As athletic director, Schunk said it is the responsibility, as leaders and coaches, to drive the game forward.


"The goal for coaches is to make playing soccer and all sports enjoyable for the current student-athletes and future generations to grow, appreciate, and love sports".

For ten year old Brady Roberts of the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League, 2023 will go down as one of the best Summers a boy could ever have.

A returning player on the North Buffalo Blaze Travel team in Shoshone Park and a member of the Mariners house team in the Triple AAA Division, Roberts had become a team leader since his early days in t-Ball and

Rookie. This year, however, Roberts and his family, spent their Easter holiday in Washington DC, before the Shoshone season began in early May. On the

South Lawn of the White House, over 30,000 people were on hand, including the Roberts' family for the annual Easter Egg EGGucation Roll on Monday, April 10th, honoring military and veterans families. President Joe Biden and his wife Jill approached a throng of people standing near the Roberts family. They got closer and suddenly the President picked out the young boy and hugged him from behind and said "hello" in his ear.

Roberts smiled and turned to look up at the President. Biden placed a pair of sunglasses over his eyes from the bright sunshine and Brady did the same. The image appeared on countless cell phones and cameras instantaneously and was the talk of Shoshone Park even before the season began. He and teammates Clay Lazore and Jace Petti helped lead the Mariners to the Championship of the Triple AAA Division over the Tigers in two straight games, 9-6 and 7-5 played two nights in a row August 8 and 9 in front of cheering crowds.

The Mariners needed to win two game in the end, after losing the first meeting, 7-5 back on July 24. The Tigers proved to be a fierce enemy, peaking just at playoff time and against teams like the Blue ar 30 000 Jays or Orioles great

Jays or Orioles, great plays decided playoff victories.

"If it wasn't for these returning players, Roberts, Lazore and Petti, we wouldn't have been successful," said Manager David Ladori afterward. "It was a young but talented team. We got some great hitting, some timely hits when we needed them and the boys just played hard all season long."

This wasn't the first season for Ladori as a coach, but was his first as the leader of a Park team after numerous chances to win in the past. Without coaches like Kristin Roberts, Jerry Johnson and

Doug Petti helping him all season, the Mariners worked hard on the teams' three or four newcomers and with ten, nine year olds.

Pitchers Naveen Ladori and Jermin Colazzo were stellar on the mound in most games. Against ten other teams, everyone in this competitive Division could surprise an opponent on any given night or day. Ladori moved the boys around the diamond and set the batting order at the plate, The team finished in second place in the Division and awaited the winner of a Angels and Twins game before their postseason began.

"These were all close games," said Ladori about the regular season. "We lost our first game to the Royals but then we managed to put together an eight game winning streak but they were all close scores. The boys played well when we needed a victory. I'm proud of this, I'm proud of them. They were great boys."

Other players on the team are Giovanni Nichols, Owen Weaver. Isaiah Johnson, Patrick Johnson, Patrick Sheehan, Leo Gianadda, Eric Smith, Paul Mulhern and Arli Zilbau-

For Roberts, meeting the President of the United States was once in a lifetime. Winning a Championship in Hertel North Park could happen again and again.



Ask Rusty - Why Is My Age 70 Benefit **Not Higher Than My January Amount?**

Dear Rusty: I plan to retire in 2025 (the year I turn 70). Given that I'm still working, I'm delaying my Social Security until that year. I noticed on my Social Security statement that my payment in Jan-uary of 2025 will not be much different than my age 70 amount in October of 2025. If that is truly the case, would it not be better for me to start taking Social Security payments starting in January of 2025. Am I missing anything here? Signed: Uncertain Senior

Dear Uncertain Senior: Your benefit in October 2025 at age 70 will be about 6% more than it will be in January 2025. If that isn't shown on your Statement of Estimated Benefits, it may be due to a particular nuance in Social Security's rules relating to Delayed Retirement Credits (DRCs). When benefits are claimed mid-year after the DRCs earned in that year aren't applied until the following January. Thus, someone who claims benefits to start mid-year will initially get the DRCs they've earned through the end of the previous year, but not immediately get credit for the additional DRCs earned during the claim-year. Those extra DRCs earned between January and the month benefits started will be applied the following January.

By way of example, if someone beyond FRA claims benefits to start in October 2024, their initial SS retirement benefit will be what they were entitled to at the end of 2023 and would not include DRCs earned between January 2024 and September 2024. They will collect that initial January 2024 benefit until January 2025 when the DRCs earned in 2024 are applied, at which point their benefit would increase

one exception to this rule, which is that all DRCs are immediately credited when benefits are claimed to start in the month age 70 is reached, so despite what your Statement of Estimated Benefits might reflect, if you claim for benefits to start in the month you turn 70 (October 2025) you will get your maximum age 70 benefit immediately and won't need to wait until January 2026 for those extra DRČs to be applied.

Unfortunately, Security's benefit estimator doesn't explain how this nuance works and may show someone claiming mid-year receiving the same benefit as for the preceding January, without further explanation. That is, in my opinion, a flaw in the estimator which may result in people making a wrong decision on when to claim their Social Security benefit. Nevertheless, rest assured that your benefit in October 2025 (the month you turn 70) will be your maximum amount - 6% more than it would be if you claimed benefits to start in January 2025, and you won't need to wait until the following January to get the DRCs earned earlier in 2025.






