

PLEASE STAND BY

A nationwide test of the National Emergency Signal Test will be conducted by FEMA on October 4, 2023 at 2:20pm. All cell phones and communication will be affected.

FEMA, in coordination with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), will conduct a nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA) this fall. The national test will consist of two portions, testing WEA and EAS capabilities. Both tests are scheduled to begin at approximately 2:20 p.m. ET on Wednesday, Oct. 4.

The WEA portion of the

test will be directed to all consumer cell phones. This will be the third nationwide test, but the second test to all cellular devices. The test message will display in either English or in Spanish, depending on the language settings of the wireless handset. The EAS portion of the test will be sent to radios and televisions. This will be the seventh nationwide EAS test.

FEMA and the FCC are coordinating with EAS participants, wireless providers, emergency managers and other stakeholders in preparation for this national test to minimize confusion and to maximize the public safety value of the test. The purpose of the Oct. 4 test is to ensure that the systems continue to be effective means of warning the public about emergencies, particularly those on the national level.

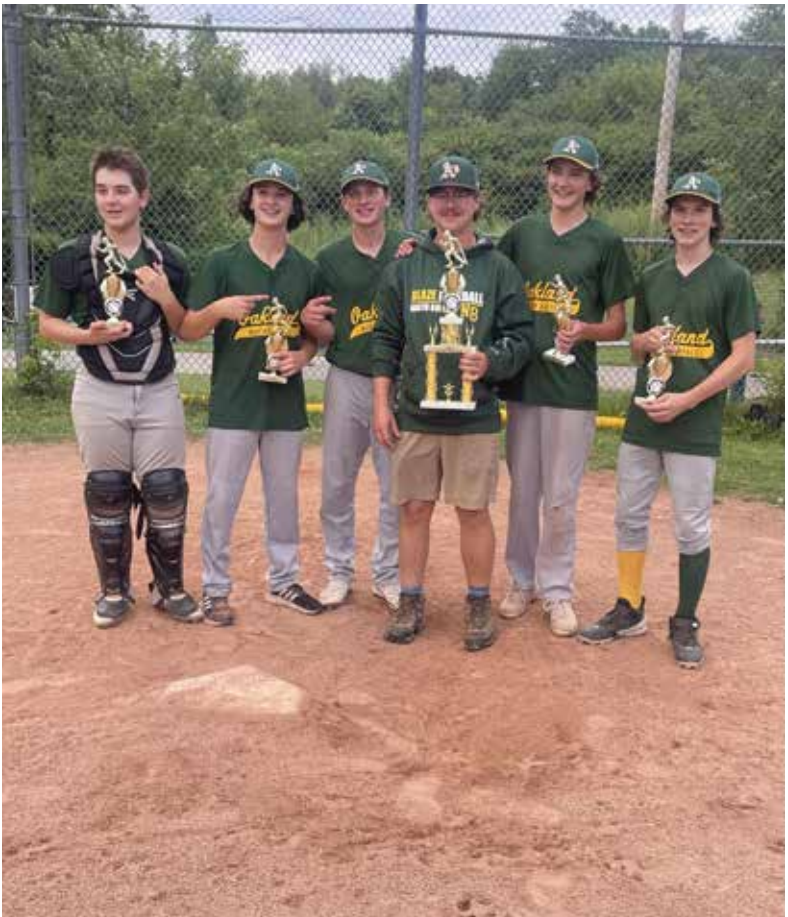

Father And Son



2023 Champion Athletics.

This Summer, the 13-15 year old Athletics team, won their first ever Championship in Shoshone Park in the Senior Division of Hertel North Park Youth Baseball and Softball League by defeating the defending Champ Mets in the third and final game of their best of three series played last month in front of a crowd of enthusiastic fans around the Mike Murphy Diamond.

Jack Ganci, Max Langer and Quinn McKendry led the green and gold to an amazing season on the Senior Diamond and left the Park as Champions of the highest Division the League has for boys, growing up in North Buffalo and learning the game since t-ball. For Ganci, Langer and McKendry, the trio has been inseparable for the past three years under the leadership of their coach, Kellan Daley.

Daley is a success story himself. In the early 2000's, he began playing t-ball for his Dad, Jim, as a young catcher for a Twins team. The elder Daley was very patient with all the boys back then and Kellan tried hard to make his Dad happy. The

Twins were a new team in the Park then, replacing a bad Orioles system. Daley helped his son, and the new team learn all about Harmon Killebrew. The League hasn't been the same since.

Daley stayed with his father and learned the game with all his friends and played for fifteen years as a Twin, Pirate, and eventually as Mets. In 2015, Kellan was a major reason why the Mets won the Senior Division Championship that year and surprised all with a lineup that included Isaiah McDuffie, the current Green Bay Packers linebacker, who became a stand-out player in Baseball as well as Football in the early days while growing up in North Buffalo.

With the victory last month over the Mets, Daley has become a part of Shoshone Park history by winning a Senior Boys title as a player and then as a coach.

Talking to the soft spoken son of the Leagues' Boys Travel Director, he built this Athletics team today three years ago, in 2021 when the League needed to expand teams in the Division due to climb-

ing registration figures. The Pandemic was on its way out and boys and girls were all interested in getting outside for the Summer. At a League meeting, Daley joined several "veteran" coaches including former League President Don Morris to draft boys to play in the Seniors after playing Major Boys Division games on Diamond one.

"That's when players like Jack Ganci, Max Langer and Quinn McKendry were available," he said. "These three were only 13 years old when I drafted them but I saw their love and passion for the game and I felt that they could be special ball players for me by the time they got older."

Daley, like his father, was very patient with the three and formed a squad each year that played well with each other. Other players on this Championship team include Julius Petti and Andrew Meier. Petti was amazing on the basepaths and on the mound. Meier patrolled the outfield and came up with clutch hits at the plate. He was the teams' most improved player this season. Other standout players include catcher Cameron Sutherland, first baseman Owen Scott and Michael Burke, at second.

The A's finished the League's regular season with an 8-0-2, won-lost-tie record good for second place to the Division leading Mets. In the Playoffs, everyone just seemed to connect with a pitch and drove it to empty space on the field. Even newcomers like Eli Langer and Frank Rivera got so comfortable at the plate by seasons end, that they contributed to the scoring. The Athletics destroyed the Phillies, 17-5 in round one and took care of the Pirates, 10-6, both single elimination games before the Finals against the Mets.

The A's won game one, 9-5 with excellent pitching from Max Langer. He and Ganci and McKendry along with Meier and Petti have played their last games for Hertel North Park House teams and will be greatly missed. Game two evened the series for the Mets with a 6-3 victory played two nights later. Game three was a blow out 15-1 victory for the A's and a tremendous feeling for the three year coach who accomplished something just like his Dad did, helping him grow up in a sport that teaches all that you can go home as a winner. The Athletics are winners in Hertel North Park and Shoshone Park helps capture the memories.


during altercation.

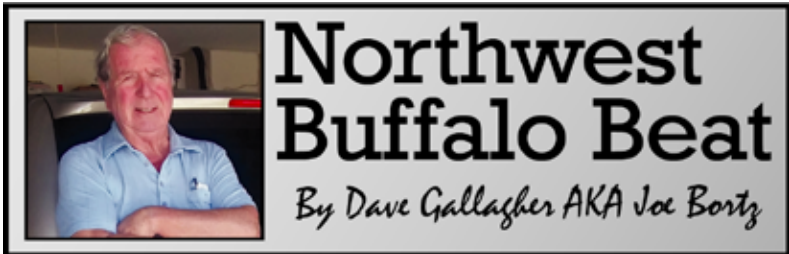

Ask Rusty – About Federal Taxation Of Social Security

Dear Rusty: Why are my Social Security benefits being taxed at all? The Social Security FICA payroll taxes taken out of my paycheck while I was working were paid with taxable income. Signed: Disgruntled Taxpayer

Dear Disgruntled Taxpayer: Many Americans share your belief that federal taxation of Social Security benefits is unfair because we pay into the program through payroll taxes on our taxable earnings. Unfortunately, Congress took a different view in 1983 when taxation of Social Security benefits was first enacted at a time Social Security was having financial issues. Congressional logic back then was that a beneficiary only personally pays 50% of the Social Security contributions made (the other half is paid by the employer) so, since your Social Security entitlement was only half paid for by you and the other half by your employer, the portion of your benefit attributable to your employer's contributions should be taxable. So, it's that other

half – the portion of your benefit which resulted from employer contributions – which the 1983 Congress decided should be taxed. So, starting in 1984, if a beneficiary's overall annual income from all sources exceeded \$25,000 for a single filer or \$32,000 for those filing married-jointly, half of that person's Social Security benefits became part of their income taxable by the IRS. That was how it worked until 1993 when a new and different Congress added another threshold which, if exceeded, resulted in up to 85% of Social Security benefits received during the tax year becoming taxable. The logic used for the 1993 law was that beneficiaries, on average, would only personally pay for about 15% of the lifetime benefits they would eventually receive, leading that Congress to conclude that if your combined income from all sources exceeded the higher threshold (\$34,000 for single filers and \$44,000 for those filing married-jointly), up to 85% of your benefits should be taxable.

Please understand that I'm not defending nor endorsing those historical Congressional views, but I have researched why Social Security benefits are taxable at all, and the above is what I've learned from that research.

For information, the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC), has long advocated for eliminating federal taxation of Social Security benefits or, at the very least, raising the thresholds at which benefits become taxable. The income thresholds for taxing Social Security benefits were established in 1983 and 1993, but those thresholds have never been adjusted for inflation. When taxation of Social Security started in 1984, less than 10% of beneficiaries paid income tax on their benefits, whereas today that percentage is over 50% and growing. If you want to add your voice to those who oppose federal taxation of Social Security benefits, you may wish to contact your Congressional Representative to do so. And it is worth noting that eleven U.S. states, to varying degrees, also levy income tax on Social Security benefits.

FUTURA2000 Creates New Mural With Buffalo AKG Public Art Initiative

York. Completion of the mural precedes the opening of FUTURA2000: Breaking Out, the first comprehensive retrospective exhibition of the artist's vast and multivalent career, at the University at Buffalo's Center for the Arts Gallery and Anderson Gallery on Saturday, September 23.

Futura (born Leonard Hilton McGurr) first came to prominence in the late 1970s and early '80s as a pivotal figure in New York City's robust graffiti scene. A pioneer of abstraction in the genre, his works on canvas established him as a significant voice within the contemporary art movement. In 1981, Futura was invited by The Clash on their European tour, during which he painted live backdrops onstage during each performance. Later, he created the sleeve for The Clash single "This Is Radio Clash" and the liner notes and lyrics sheet for Combat Rock.

In conjunction with FUTURA2000: Breaking Out, which is on view from September 23, 2023 through

February 11, 2024, the artist is collaborating with New Era Cap Company (presenting sponsor of the exhibition) and Oxford Pennant on limited-edition merchandise.

FUTURA2000: Breaking Out is curated by Robert Scalise, UB Art Galleries Director, and Zack Boehler, Buffalo AKG Public Art Project Coordinator. This presentation includes artworks from significant European and American collections. The exhibition is in partnership with Eric Firestone Gallery and the creative and artist management agency IC-NCLST/, representing the artist's fine art and commercial endeavors, respectively.

New Era Cap Company is the presenting sponsor of FUTURA2000: Breaking Out. Additional support is provided by M&T Bank, Charles Balbach, and Bronwyn Keenan.

The Buffalo AKG Public Art Initiative was established and is supported by leadership funding from the County of Erie and the City of Buffalo. Since its founding in 2013, in more

than fifty murals, installations, residences, and works of sculpture, the museum has sought to empower artists, inspire viewers, and strengthen a sense of our shared landscape with art that reflects the beauty and vitality of the many communities that shape it. Founded in 1862, the Buffalo AKG Art Museum (formerly the Albright-Knox Art Gallery) is the sixth oldest public art institution in the United States. For more than 160 years, the Buffalo AKG has collected, conserved, and exhibited the art of its time, often working directly with living artists. This tradition has given rise to one of the world's most extraordinary collections of modern and contemporary art. In June 2023, following the completion of the most significant campus development and expansion project in its history, the Buffalo AKG opened anew to the public. The project is funded by a \$230 million capital campaign, the largest such campaign for a cultural institution in the history of Western New York, including \$195 million raised for construction and \$35 million in additional operating endowment funds.

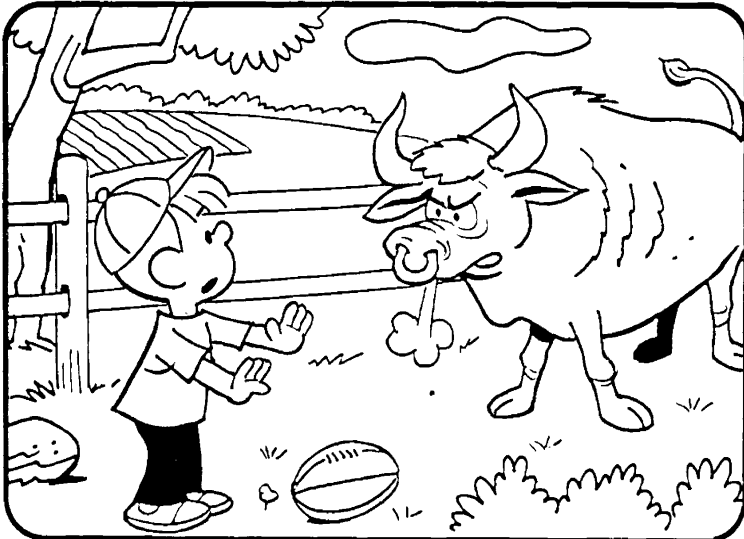

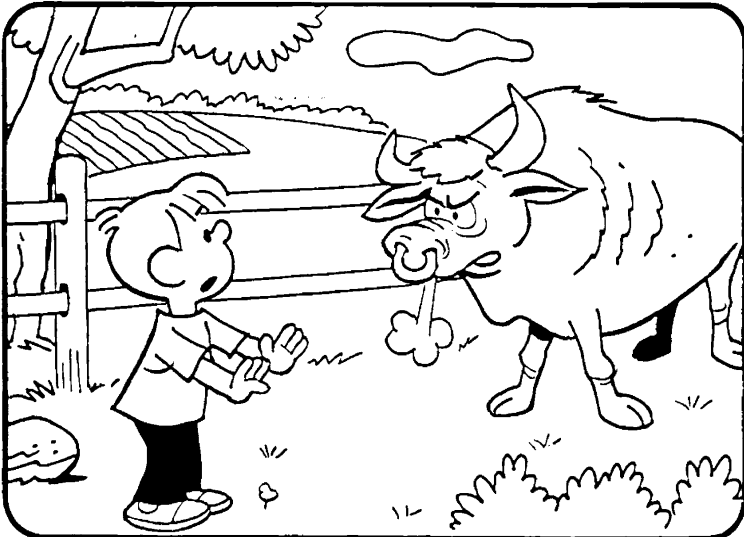

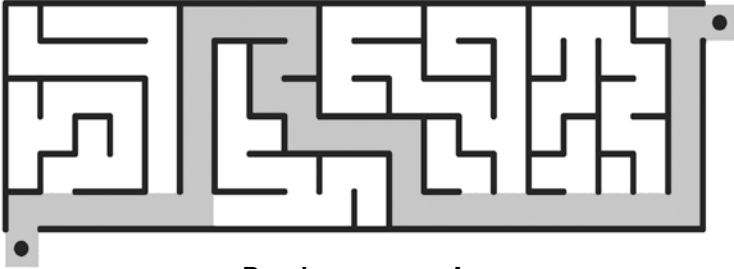
