#### Mother's Day is right around the corner this Sunday, May 12<sup>th</sup>.

Mother's Day is a holiday honoring motherhood that is observed in different forms throughout the world. In the United States, Mother's Day 2024 will occur on Sunday, May 12. Once a major tradition in the

United Kingdom and parts of Europe, this celebration fell on the fourth Sunday in Lent and was originally seen as a time when the faithful would return to their "mother church"—

the main church in the vicinity of their home—for a special service.

Over time the Mothering Sunday tradition shifted into a more secular holiday, and children would present their mothers with flowers and other tokens of appreciation. This custom eventually faded in popularity before merging with the American Mother's Day in the 1930s and 1940s.

It is a day which makes people remember the importance and significance of mothers in their life and is observed as a day to give special emphasis to the motherly figures around the world.

The new Don Morris Fields at Shoshone Park welcomed over 1,000 boys and girls this past Saturday morning on Opening Day to their 67th season under clear skies and green grass.

After a glorious march of a parade up Hertel

Avenue from Saranac led by the Buffalo Police Department Traffic Division and two Buffalo Fire Trucks, Byron W. Brown, the Mayor of Buf-falo guided the Her-

tel North Park Youth Baseball League through the busy Hertel Avenue Business District to start a season of fun for everyone in North Buffalo.

League president John Hornung and fellow members of his board of officers, joined his honor, the Mayor in directing all children safely through the eastbound lane of the Hertel strip for the mile walk to Shoshone Park. League coaches gathered their teams together, holding signs announcing their squad and chanting their name in a victory march. Dads put little ones on their shoulders and Moms pushed stroll-ers over the gray con-crete that is the path to a child's first success in the

fields of that tiny park near Main Street.

At the park, Hornung took the microphone first, situated at home plate of Diamond #1 and wel-comed all to Opening Day of the best youth organization that this City has

ever had, according to Morris and seconded by his hon-or, the Mayor. Hornung directed everyone's attention to the nearby United States Flag, flying over the left-

field fence near the league's headquarters for our National anthem, sung by a quartet of City Honors High School choristers.

Congressman Tim Kennedy, who shared his love for baseball while growing up in South Buffalo. Also on hand was newly elected Buffalo Common Council president Chris Scanlon, Delaware District Councilmember Joel Feroleto, Erie County Legislator Michael Kooshoian of the 3rd District, Buffalo City Court Judge and a member of the HNPYBL board, Peter Savage and the sheer elegance of Assemblywoman Crystal Peoples-Stokes of the State Assembly 141st District who spoke briefly about her sincere pleasure of being in a Park where "we are investing in our children.'







## Ask Rusty – Future Retiree Worried About Social Security's Future

**Dear Rusty:** I keep reading that the SSA will only be able to pay out 75% of benefits come 2033. If congress were to do nothing and this reduction in benefits occurred, would seniors already collect-ing benefits in 2033 have their benefits reduced or would it only be those who have not begun to collect have their future benefits reduced? I will be collecting my benefits no later than 2027 but my wife will not reach full retirement age until 2033 and we are looking for information on whether we need to adjust savings now to account for mine or my wife's possible reduction in benefits.

Thank you in advance for your service as a Social Security Advisor.

*nior:* If Congress does noth-

ing to prevent Social Security's reserves from depletion, Social Security – by law – will only be able to pay out benefits equal to income, which is estimated to be about 23% to 25% short of what will be needed to pay full benefits starting in 2033. That would mean everyone who is already receiving monthly Social Security benefits would get a payment 23% to 25% less than they were previously receiving. And without reform, new beneficiaries would get benefits similarly reduced.


The action needed to prevent those cuts from happening resides with Congress, and any program reform they enact would likely only affect those who are not yet collecting. Whether or how that would affect you and your wife as future SS beneficiaries depends on the scope of reform Congress will enact which, of course, is not yet known. That uncertainty, itself, is reason enough to bolster your savings for your future retirement.

The probability of Congress allowing the Trust Funds to be depleted, thus necessitating an across the board cut in everyone's benefit is, in my opinion, slim (it would be political suicide). Congress already knows how to fix Social Security's financial woes - they just currently lack the bipartisanship and political fortitude to do so. And it's doubtful any Social Security reform will happen this election year - rather, the opposing sides will likely just sling accusations at each other in 2024. But rest assured that both sides of Congress are acutely aware that reform of the Social Security program is needed soon, and we are already seeing signs that progress on reform may be forthcoming (but not until after the 2024 elections).

Congress is notorious for waiting until the last possible moment to act, and I don't suggest you alter your Social Security claiming strategy based on the unknown. But building a bigger nest egg for retirement is always a prudent goal. Also, calling your Congressional Representative to endorse needed Social Security reform which ensures your future benefits will not be cut would be a good move.

# Kearns Reminds Motorists Of REAL ID Deadline

Erie County Clerk Michael P. Kearns is reminding motorists of the May 7, 2025 deadline to obtain an enhanced or REAL ID, for which you will need to board a flight within the U.S., or enter certain federal buildings including military bases, unless you have a valid U.S. passport or another federally-accepted form of identification.

Kearns said, "The REAL ID process must be completed, in person, at any Erie County Auto Bureau. Our Motor Vehicle Represen-

tatives will verify the authenticity and

scan original or certified documents. We want the public to be ready. Do not delay the inevitable, review what original documents are required well before the May 7, 2025 deadline, which is exactly one year away. In our effort to make our customers visit quick and efficient, appointments are strongly encouraged."


To apply for a REAL ID driver's license or non-driver identification card, you must provide original or certified documentation that includes your date of birth and full name, such as a valid U.S. passport or passport card, a certified copy of a birth certificate with a raised/embossed seal, or an unexpired permanent resident card. No photo copies can be accepted.

You must also provide a document that displays your current legal name and full nine digits of the Social Security number. If your name has changed in any way and different from your proof of identity doc-

ument, you must provide proof of a legal name change such as a certified marriage certificate, court order, or adoption decree issued by

your county's family court. Finally, you must provide two printed documents that show that you are a current resident of New York State, such as a current, unexpired NY license or ID, rental or lease agreement, a credit card or bank statement, or a home utility bill, each with name and address.

"We also want the public to select the document is right for them as they do have a choice between an Enhanced Driver License (EDL), a REAL ID version, or simply maintain a Standard ID or Driver 's License," stated Kearns. "The EDL is the 'super-sized' REAL ID that also allows for cross boarder travel between Canada, Mexi-

co and some Caribbean countries by land or sea."

Only U.S. Citizens who are residents of New York can obtain an Enhanced New York State license. The additional fee for an enhanced driver licensed (EDL) or enhanced non-driver ID card (ENDID) is \$30.00. The fee is added to the other fees for the driver license or non-driver ID transaction.

There is no addition-

al cost to get a REAL ID driver license or non-driver ID. All normal transaction fees still apply. Neither the REAL ID nor the Enhanced versions can be used to fly internationally. All overseas flights to foreign countries do require a valid U.S. Passport book.
