

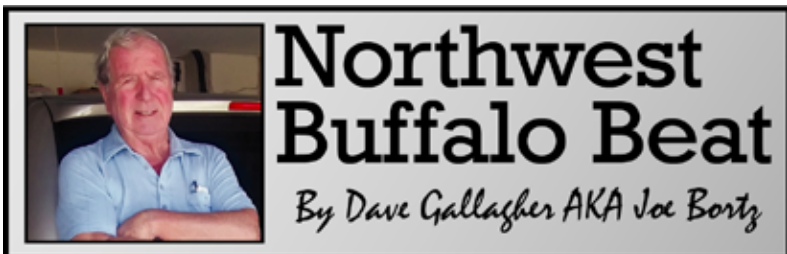

A beautiful international race and I do believe it still exists but it is called something different. In any case, I am referring to way back when. It's called International as it starts in the US and ends in Niagara Falls, Canada.

Starting on Lincoln Parkway and running through the West Side down Richmond and all the stately homes along the route on the American side of the event. Then over the Peace Bridge and into Canada. Along the Niagara River on the Canadian side with the finish line by the Horseshoe Falls at the Skylon Tower. If you have ever traveled that route, you know the beauty and spectacular scenery you encounter. As a runner in this race, it had to be special even though they did not have time to enjoy the surroundings.

The start of the race is relatively flat on the streets of Buffalo and it is not until you get to the uphill climb on the Peace Bridge that you encounter any real hill. After the Peace Bridge it is all downhill. The runners follow the river which as we know the water runs downhill and in the case of the Niagara River it runs swiftly. So, it must be really downhill. Then of course the end of the race is in one of the Natural Wonders of the World, Niagara Falls. Has to take first place as the most beautiful race as

far as ambience.

As I mentioned, it ends at the Skylon Tower. That in itself is something to behold. If you ever have been up there for dinner it has a spectacular view of the falls. On the day of the race the Skylon is open to the press. As I have mentioned many times in this column the press is treated like royalty. In this case after the race we (members of the press) are invited to a buffet up in the tower. An extensive display of all kinds of dishes made especially to impress the media. Spoiled brats.

In my experience over the years, I have learned how the media is made up of people who are always catered to and pampered. For example, on Disney World's 25th Anniversary they flew members of the press from all over the world to Orlando, free of charge. When we got there, we had first class hotel rooms, free. They fed us, gave us gifts, free drinks. And how about this? They closed Disney World to the public and all the rides and happenings were free to the press. No lines anywhere, we just walked onto any ride we wanted. And when we got off a ride there would be someone waiting with champagne and cookies. It was like being Pinocchio. Point is, these show how the media is treated.

Back to the Skylon and the race. Like I said, we were invited up to the tower for lunch. Fairly decent size crowd of reporters and photographers and general media. Back then print media was bigger than TV. Radio was also big.

Remember we had people from both sides of the border. Well, we were roaming around glad handing the people we knew. Just that there was one thing I recall about that lunch and will never forget.

Do not know why there was such a stir, but it was like the president was about to show up. Everyone gathered by the elevator to welcome this one person. I, at the time, had no idea who he was or what he did. The elevator doors opened and out stepped this young looking, curly black hair, thin man, who everyone was excited to meet. His name was Rick Jeanneret. He walked off the elevator and started shaking hands with the waiting group. He shook my hand, but I had no idea who he was, at the time.

He had a distinctive booming voice as we have heard so many times. He was very cordial and humble as he worked the room. At the time it was not a big deal, but in lat-

er years, and becoming a Sabres fan, that memory of the day in the Skylon Tower stays with me. I, like many Buffalonians, became a fan of "May Day! May Day!" and "Up Where Grandma Stores the Cookies!". "La La La Fontaine!". May he rest in peace.

Ask Rusty – How Do Disability Programs Affect Social Security’s Budget?

Dear Rusty: I read with interest an analysis of the history, reasons, and financial costs of the SSI (Supplemental Security Income) and SSDI (Social Security Disability Insurance) programs. My question is, specifically, what portion of the Social Security budget goes toward SSI and SSDI vs. for regular SS retirement income for those who paid into the fund during their working lives? How are the costs of SSI and SSDI covered by the federal government? When did these two sections of the budget enter the law and what was the impetus behind them? Signed: An Inquiring Mind

Dear Inquiring Mind: No part of Social Security’s “budget” is used to pay SSI (Supplemental

Security Income). SSI is a means-tested general assistance program for disadvantaged children and needy disabled adults and aged seniors who have very little income and very few assets. Federal SSI benefits are paid from the government’s General Treasury, not from Social Security Trust Funds. SSI is jointly administered by the person’s state of residence and the Social Security Administration, and the state usually provides additional benefits to supplement the financial assistance provided by the federal government under the SSI program. The Social Security Administration only administers the SSI program, it does not fund it.

By contrast, SSDI (Social Security Disability Insurance) benefits are for employed Americans who become disabled and unable to work full time. SSDI benefits are meant to provide limited income replacement for the disabled worker, and those benefits are paid from a separate Social Security “DI” (Disability Insurance) Trust Fund. The DI fund receives a portion (0.9%) of the FICA SS payroll taxes every American worker pays on their earnings and is used to pay disability benefits to eligible American workers who are unable to perform “substantial gainful activity” for a year or more. The eligibility criteria to collect SSDI are very strict, but those approved receive their benefits from this separate DI trust fund, not from Social Security’s Old Age and Survivors Trust Fund. Payroll

taxes collected for disability purposes are deposited in the DI Trust Fund as interest-bearing government bonds, and those DI assets are redeemed as needed to pay SSDI benefits. FYI, SSDI (disability) benefits stop when the person reaches full retirement age, at which point the beneficiary is automatically switched to regular SS retirement, and after which their benefits are paid from the regular “OASI” Trust Fund.

“Regular” Social Security retirement benefits, spousal benefits, dependent benefits, and survivor benefits are paid from Social Security’s Old Age and Survivors Insurance (OASI) Trust Fund, which receives most (5.3%) of the 6.2% FICA Social Security tax withheld from the paychecks of American workers. As of the end of 2022, the OASI Trust Fund held about \$2.7 trillion in interest bearing government bonds. Neither SSI or SSDI affect this “regular” OASI Trust Fund – only true SS retirement benefits and benefits for dependents of the retiree are paid from the OASI Trust Fund (As an aside, Social Security reform is needed to prevent the OASI Trust Fund from being fully depleted in 2033).

To answer your last questions, the Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) Trust Fund was established in 1956, after which SSDI benefit payments to eligible disabled American workers began. Federal “Supplemental Security Income” (SSI) assistance was codified into law in 1974. And, as you likely know, Social Security retirement, spousal and dependent benefits were enacted in the 1930s, before the first monthly Social Security check was mailed in January 1940. The impetus behind these programs? Avoiding poverty for the neediest among us. Without these programs, at least 22 million more Americans would be living below the poverty line.

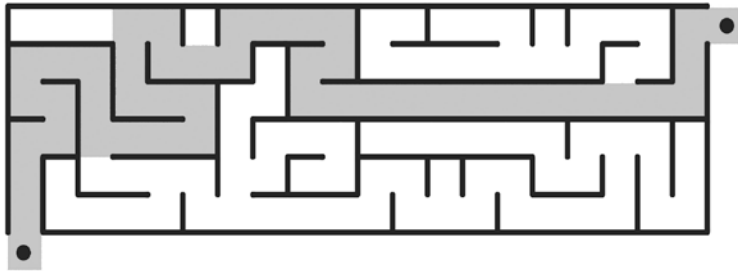
