This eight week course will be held at the Buffalo Police Training Academy, Room 319, 68 Court Street, Buffalo, New York 14202. Classes will meet from 6 PM – 9 PM.

Rick Martin - Rico

On July 26th 1951, Richard "Rico" Martin was born in Verdun, Quebec. Martin was drafted by the Buffalo Sabres in the 1971 NHL Amateur Draft with the fifth overall pick. He was the Sabres first selection in their second draft, following the selection of Gilbert Perreault, the first overall choice in the 1970 draft.


Martin scored a then NHL record 44 goals as a rookie, breaking the record of 38 set by Perreault the year before. Perreault and Martin teamed with Rene Robert to form the famous "French Connection" line which swashbuckled their way in the NHL during the 1970's. Martin played for the Sabres for 10 years, tallying 695 points in 681 games along with 53 points in 63 playoff games.

Martin was an electrifying goal scorer and was he NHL's premier left winger in the 1970's. He created many memories for the fans and helped too establish the expansion Sabres as a solid franchise. On April 7th 1974, Martin scored three goals as the Sabres defeated the St. Louis Blues 5-2 at the Aud in Buffalo. Rick Martin led the way with three goals to become the first player in franchise history to score 50 goals in a season

He had some memorable performances in the annual NHL all star game. On January 25th 1977, Martin scored two goals in the 3rd period of the 30th NHL All Star Game including the game winner with 1:56 remaining. He led the Wales Conference all stars in a 4-3 victory over the Campbell Conference all stars earning MVP honors. Marcel Dionne assisted on both of Martin's goals. The game was played in Vancouver's Pacific Coliseum.

The next season in Buffalo the Sabres hosted the NHL all star game at the Memorial Auditorium on January 24th 1978. Gilbert Perreault and Rick Martin, played for the Wales Conference. Both players delighted their hometown fans by scoring with Martin tying the game with 1:39 remaining in regulation time and Perreault scoring the game winning goal 3:55 into overtime to defeat the Campbell Conference 3-2.

Rico suffered a career ending knee injury against the Washington Capitals when goaltender Mike Palmateer charged him and tripped him while on a breakaway. Following surgery to repair his knee, Martin was traded along with Don Luce to the Los Angeles Kings for two draft choices. One of those picks was used to draft Tom Barrasso. Martin played only four regular season games with the Kings over two seasons before he was forced to retire due to his injury. Martin picked up six points in those four games.

in on British justice practices and Native ransoms, pick sides for a mock wooden-musket battle, and play period games. Activities begin at 10 a.m. and continue throughout the day.

During the American Revolution (1775-1783), Fort Niagara was a strategic location for the British and their allies on the Niagara frontier. It also served as a safe place for British-aligned Native Americans and British loyalist settlers who were threatened and ousted from their communities by the Continental Army and its allies.

"The history of Fort Niagara as a strategic planning hub and safe place for refugees will be woven into the re-enactment ac-tivities," said Robert Em-erson, Executive Director of the Old Fort Niagara Association. "This event is a great way to learn about our region's role and alliances during the American Revolution and how they influenced the war."

Ongoing demonstrations include: woodworking, blacksmithing, Native American material culture, and foodways (cooking). The schedule is available online at https://www.oldfortniagara.org/event/100152/

The Officers' Club, just outside the fort's footprint, will be open during Soldiers of the Revolution" from 11 a.m to 4 p.m. for tours and access to the World War II display. The lighthouse will also be open from noon to 3 p.m.

Ask Rusty - State Pension May Eliminate Survivor Benefit

Dear Rusty: Please validate or negate this dreadful information: My husband and I are recently retired and living on our combined retirement plans. I was told that when my husband dies, I will NOT be allowed to draw ANY of his hardearned Social Security income. I cannot survive on my Louisiana teacher retirement alone. We were never informed of this until we had worked hard for 40 years & retired. Can you advise me on this dreadful turn of events. Signed: Bewildered in Louisiana

Bewildered: Dear Unfortunately, I don't have good news. If your teaching career and the associated pension were in the State of Louisiana, I'm afraid that any Social Security survivor benefit you might be eligible for from your husband will be impacted by the Government Pension Offset (GPO) – a provision of Social Security which applies to anyone with a pension from an employer who did not participate in the Social Security program. Louisiana is, unfortunately, one of 27 U.S. States whose employees

may be affected by the GPO, because neither you nor the State of Louisiana contributed to the Social Security program while you were employed there. It's unfortunate you weren't made aware of this by your employer, but it's well documented in the State's "LASERS" information which you can view at this link: https://www.lsuhsc.edu/ administration/hrm/benefits-retirement-nonss. aspx.

The GPO will reduce your Social Security survivor benefit by 2/3rds of the amount of your LA State pension, and if 2/3rds of your LA pension is more than your SS survivor's benefit, the Social Security survivor benefit will be eliminated. I know it's no solace, but you are not alone in your dismay over this provision. In fact, a bill is active in Congress to eliminate the GPO (and a sister provision known as the Windfall Elimination Provision, or WEP), but that bill has made little headway despite hav-ing 195 Congressional co-sponsors. The bill I'm referring to is known as the "Social Security Fair-

ness Act", which is House bill H.R. 1205 (there is a corresponding Senate bill S.915). You can examine it at https://www.congress.gov/bill/115th-congress/house-bill/1205, but I must let you know that very little progress has been made on this bill since it was introduced almost two years ago. For the record, the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC) has expressed support for the bill's passage, but to no avail in a Congress which is instead debating ways to resolve Social Security's larger financial issues which are now projected to deplete the Trust Fund by 2035. I'm afraid the only suggestion I can offer for your personal situation is to contact your Congressional Representatives and ask for their support and action on H.R. 1205 and S.915.


