Two innings remain and the visitors lead 1-0, so another run would be vital. There it stands out at second base, two out, with their most reliable hitter due up.

Instead, the coach sends up a pinch-hitter, a bat so non-threatening it was being designated-hit for at second base. Pop-up, inning over, the scheduled batter stays in the game as catcher.

Such are the beauties of what Rocket Man calls Harvest League ball, similar to the TV comedy "Whose Line Is It Anyway?" in which "everything's made up and the points don't matter." That the visitors held that 1-0 edge to the final out is almost irrelevant. The game itself is the

The new coach is NAMED Griffin, Kim, how cool is

that? Wheatfield's Nikki Jacobs hit more than .500 for UB and Kenmore West's Charlotte Miller came out of the 'pen to douse a St. Bonaventure rally.

Now it's mostly scrimmages. Those Dixiecrats, who more or less dictate northern agenda, hate it when we flaunt our awesome autumns.

Except for the odd pickup game or indoor workout, and of course the legendary, if shrunken, Parochial League, it's all over for ball in Western New York.

Grab a rake and work off your regrets. Rocket Man's lawn awaits.


