

The Buffalo AKG Art Museum announced that submissions for the 28th annual Art Alive celebration are open until September 13. Art Alive will occur on Saturday, October 19, from noon to 2 pm, and invites participants to create living representations of famous works of art for

great prizes. These BUFFAL stunning replicas often called AR tableaux-

can be made using people, props, and creativity. Anyone can participate, including students, community groups, organizations, families, and individuals.

This year, the museum is celebrating all things Buffalo AKG. Participants are invited to take a closer look at the museum's collection and AKG Public Art Initiative as they select their tableaux.

More than \$4,000 in prizes will be awarded to the creators of winning tableaux. Local judges will select the Judges' Choice, Best Craftsmanship, and \mathbf{Most} Éntry. Creative These awards will be given in each category: School Groups Grades K-8, School

Groups Grades 9-12, Individual Adults (Ages 18+), Individual Kids and Teens (Ages 17 and under), and Households/Community Groups.

The AKG invites the entire community to join Art Alive to see the overwhelming creativity on display and vote for your

favorite tableaux in the People's Choice Awards. There will

be music, art activities, and more to celebrate this special community event.

In celebration of Marisol: A Retrospective, there will be a category dedicated to Marisol artworks in the museum's collection.

Founded in 1862, the Buffalo AKG Art Museum (formerly the Albright-Knox Art Gallery) is the sixth-oldest public art institution in the United States. For more than 160 years, the Buffalo AKG has collected, conserved, and exhibited the art of its time, often working directly with living artists. This tradition has given rise to one of the world's most extraordinary collections of modern and contemporary

In June 2023, following the completion of the most significant campus development and expansion project in its history, the Buffalo AKG opened anew to the public. The project was funded by a \$230 million capital campaign, the largest such campaign for a cultural institution in the history of Western New York, including \$195 million raised for construction and \$35 million in additional operating endowment funds.

More than 300 Artworks have been acquired Since May 2023, Including 178 Artworks from the Marisol Bequest. North Carolina Stabber **Apprehended On Huntington**

North Buffalo August 17, 2024

Huntington Avenue -Suspect did strike victim in torso and face causing pain and bruises.

August 17, 2024

Huntington Avenue -While investigating a stabbing call at 90 Huntington Avenue, the defendant fled the scene and failed to stop when officers gave verbal commands. The male continued to be hostile and aggressive towards officers once he was stopped. The defendant's actions impeded officers from conducting the investigation. Male was found to have an active murder warrant from Wilmington, NC.


August 17, 2024



Federal Retiree Asks About His Social Security - Ask Rusty

Dear Rusty: I retired with a (gross) \$4600 per month Civil Service Retirement System (CSRS) annuity from the US Postal Service in December 2022. I am 66 and will attain full retirement age in November of this year. I know at that point I will not be subject to the "earnings" test, but I will be affected by the dreaded "government offset." I HAVE earned enough quarters and will be eligible for a small social security benefit. First question: will my Social Security benefit just be re-duced, or will it be eliminated? Second: will it make a difference if I apply in November or when I turn 70? I am currently working part-time and paying Social Security FICA taxes. Third: if my SS is being eliminated, do I even have to apply? Fourth and last: I am married, filing jointly and my wife is currently receiving SS benefits (only). Could I also be affected by the "windfall" provision if my wife prevention and the second of the seco

Thank you in advance for your service as a Social Security Advisor. Signed: Upset to Offset and Downfall to Windfall

Dear Upset: You are correct that when you reach your full retirement age (FRA) in November you will no longer be subject to Social Security's "earnings test," which limits how much you can earn while collecting early benefits. But if you apply for your Social Security to start in

OF THE 70'S & 80'S!

November, your SS benefits will be affected by the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) due to your non-covered CSRS pension (because you didn't pay into SS while earning your CSRS pension). As you may know, only those federal employees who retired under CSRS (Civil Service Retirement System) are affected by WEP; newer Federal employees who retire under the more recent FERS (Federal Employee Retirement Program) program are not affected.

Because of your CSRS pension, your Social Security benefit will be reduced, but not eliminated. The amount of reduction will be based on the number of years of non-government employment you had (where you paid into Social Security). Usually, those who have spent a lifetime earning a pension without contributing to SS, but who have a separately earned SS pension, will see their benefit cut approximately in half.

To answer your second question, your benefit will, indeed, continue to grow if you wait until you are age 70 to claim Social Security. Benefits taken after one's full retirement age earn "delayed retirement credits" (DRCs), which add to your final benefit amount. Your benefit will still be reduced by WEP, but your final amount will be more because you waited longer to claim.

Re your third question, your SS benefit will only be reduced (not eliminated), so it's always worthwhile to apply. Otherwise, you are forfeiting Social Security money you are entitled to.

And lastly, if your wife dies before you, your CSRS pension will also cause another provision called the Government Pension Offset (GPO) provision to apply. The GPO will reduce your surviving spouse benefits by 2/3rds of the amount of your government CSRS pension, which will likely eliminate any spousal benefit you are entitled to (except the so-called "death benefit" - which is a one-time lump sum \$255 benefit paid to a surviving spouse).

Rules Of The Road When It Comes To School Bus Safety

Motorists must stop when a school bus flashes its red lights - It's the law.

As summer winds not re down, children so across Erie County are heading back to school and the "Yellow School Buses" once again dot our road ways. For a majority of the over

121,000 students throughout Erie County, the school day begins and ends with a trip on a school bus. Many children will be going to school for the first time and may not be as careful when crossing the street or running to catch the bus. Older children know the routine, but may forget in their excitement to catch up with friends. Unfortunately, each year some bus trips to school end in tragedy -children are injured or killed in school bus incidents when motorists fail to follow the rules of the road. Data has shown that on a single school day, an estimated 50,000 drivers throughout New York State illegally pass stopped school buses. Although drivers are required to stop for a school bus when it is stopped to load or unload passengers, children should not rely on them to do

so, a fact that parents should discuss with their children prior to the start of the school

The rules
of the road
in New York
State are specific when it

comes to school buses. Drivers need to know and obey the "flashing signal light system" that school bus drivers use to alert motorists of pending actions. Yellow flashing lights indicate that the bus is preparing to stop to load or unload children. That is the time to slow down and prepare to stop your vehicle. Red flashing lights and extended stop arms indicate that the bus has stopped, and that children are getting on or off the bus. Motorists must stop their cars at least 20 feet away from the bus and wait until the red lights stop flashing, the extended stop sign is withdrawn, and the bus begins moving before they can start driving again. When

a school bus stops and flashes its red lights, traffic approaching from either direction must stop before reaching the bus: on a two-lane road, on multi-lane highways, or on divided highways.

All drivers should know that the fine for passing a stopped school bus ranges from a minimum of \$250 and up to \$400 and/or up to $3\overline{0}$ days in jail for the first violation. Additionally, a conviction places 5 points on your driver's license and may result in increased insurance premiums. If convicted of three violations in three years, your license will be revoked for a minimum of six months. It goes without saying that even one instance of passing a stopped school bus is not only reckless, but also unacceptable, and it could mean the life of a child.

Parents, it is important to talk with your child, or children, about school bus safety. Children need to know to stand at least three giant steps (6 feet) away from the curb when waiting for the bus to arrive. Children must also wait until the bus comes to a complete stop, the doors open, and the driver says it is okay before stepping onto the bus.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the greatest risk is not while riding on the school bus, but getting on or getting off. Children need to be reminded to be cautious in and around the "danger zone" of the school bus, which is the 10 feet in front, behind and on

each side of the school

When the new school year begins in the coming weeks, I remind motorists not to drive distracted, slow down around school zones and be alert for children

approaching or exiting school buses. If we all exercise a little extra care and caution, drivers and pedestrians can co-exist and together, we can all enjoy the upcoming school year safely.
