam Sassone and James Hornung for much of the team's success. Others like Angelo Gambini, Mike Pizzuto, Chris Peterson, Mike Rausch and Peter Cicero were instru-mental in handling the little details needed for a Championship season. The rest of the Angels

roster included Brooklyn Calhoun, Josephine Či-cero, Paige Felgemacher, Anne Gambino, sisters Nina and Sylvie Rausch, Teagan Sassone, Ella Smith and Vera Zyglis. Each one used their voices on the team bench to cheer on their teammates in this Division that has become a highlight to a Summer in Shoshone Park. North Buffalo is truly blessed to have its Angels. Other House Champi-

onship teams this season in various divisions include the Blue Jays and Red Sox in the Rookie Boys Division. Two Playoff brackets were used for the five and six year olds due to its 12 teams. The Green Division was made up of Royals, Yankees, Guardians, Red Sox, Angels and Rays. The Yellow Division contained the Mariners, Twins, Blue Jays, Orioles, Athletics and Astros. The Red Sox defeated the Yankees 13-12 on a two run walk off single by Charlie Benz in the bottom of the sixth inning for a come from behind victory in a battle between two historical franchises. Benz went two for four with the two RBIs and scored a run. "Everyone contributed from top to bottom," said Manager Tom Briggs af-ter the game, "at the plate and in the field."







Bombs Away

Growing up during the Second World War, there are memories that are bad and some not so good. I was only six when the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor. Very young, so it was not such a big deal to me. I would rather play with my lead soldiers or my dog. As the years progressed, I became more and more aware of the seriousness of the situation. My oldest brother had to join the AirForce to avoid being drafted into the Army. Second oldest enlisted in the Navy. Both had to leave home for years. That left a hole in the household and certainly changed things for me. Two oldest siblings left suddenly.

Not only my brothers but many of their friends also left, some never to return. At the time, I did not realize what we were going through as I knew no other way. Rationing and doing without was just the way of life as I grew older. Air raids were a common event. Air raid sirens would blast, and the drill was to go to the securest shelter. If at home, your basement, or school as low as you can go. If near a public shelter, go to it. In the beginning of the war, it seemed more and more that we may at some time experience enemy bombing. We had bomb shelters in our homes. There was a real fear that we would have experience bombs to

dropping on our city. Every light and every fire had to be extinguished. My dad lit a cigarette and the Air Raid warden (there were plenty of them) warned him to put it out or else. This was serious business. Even though it was a realistic danger, we still maybe took it too lightly. What we needed to see was actual footage of cities being bombed. We can see plenty of it now on TV. Just hard to imagine what the citizens of those cities went through. Poland, Russia, France, England, and the enemy countries, Germany, and Japan. As the war drew on and we turned the tide, it seemed less and less likely we would have to experience enemy bombings. We had two gigantic moats on both sides, the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.

Buffalo was loaded with defense plants. We built airplanes here and had munitions plants all over, so we would have been a target if they were able to reach us. Fortunately, it did not happen. The country suffered little or none of what our allies and our enemies had to endure. England was bombed daily for years. Not that they got used to it but somehow, they made it through. Imagine having to live with constant bombs dropping around you. It is hard to imagine it happening here in to-day's world. How would

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we make it through? Are we as tough as the English or Russians?

How about the people in Japan and Germany? Never did they think their countries or cities would have to face destruction on the scale they did. Berliners and the Japanese in Japan never thought that bombs would rain down on their communities. They thought they were beyond any destruction and the war. But the bombs came, repeatedly. Now we see pictures of what was left of those municipalities after the war. Destruction. Millions of innocent people who had nothing to do with the war, killed or maimed. Could you even imagine that happening here? Seeing buildings as nothing but rubble. Bodies everywhere. Would we be able to cope with that?

I was still young when the war ended. It never touched our shores. We were never bombed. Yes, we suffered and I did not know how much until later in life when things went back to normal. The suffering and things we had to do without were nothing compared to oth-er parts of the world. How horrible wars are. Yet they still go on. Always someone fighting someone for something. The winner being whoever can eliminate more of the enemy. Somehow that does not seem right. Just proves we live in an imperfect world. A beautiful world but one that always must have conflicts. Why is that you wonder?

A war now would pretty much be short and devastating as the weapons are of mass destruction. We would not escape again without having to face the annihilation of some of our cities. We just must hope that the world learned a lesson back in the 40's and it does not happen on the scale it did then. I think we are too smart now to let that happen.

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Ask Rusty – When Should My Wife Claim Social Security?

Dear Rusty: My wife will be 65 next year, and her full retirement age is 66 years plus 10 months. Can she collect 50% of my Social Security benefit at her full retirement age and then get her own higher personal amount at age 70? Her own amount at her full retirement age is \$1,100 per month but her age 70 amount is \$1,800. My Social Security is \$2,300. Suggestions welcome. Signed: My Wife's Helper

Dear Helper: Your wife cannot separate her spousal benefit from her personal Social Security retirement benefit whenever she claims she will be automatically deemed to be filing for both her own benefit and her spousal entitlement. Thus, she cannot claim her spousal benefit first at her full retirement age and defer claiming her own SS retirement benefit until she is 70. When vour wife should claim is, essentially, a decision which should consider the urgency of her need for the money, her life expectancy, whether she will be eligible for a spouse benefit from you, and whether she is working.

If your wife claims before her full retirement age (FRA) and is working, she'll be subject to Social Security's "earnings test" which limits how much she can earn before some SS benefits are taken away (Social Security's earnings test goes away at FRA).

Average life expectancy for a woman your wife's age is about 87. If your current \$2,300 benefit is a result of you taking your Social Security at your full retirement age or earlier, then your wife will receive a small "spousal boost" from you. If she claims at her full retirement age, your wife's total Social Security payment will be 50% of the amount you were entitled to at your FRA and that will be her permanent amount, except for annual COLA increases. However, from what you've shared, your wife's age 70 amount is considerably more than her maximum spousal benefit so, if her life expectancy is long, that suggests she may wish to consider waiting until age 70 to claim her own maximum benefit. By doing so, your wife will get more in cumulative lifetime benefits if she achieves average life expectancy.

The unknown factor is your life expectancy because, as your widow, your wife will be entitled to 100% of the amount you were receiving at your death, instead of the smaller amount she is receiving on her own or as your spouse. If life expectancy is long for both of you, then your wife maximizing her own benefit by waiting until age 70 to claim is a prudent choice. But if your, or your wife's, life expectancy is shorter, then your wife claiming at her full retirement age would be a better decision.
