PS 81 And McKinley High School Complete Rennovations



The new wing at Buffalo Public School 81 is completed and is ready to bring back students after the two years of reconstruction.

Buffalo Public School 81, on Tacoma Avenue and McKinley High School, on Elmwood Avenue, will open the school year with newly added school rooms and their renovations completed.

In January 2000, the Buffalo City School District embarked on an ambitious project of reconstructing virtually its entire stock of aging school buildings.

Ultimately costing over \$1.3 billion, the project is scheduled to be completed

in 2013. Divided into five phases, four of the phases consisting of forty-one schools have been completed and the fifth and final phase of seven buildings started construction last fall. Ultimately forty-eight Buffalo Schools will have been renovated.

What most people don't realize is that this is the largest historic preservation project in Buffalo's his-

Once the project was underway, the first step was to survey and evaluate all 78 buildings to determine

what work was needed to

provide students with the

learning environments.

Studies have found a significant increase in student's performance when they are taught in buildings with ample day lighting, proper temperature control and up-to-date technology. Generally, Buffalo's schools were still safe and clean and well maintained by their custodial staff but a number of deficiencies were found to exist.

These included inadequate power for computers and electronics, old plumbing, drafty windows, leaky roofs, inefficient heating systems, disabled ventilation systems and worn finishes. What became apparent, however, was the inherent quality of most of these buildings.

Constructed entirely of masonry, with large, bright windows, terrazzo floors, rich woodwork and elabo-

best twenty-first century rate auditoriums, these building could not be duplicated and would surely last decades more. It was determined that instead of building new schools; the existing ones would be renovated.

> Ultimately no one can deny the success of this reconstruction and historic preservation program. The district realizes that strong, successful schools are vital for the city to thrive. In addition, these facilities are the focal points within their neighborhoods and can be the catalyst for community redevelopment.

> Neighborhood schools are an asset that the suburban districts don't offer. With this project, Buffalo has been able to maintain the integrity of its architecturally significant schools while creating learning environments that are a match to any other in New York State.

'Hedda Gabler'

Things did not work out for Hedda Gabler. She married in haste, repented at leisure, a six-month honeymoon with an aspiring academic who spent most of it researching in libraries and museums. (Well, not quite all of it; she's pregnant).

Now Hedda has the home of her dreams and her nightmares, as well. Lovely, talented, intelligent, Hedda wants to wield influence, by proxy, if necessary. Previous squeeze Eilert has written the treatise to end all treatises (and not a moment too soon). Hedda schemes to booze him up, arm him, and dispatch him to a Scandinavian man-cave to inflict on himself, in her honor, a glorious demise.

Unclear on the concept, Eilert instead winds up in a "parlor house," minus his ground-breaking

script and other gems. For Hedda, this is too, too much.

In "Hedda Gabler," Norwegian playwright Henrik Ibsen wrote coldly of repressed women, yet daring to sketch his horrid heroine as somewhere between sick and sadistic. A Toronto critic described her as the original desperate housewife.

In a splendid production flavored with such modern slang as "cut to the chase," Shaw Festival Director Martha Henry fully employs the tiny playhouse's aisles, making the audience party to the plot. When Hedda whacked the doddering old housemaid, the Court House audience sounded ready to storm the stage and pre-empt the script by striking her down. Actress Moya O'Connell hastens her toward destruction with vivid discipline, daring the occasional bitter jest.

Jennifer Phipps is a treasure as the dusty servant, two shakes south of senility. Jim Mezon, last vear's definitive "Big Daddy," invests the cunningly controlling Judge Brack with sleek authority, modified by a dash of skepticism. Mary Haney is deliciously dotty "Auntie JuJu," omnipresent bane of Hedda's existence. Clair Jullien is fetchingly naïve as Eilert's new inspiration, Gray Powell slimily ambitious as that rising academic and Patrick McManus blindly affectionate as Hedda's hus-

While never chewing scenery, actress O'Connell last Wednesday did inhale an insect in Act One, ad libbing a sip of water to wash it down. The show went on. The bug did not. It was one of those moments that gives live theater its special appeal.

Running a taut 2:20, "Hedda Gabler" may taunt the tastes of the terminally optimistic, but if you must see it once, cut to the chase by Sept. 29.
