Know And Follow The "Rules Of The Water"

Summer is here and nothing signals summer in Erie County like boating. Whether you are visiting the Erie Basin Marina, fishing in the Niagara River, cruising through Canalside or motoring to the Point

Abino Lighthouse, Western New York offers an abundance of waterproviding outstanding recreational opportunities for boating enthusiasts.

Just as there are "rules of the road" that govern the safe flow of traffic for vehicles, there are "rules of the waterways" that govern the safe maneuvering of boats. I encourage all recreational boaters and jet skiers to know the risks, learn the rules and be prepared before taking the helm this boating season.

New York State requires all persons are at least 10 vears of age to operate a motorboat, as well as all personal watercraft operators, born on or after May 1, 1996, successfully com-

> plete a state-approved 8-hour boater education classroom course and proctored exam. According to research conducted by the National Association State Boating

Administrators Law (NASBLA) in 70 percent of all boating fatalities the operator had not taken a boating safety class. A list of an approved Boater Safety Course near you can be found at nysparks.com/rec-

reation/boating. State law also requires that any motor-driven watercraft must be registered

with the New York Department of Motor Vehicles (NYS DMV). If you use a motor (electric or fuel-driv-en), regardless of the size of your boat or the motor, you must register your boat. I encourage you to take this opportunity to "Renew Local" and help keep a portion of your registration fees local by registering your boat in person at any one of our Erie County Auto Bureau A completed branches. Boater Registration/Title Application (MV-82B), proof of identity, date of birth and proof of ownership are all required to register a boat. For additional information, please contact the Erie County Clerk's Outreach Center at 716-858-8864 or visit erie.gov/clerk.

SPCA Issues Hot Weather Reminders To Keep Pets Safe

Temperatures are predicted to be in the high 80s/low 90s in Buffalo and the surrounding area very soon. It's important to remember pets don't fare as well as some of their owners on these hot days. The SPCA Serving Erie County has issued the following hot weather pet safety tips:

H E A T STROKE CAN KILL, AND FAST.

Most pet owners realize that keeping pets in hot cars can kill them...but not many realize SERVING just how quickly the effects of ERIE COUNTY heatstroke can set

in for a dog or cat. And we're not only referring to 80-degree days; animals suffer heatstroke even on much cooler days.

Heatstroke is a con-

dition animals begin to suffer gradually, but it accelerates quickly. It's easy for early signs of heatstroke to go unrecognized, and for the pet to be in an emergency situation within mere minutes.

On warm days, a vehicle acts like an oven. It holds the heat inside, and that heat becomes very intense even on days

that don't seem too warm. On an 85-degree day, even parked in the shade with the windows open, the temperature inside a car will climb to 104 degrees in 10 minutes, and to

119 degrees in 30 minutes. With the humidity we experience here in Buffalo, it may go even higher. Because a dog's normal body Continued on page five.





In Memoriam To Rusty Agostino



In memory of Rusty Agostino.

This week, with the permission of this newspaper, we are republishing the Sports column that ran in issue 14 of last year, April 6th about Lori and Michael "Rusty" Agostino after they announced they were retiring as long-time Coaches in the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League.

It is with great sadness to learn of the sudden death of Michael Agostino of natural causes this past Monday in their North Buffalo home. He and his wife spent more than 40 years coaching Baseball to thousands of area High School boys, ages 13 to 15 in the Senior Division of the 67 year old League since the early 1980's. Their team, the Tigers, were always very competitive against other house teams in their Division like the Dodgers, Mets, Athletics or DBacks that would play regularly after Memorial Day on Diamond 5 in Shoshone Park.

For many years, both Lori and "Rusty" helped the League by agreeing to Coach in the new Travel League Divisions that Hertel North Park joined against many suburban youth leagues all around Western New York and do very well on the diamonds beyond Shoshone Park.

In the many years that the Buffalo Rocket has given free space to the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League since 1982, the Agostino family has shown this community what it's like to grow up in North Buffalo and compete in a sport that is the oldest past-time that this Country has ever had.

The news hit hard and fast. It was almost like a baseball being thrown into a catcher's mitt up on the Senior Diamond of Shoshone Park. It read in part: After 40 years, many of which were spent in first place, long-time Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League coaches, Lori Agostino and her husband Mike, better known as "Rusty," have decided to retire from coaching house baseball at Shoshone Park. We cannot thank them enough for their dedication to youth baseball and our program through the years.

Thanks for the memories everyone, but it's time to give it up," said Lori Agostino in a phone conversation earlier this week. "We want to be able to see our grandkids play their games here and grow up, loving the sport we've loved, all these years."

Both Lori and "Rusty' have been a huge part of a young boys life here in North Buffalo when it came to coaching their players from the ages of 12 or 13 until they reached their junior years in high school. This was the Senior Division of Hertel North Park, ages 13-16, in a level of play that didn't begin until after the Memorial Day weekend. Their team, the Tigers, always proved to be very much fierce competitors to the usually seven or eight opposing teams in the Senior Division.

Every team makes the Playoffs in Hertel North Park and by the season's end, the Tigers always found a way to be in the mix of winning a Championship for the 12 or 13 member players on the team. Just as the season changes from late Summer to early Fall in August, so too would the Tigers make games exciting for opponents like the Dodgers, Orioles, Mets or

Phillies in any given year.

"We love this Park," said
Lori. "Even though we're leaving the dugout, we'll still be around. We enjoy watching these other games, she said, speaking for Rusty as well. "This is where we raised our kids, Danny, Eric and Rita years ago and now we want to see our Gabby (Gabrielle) grow

up and have fun here in this Park.'

Besides coaching the gers, the Agostinos Tigers, would help the League by coaching various travel teams like the Blaze or the Knights on other diamonds throughout WNY. Their biggest competitor has been the Lou Gehrig Baseball League, located in nearby Getzville, a fierce rival. In 2011, the pair coached the 13-15 year old Blaze team in the District Championship after beating Lou Gehrig by one run in a close game and advanced to the States.

That was probably our happiest moment as coaches here in this Park," said Lori. "What a team we had. They all played one of the best games we've ever been a part of. They were awesome."

The names of the players on that team are still fresh in their heads from that year. They were: Tim O'Sullivan, Kyle Turk, Patrick Lomot, Eric Adolf, Tony Ballisteri, Moe Jordan, Colin Sullivan, Tasio Pieri, Dominic Amoia, P.J. Napolitano, Ryan Christo-pher, Mike Naples, Connor Naughton, Adam Moore and Matt Wolf. They were all players from the house Boys Division Senior teams like the Tigers, Orioles, Dodgers, Braves, Red Sox and Yankee teams at the time.

Since the announcement, many former North Buffalo players and families expressed their grati-tude to "their coach" after all these years. "Thank you for all your dedication over the years," said Joe Luzio. "You both have made a life-long impression on so many of us." "A priceless gift to the Shoshone families, thank you," said Kelly Aman-Gangi. "You've watched and molded a lot of good ball players come out of the City," said Mike Rizzo. "Nothing but great memories from you both," said Stacy Tolley-Jordan. "You coached my brother, cousins, nephews and then my son. I still think of those days and miss them very much." "Lori goes back even further," said Michael Mazzara, "to Delaware-Hertel Baseball. She and Frank Fragale were my first coaches in 1977. She must have started coaching when she was a lot younger."

Ťhe feelings of gratitude by the Shoshone family could fill this newspaper, but Rusty and Lori step away after raising three beautiful children them-selves through Shoshone Park and giving countless others a chance to fulfill their dreams baseball or softball in Shoshone Park.

Serial Theft On **Delaware Avenue**







Ask Rusty – Why Is There A Social Security Earnings Limit?

Dear Rusty: I try to read your article in the Carmichael Times each week and appreciate the information you provide. I am 62 and considering my retirement options and when I should do that to get the most benefit. I understand my full retirement age is 67, but what I don't understand, and I hope you can answer, is why there is such a thing as the Social Security earnings limit? I know that if I was to retire before 67. my benefits would be reduced. But since I have been paying into SS for 45+ years, and that money is technically money I have earned, why does SS care if I make more than the earnings limit? It doesn't affect them or my benefits. Can you tell me about the reasoning behind the earnings limit? I will, for many years after "retiring," continue working in my field.

Thank you in advance for your service as a Social Security Advisor.

Dear Working Amer*ican:* This is a great question and, as a point of interest, our parent company, the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC), advocates doing away with Social Security's earnings test which affects those collecting benefits before reaching their SS full retirement age (FRA). In AMAC's view, it discourages people from working and, thus, paying Social

Security taxes on their earnings. It is, after all, SS taxes from the earnings of working Americans which largely pays for the benefits provided to Social Security beneficiaries. Eliminating the restriction would tend to improve Social Security revenue and help ease Social Security's current financial stress.

The reasoning behind the earnings test? Well, when Social Security was first enacted in the 1930s, the intent was that Social Security was for retired workers, meant to keep them from poverty in old age. The logic back then was that if a person worked they didn't need Social Security to sustain them, so those who worked could not collect Social Security at all. The current rule, after many adjustments over the years, says that annual earnings for those who collect early SS benefits are limited. If each year's earnings limit (\$22,320 for 2024) is exceeded, Social Security will take away \$1 in benefits for every \$2 over the limit (FYI, the penalty is less severe in the year FRA is attained).

Historical accounts suggest that the reasoning behind the wording in the original Social Security Act – that "No person shall receive such old-age annuity unless... he is not employed by another in a gainful occupation" – was quite controversial, except for the fundamental thought

they didn't need Social Security. Over the ensuing decades the rule has been softened to provide that only those who collect benefits before their full retirement age (FRA) would have a portion of their SS benefits offset by their work earnings. In any case, the earnings test, in its mitigated form, still persists today. FYI, H.R. 5193 - The Senior Citizens Freedom to Work Act was recently introduced in Congress proposing to repeal the SS earnings test but has not advanced in the legislative process since introduced in August 2023.

In any case, under current rules, if you continue working after your FRA, the earnings test will not apply to you. And, if you lose any benefits before your FRA due to the earnings test, when you reach your FRA you'll get time credit for any months that benefits were withheld, resulting in a somewhat higher monthly payment after your full retirement age.

One final point: if you continue to work after starting your Social Security benefits and your recent earnings are higher than any of those in the inflation-adjusted 35 years used to originally calculate your benefit, your entitlement will be recalculated to give you credit for those higher recent earnings.

Continued from page one. impaired or intoxicated through the consumption of either alcohol or drugs. Alcohol impairs one's ability to function properly and is a factor in 30 percent of all boating related fatalities. In an effort to send a clear message to our young boaters, New York State has enacted legislation, for those under 21 years of age, providing for the suspension or revocation of operating privileges if caught drinking while operating a vessel.

One last safety tip, and possibly the most import-

ant, is to always wear a life jacket and make sure your passengers do as well. Seventy-nine percent of all recreational boat drownings occurred when boaters did not wear a life jacket. Wear It! A life jacket will help ensure you and everyone on board returns home safely.

Everyone should do their part to make sure the waters are safe. Your time on the water should be enjoyable for you, your family, friends and your fellow boaters. I hope you enjoy the summer season by boating smart and boating safe!
