Stay Safe During Holiday **Celebrations**

Last year there were an estimated 9,600 fireworksrelated injuries throughout the country during the 4th of July season. Most of these injuries would not have occurred if the fireworks had been used under close adult supervision and if some basic safety steps had been taken. The National Council

on Fireworks Safety offers these common sense safety tips for using consumer fireworks in hopes that injuries to consumers can be greatly reduced this season:

- Always purchase from a reliable works source.
- Use fireworks as directed on consumer product safety

label; never alter products.

- Observe local laws and use good COMMON SENSE.
- Have a designated shooter to organize and shoot your family show.
- A responsible ADULT should supervise all firework activities.



A New Port of Call

Until the South Grand Island Bridge opened about this time in 1935, visitors arrived by boat, berthing at the east end of the rather unimaginatively named East Ferry Road (probably having embarked West Ferry Street.) Feasting frequently followed. When the bridge opened the ferry closed but now, almost 80 years later, dockside dining has returned.

Rocket Man visited on Father's Day. He could have stayed all afternoon, watching the boats pull in, the hot dogs pop and the clam broth emit its fragrant vapor. It was one of those "Goldilocks" weather days so coveted by Perry Jost, new proprietor of the Old Bedell Grill.

Here once stood the Bedell House, a Roaring 20's getaway destroyed by fire about a quarter-century ago. The late Charlotte Guenther kept the surviving shed going to her final days. Two schoolteachers

ran it as a summer job until they toted up the balance sheet and realized their profits amounted to less than minimum wage.

Enter Perry Jost, a Californian, and partner Deborah Saxton Lewis, Islander by birth. "Maybe I had different, West Coast, eyes," he told Rocket Man. "But what I saw was a long stretch of river without a lot of places to pull in."

A hand-hewn wooden deck extends about 20 yards out above the water, providing a full view of the Niagara River's every curve, and for the less adventuresome there are bumbershooted tables within a whiff of the grill. Actually, the olfactory sensations extend pretty far. Rocket Man watched several craft in mid-river suddenly turn west. Jost says a sea-level sign – not visible from land - heralds the Grill's presence, but also, "your nose will tell you."

The key to success, Jost says, is "consistency, just knowing that we'll always be there." It's open 11 a.m. until the indefinite dusk and last year ran 'til mid-October, this year perhaps not so long. Besides the standard dog-and-burger fare there are crab cakes (all gone by the time we arrived), clams, baked wings and a roasted chicken that was gaining raves on Father's Day. (We had a later engagement.)


Then there's the clam broth, which fuses the Grill's past and present. Charlotte always had it. "We're told she'd be proud of this," Perry says. Rocket Man agrees. (First Mate eschews all seafood fare.) Bring-your-own beer and wine are fine, but only in the utmost moderation.

Seven years ago, Perry and Debbie went whole hog into the bed & breakfast business, the Elizabeth House on Buffalo Avenue in Niagara Falls. Rocket Man has never seen such universally exclamatory reviews. Obviously, care counts, and now their little empire annexes one of our Planet Grand Island's most historic sites.



Theodore President Roosevelt may have said it best: "My fellow citizens, no people on earth have more cause to be thankful than ours..." Today, it is more important than ever to appreciate the rights and privileges we all enjoy as citizens of the United States.

The County Clerk's Office participates in naturalization ceremonies throughout the year and processes passport applications for new U.S. citizens from all over the world. On June 26th, I addressed a group of 51 people in a Naturalization Ceremony on the decks of the historic USS Little Rock.

This group represented 25 different countries including Germany, Iraq, Yemen, Ukraine, and France and joined generations of immigrants from every

corner of the globe to become Americans. As I saw them become U.S. citizens, I was reminded that with this title come rights so many others do not enjoy. To see firsthand the excitement on their faces and to speak with them about the new civil liberties they now possess as Americans is awe inspiring. It is valuable to remember how precious our rights as citizens truly are and that we should never take them for granted.

This year on July 4th we celebrate the 238th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, which may well be the most cited yet least read or understood document in American history. Why not take the occasion of our Nation's birthday to read the Declaration of Independence? The story of America is something to

marvel – a string of 13 colonies and a few dozen delegates defying the mightiest empire in the world to declare "these colonies free and independent."

Another part of truly appreciating your citizenship is exploring the history of the country that gave us these rights. You may want to explore the rich past of Erie County by visiting the Theodore Roosevelt Inaugural Site and the Buffalo Historical Museum. Even the County Clerk's Office in Old County Hall is rich in history, where the body of President William McKinley laid in state before his funeral and his assassin stood trial in the Ceremonial Courtroom upstairs.

We are fortunate to be United States citizens, and on Independence Day, it is something we should always remember.



Anthony Grisanti, Judo Instructor

Anthony M. "Tony" Grisanti, a longtime judo instructor and president and owner of Grow With Us Day Care on Niagara Street in Buffalo, died unexpectedly in his office. He was 63.

Born in Buffalo, he was a 1968 graduate of Kenmore West High School. After earning an associate's degree in electrical systems from Erie Community College, he became facilities engineer at Hauptman Woodward Medical Research Institute.

He took up judo as a youngster with his late father, Salvatore, his sister and his brothers. After obtaining his black belt, he and his family opened the Kin Tora Martial Arts Center in 1974.

In 1997, he and his

nephew, Nicholas Rastelli, opened Grow With Us Day Care. With his brother, Martin, he expanded it to two facilities serving more than 120 children.

He became an international judo referee, traveling to tournaments in England, France, Germany, Brazil and Abu Dhabi. He achieve the rank of Rokudan sixth-degree black belt.

He was vice president of New York State Judo Inc. and president of the Niagara Yudanshakai Black Belt Association.

Survivors include his wife of 40 years, the former Joyce Herkimer; two stepsons, Robert Gugino and William Gugino; his mother, Doris; two brothers, Martin and Robert; and a sister, Carol Rastelli.



Make a Designated Driver Part of Your 4th of July Plans

With backyard parties, cookouts and fireworks, the July 4th holiday is a favorite time of year for many Americans. But the celebrating can turn deadly when people drive after drinking alcohol.

"Impaired driving can turn celebrations into tragedy in an instant," said Monica Farrar, director of The Resource Training Center Drinking Driver Program. "With July 4th approaching, we're reminding people of the cost of impaired driving. In 2012, 179 people were killed in crashes over this holiday period. Of those deaths, 44 percent were in crashes that involved alcohol."

If you drive impaired, you not only put your life and the lives of others at risk, you also face a DWI arrest. The average DWI costs \$10,000, making it difficult to recover financially. Arrested impaired drivers also face jail time, the loss of their driver's license, higher insurance

rates, and dozens of other unanticipated expenses from attorney fees, fines and court costs to car towing and repairs, lost time at work and more.

The Resource Training Center recommends taking the following precautions:

- Plan a safe way home before the fun begins.
- If you're impaired, call a taxi, ask a sober friend or a family member for a ride, or use public transportation so you are sure to get home safely.
- If you see an impaired

driver on the road, don't hesitate to contact local law enforcement.

• If you know someone who is about to drive or ride while impaired, take their keys and help them make other arrangements to safely get to where they are going.

"Whether you've had way too many or just one too many, it's never worth the risk to drive impaired," Farrar said. "There's always another way home."



low young children to handle or use fireworks.

- Alcohol and fireworks do not mix. Save your alcohol for after the show.
- Use fireworks OUT-DOORS in a clear area; AWAY from buildings and vehicles.
- NEVER carry fireworks in your POCKET.
- Wear safety glasses whenever using fireworks.
- Always have water ready if you are shooting fireworks.
- Do not experiment with homemade fireworks.
- Never relight a "dud" firework. Wait 20 minutes and then soak it in a bucket of water.
- Soak spent fireworks with water before placing them in an outdoor trash can.
- Report illegal explosives, like M-80s and quarter sticks, to the fire or police department.

The National Council on Fireworks Safety urges Americans to follow common sense safety rules in their holiday celebrations.



and Chorus. Of course, no Independence Eve concert would be complete without several numbers to honor our brave servicemen and servicewomen.



Keep Pets Safe in Summer

Heatstroke can kill, and fast! Most pet owners realize that keeping pets in hot cars can kill them...but not many realize just how quickly the effects of heatstroke can set in for a dog or cat. Heatstroke is a condi-


tion animals begin to suffer gradually, but it accelerates quickly; it's easy for early signs of heatstroke to go unrecognized, and for the pet to be in an emergency situation within mere minutes.

On warm days, a vehicle acts like an oven. It holds the heat inside, and that heat becomes very intense even on days that don't seem too warm. On an 85-degree day, for example, even with the windows open, the temperature inside a car can climb to 102 degrees in 10 minutes, and to 120 degrees in 30 minutes. Because a dog's normal body temperature is 101-102.5 degrees Fahrenheit, he can withstand a body temperature of 107-108 degrees for only a very short time before suffering irreparable brain damage...or death. The typical signs of heatstroke are:

- Panting
- High body temperature
- Dehydration
- Red mouth/eye membranes
- Rapid, irregular heart rate
- Diarrhea
- Weakness, looking dazed

If a pet begins exhibiting any of these signs, contact a veterinarian immediately.

Also, use caution during summer months when leaving animals outside in



yards or on porches. Never leave them outside extended periods of time. Ensure appropriate shade and water are always available. Keep pets home during outdoor festivals.

Don't force exercise, primarily after a meal or in hot, humid weather.

Be careful where you walk! Avoid walking your dog in areas that you suspect have been sprayed with insecticides or other chemicals, or have puddles or spots of auto coolant. Watch what they eat and drink!

Keep your pets well groomed and clean to combat summer skin prob-

Keep pets safe while outdoors. Keep identification on all animals at all times. And remember...pets can get sunburned too. Speak with your veterinarian about applying sunblock to your pet's sun-sensitive areas, such as nose and

Use caution when making summertime purchases. When purchasing lawn and garden products, always read the labels for in-

gredients toxic to dogs, cats, and other animals. Fertilizers, weed killers, herbicides, pesticides, and other chemicals can be fatal to your pets.

Keep corn on the cob away from your dog. In August of 2013, SPCA veterinarians removed corn cobs from the intes-

tines of not one but TWO dogs! Both survived, but without veterinary treatment the results could have been fatal.

Bunnies need to keep cool too! Pet rabbits who live indoors with no air conditioning can benefit from an easy cooling technique. Rabbit owners can freeze a filled water bottle. Once the water bottle is frozen, it can be wrapped in a cloth and placed on the rabbit's cage floor.




