Decorators' Show House



This year's Decorators' Show House, presented by the Junior League of Buffalo, is right here in North Buffalo. The Edward H. Webster House, located at 164 Lincoln Parkway, is a 6,600 square foot Arts and Crafts style home built in 1907-08. The house will be on display from April 25th to May 17th.

The Junior League of Buffalo announces that The Edward H. Webster House has been chosen as the location of the 2015 Decorators' Show House. The architecturally historic home is located at 164 Lincoln Parkway in Buffalo.

The Edward H. Webster House is a 6,600 square foot Arts and Crafts style home, circa 1907-08. Buffalo architects August Esenwein and James A. Johnson designed the home for

Edward H. Webster. Webster was a Buffalo native, born February 13th, 1852. He and his father were partners in their coal business at a firm named E. Webster, Son & Co.

The main house, site of the 2015 Decorators' Show House, is located near the Albright Knox Art Gallery and overlooks the Rose Garden at Delaware Park. A beautiful carriage house is located in the back of the meticulously kept property.

The Junior League of Buffalo has raised more than \$3.7 million to benefit the Western New York community through revenue generated by its Decorators' Show House.

You can view the Decorated House April 25th to May 17th, Tuesday through Friday from 10:00 am to 12:30 pm and 6 pm to 8:30 pm, and Saturday and Sunday from 10:00 am to 4:30 pm.




Self-righteous, self-aphumanitarians pointed trotted alongside, adding insults to injury, berating circus underlings and even, on occasion, Rocket Man. He was never, ever, so glad to reach a destination. It was only the back door of the Aud, but it looked like the Taj Mahal.

Even when B&B made its no-elephants-allowed announcement, the experience was still mostly and mercifully forgotten until, during an inexplicable fit of housekeeping, he unearthed photographic proof, dutifully dog-eared. And he wondered - all that sympathy for the elephants, none for him.

The following year, the circus anointed Rocket Man with clown makeup and he went flipping flapjacks with his temporary colleagues during a matinee, big-shoeing into the lower rows pretending to offer them for sale. A youngster gave him a dollar. "We've had reporters out doing this for 20 years, and I never saw one actually get money out of the crowd," Beep Beep observed with obvious admi-

"Thanks," said Rocket Man. "Anything but the elephants."

Reality Show, Gleaners?

We have all seen or heard of the reality shows, or supposedly reality, Pawn Stars, Storage Wars and American Pickers. Where hidden treasures are uncovered and found worth sometimes lots of money.

The trick is to know the value of the items to be purchased. Then you can determine what you are willing to pay in order to make a profit and purchase the product. In all cases it does include a purchase of something or cash out of pocket. There is one other way of getting items to sell without a purchase of any kind. It is called Gleaning.

I just learned the word myself even though I have been doing it for years. It is a fancy word for "garbage picking". We all know about garbage picking and it sounds so degrading. However, if you are willing to do it, it is a high profit venture. You pay nothing for the sellable item and your profit is 100% no matter what you sell it for. Yuk, who wants to go through other peoples garbage? You would be amazed at what is found in peoples trash. Especially in the high class neighborhoods were all they want to do is 'get rid of it' Put it out at the curb and it will be gone tomorrow You have heard the saying, "one man's trash is another man's treasure".

This all started when my boys were younger and with eight children, money was tight. The boys and I would go out on trash night to collect old newspapers. Back then you can take your old newspapers to the scrap

yard and get money for it. So we would go around and fill our station wagon with newspapers put out at the curb. The usual take in papers for a night was about \$20. It was worth it back then as twenty was like \$50 now. In our travels collecting we would see all kinds of valuable items put out for the garbage man. Sometimes you would wonder why they would throw something like that out. But it was there for the taking so in many case we took it. In one case it was jewelry from a Jewelry store. Lots of it that was tossed as it had been in a flood and not sellable to customers. Yet it was perfect in every way.

My younger brother's first job was a trash collector for the City of Buffalo. There were the throwers and the shakers. The throwers would toss the cans into the City dump truck and the shakers would shake the garbage out of them. Lot of hard work but that was the way they did it, back then. Anyway, it was not unusual to find valuable items in the trash and there was a place

on the garbage truck for the G men to store them until the work day was done. To make a long story short, it started my brother into a side career of selling antiques and he still does to this day.

One more story of a gleaner. There was a young fellow out at the flea market in Clarence that everyone called "Beaver". Do not even know his real name or never really did. Anyway, Beaver would rent a truck for a week and spend the nights driving around with his truck and pick up anything he thought would be of any value from the trash people put out. By Sunday morning he would have a truck load and pull into the flea market. He would then sell the items he "picked" at low prices right off the truck. Remember his only cash out was the truck rental and gas. His biggest customers were other vendors as his prices were so low, they could buy and sell and still make a profit. At the end of the day whatever he had left he would sell for a dollar and the rest he would just leave. He was there every week and everyone knew and liked him, except maybe the flea market people, who had to clean his mess when he left. Everyone was saddened when he died suddenly at a young age.

The boys and I did not go through the trash but if we were able to spot something of interest, we would take it. I still do. Recently when I was looking for frames to put old Rocket photos in, I spotted some nice frames put out at the curb and took them. They now hang in the Rocket office. One day a few years back, while walking in Kenmore there was a wooden antique sled set out at the curb. It was heavy and it was a long way home but I wanted it and took it. I eventually sold it for \$300. I guess I could be called a Gleaner.
