Community Foundation Announces Grant Process Open for Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Arts & Culture Initiative

The Community Foundation for Greater Buffalo is now accepting applications for the 2024 Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Arts & Culture Initiative competitive grant process in two categories and the deadline to apply is September 16, 2024, at 4:00

Since the inception of the Arts & Culture Initiative, the Community Foundation has prioritized community feedback in the creation of this annual funding opportunity. In 2024, an Advisory Committee was convened to further evolve this funding. The Advisory Committee members synthesized data from the two previous grant years and drew heavily on

their own experiences working in grassroots arts nonprofits organizations and as reviewers for grant processes beyond the Community Foundation. The Committee also considered learnings from 70 grant feedback calls in response to the 2023 application process, conducted by the Director of Arts and Culture. Finally, the Committee thought carefully about the similar and distinct needs across the nine WNY counties which include urban and rural communities.

The result of this work is two funding opportunities for 2024:

Combined Capacity-Building and General Operating Funds: \$15,000 for organizations with at least one full-time (or one FTE) staff member to help organizations build the solid foundation necessary to pursue an ambitious mission and vision;

General Operating Micro Grants: up to \$2,500 for organizations with less than one full-time staff member to execute immediate programming.







Will My Wife Get A Spousal Benefit From Me? - Ask Rusty

Dear Rusty: I will be turning 70 (yikes) this coming November. I will begin taking my Social Security benefit at that time. My age 70 SS benefit will be approximately \$4,500 per month. My spouse (who is currently 74) began receiving her SS benefits about 10 years ago – before her FRÅ. She approximately receives \$1,900 per month.

My question is, based on my expected SS monthly benefit of approxi-mately \$4,500, would my spouse be eligible for an increase in her monthly SS benefit? I've read some articles about this topic, but none of them seem to be on point - so I thought I'd reach out to you.

Dear Seeking: Congratulations on choosing a claiming strategy which will maximize your Social Security. Waiting until age 70 to claim guarantees you will get the most you can personally receive for the rest of your life, along with annual Cost of Living Adjustments (COLA). But the spouse benefits available to your wife when you claim are not based on your age 70 amount. Rather, spouse benefits are calculated using full retirement age (FRA) amounts. Here's what that means:

If your age 70 benefit will be about \$4,500 then your FRA amount was

likely around \$3,450. If your wife claimed at, say, 64, then her FRA entitlement would probably have been around \$2,200. Your wife will only get a spousal boost if 50% of your FRA amount (not your age 70 amount) is more than her own FRA entitlement. From what you've shared, 50% of your FRA amount would be about \$1,750, which is less than your wife's FRA entitlement (and her current age 64 amount), which means that she would not be eligible for a spousal boost to her own amount from you.

Spouse benefits can be tricky, because they're based on FRA entitlements, regardless of the age at which benefits are actually claimed. That is not so, however, for surviving spouse benefits. If you were to predecease your wife, her benefit would be your entire \$4,500 amount, instead of her own smaller current amount. Surviving spouse benefits are based on the amount each of you are currently receiving, not on your amounts at your full retirement age.

I hope this answers your question, but we're always here if you need any further assistance.

Camp Sam Wood and Camp Scouthaven **Inspire Youths to Learn through Fun**

Two premier youth camps owned by the WNY Scout Council are welcoming hundreds of kids to fresh air and freedom this summer. Nestled in the hills of Western New York, Camp Sam Wood in Pike, N.Y., and Camp Scouthaven in Freedom, N.Y, provide skills,

life skills, values-based programming and many f u n activities for girls and boys, ages 5 to 18, at both overnight and day camps during July and early August.

Over their long histories, both camps have welcomed tens of thousands of campers, including more than a thousand Scout youth and adult leaders this summer. Cub Scouts, who are organized into "packs," are elementary-aged girls and boys from ages 5 to 11. Scouts BSA youth are middle- and high-school aged girls and boys, ages 11 to 18, and are organized into "troops."

"Scouting teaches children skills they need for life, like leadership, citizenship and good character, and it uses camping and the great outdoors as the classroom," said Gary Decker, President and CEO of the WNY Scout Council. "The importance of providing high-quality summer camps where kids can find fresh air and freedom is so important and we want even more Western New York children to have the opportunity to know about and attend our camps."

Camp Programming

Each day of summer camp at Camps Sam Wood and Scouthaven starts with a flag ceremony and rollcall, where each Cub Scout pack or Scouts BSA troop lines up, in uniform, while holding their group's flags, for the raising of the American and camp flags. The Scouts are invited to have fun with rollcall, with witty remarks, songs, or slogans that are often in line with the camp theme. Each day ends in a similar way with the retirement of the flags. Citizenship, patriotism and tradition are evident in these

ceremonies.

Programming at camp is tailored to older or younger Scouts, but the goal is the same: learning through fun! Activities include:

First aid, fire-making, Dutch-oven cooking, campsite setup






