Activities and messages this month underscore the need for unified support in creating breastfeeding, chest-feeding and lactation-friendly environments, especially in workplaces

sioner of Health Dr. Gale Burstein. "For those who are able, breastfeeding offers your child the best possible start. It is proven to lower risks for asthma, type 1 diabetes and obesity. Breastfed babies have

fewer ear infections stomach bugs, and fewer problems with digestion. And antibodies in human milk provide strong against immunity some diseases."

Breastfeeding matters for postpartum recovery - recovery after birth. It reduces risks for breast ovarian cancers, type 2 diabetes and high blood pressure. And for

families, breastfeeding is a less expensive choice than formula.

Health experts, including the American Academy of Pediatrics, recommend exclusive breastfeeding for about the first 6 months. After that, continue breastfeeding while introducing solid foods, for as long as it's mutually desired—up to 2 years or beyond.

Erie County offers resources to employ-ers through its Breastfeeding, Chestfeeding and Lactation Friendly Worksite program. This program supports employers in providing private, comfortable spaces Continued on page six.

"Unruly Spaces" Series At Buffalo Arts Studio

Buffalo Arts Studio is proud to announce Unruly Spaces, a year-long series of exhibitions, artist-led workshops, and public panel conversations running from August 2025 through April 2026. Presented in partnership with grassroots community empowerment organizations, Unruly Spaces will examine systems of exclusion and erasure while fostering inclusive critical dialogue through the lens of contemporary art.

This initiative supports new work by artists who address colonialism, immigration, and cultural identity. It reflects Buffalo Arts Studio's commitment to fair compensation for artists, socially engaged programming, and curatorial collaboration that balances community voice with artistic vision.

The series opens August 22, 2025, with concurrent solo exhibitions by textile artist Davana Robedee (Syracuse, NY) and multimedia artist Sam Modder (Tampa, FL). Robedee's large-scale shibori works incorporate indigo dye grown and extracted from plants she cultivates. She will lead indigo workshops focusing on the indigenous West African roots of the dye. Modder's figurative drawings and collages depict powerful Black female characters occupying real and imagined landscapes. Her work reframes history through the lens of the Black imaginary, imagining alternate realities that confront structural oppression.

On September 26, Jozef Bajus (Buffalo, NY) will debut Everything Stays, featuring works created from two decades' worth of reclaimed materials. Bajus transforms discarded objects into poetic constructions that inspire reflection on sustainability and creative reuse.

A panel discussion titled Blue Jeans and Black Hair: Decolonizing Standards of Fashion and Beauty will take place on October 24, bringing together academics and activists from Buffalo State University and Buffalo Fashion Runway.

Beginning January 23, 2026, Millie Chen (Buffalo, NY/Ontario, Canada) will present drawings that trace hidden histories along the Niagara River. Her work reveals unmarked sites of cultural and historical significance, from Underground Railroad crossings to early Indigenous settlements. Showing alongside Chen is Victoria Udondian (Buffalo, NY), whose work challenges cultural and racial assumptions shaped by global migration and the legacy of colonialism.

In February 2026, Buffalo Arts Studio will partner with Stitch Buffalo to present a collaborative community exhibition featuring refugee women artists. This project will center stories of coexistence, cultural resilience, and self-expression through textile and mixed-media works.

Unruly Spaces affirms the role of artists and curators in building equitable cultur-

al platforms and reshaping collective understanding through collaboration, education, and bold creative practice.

Buffalo Arts Studio (BAS) connects diverse communities through visual arts, offering inclusive exhibitions, educational programs, mentorships, and public art initiatives. BAS provides vital resources for visual artists, including affordable studio space and paid opportunities. Through its programs, BAS serves as a catalyst for self-empowerment, innovation, and regional enhancement.

Buffalo Arts Studio is supported in part by The Cameron and Jane Baird Foundation, Community Foundation for Greater Buffalo, Erie County Cultural Funds, M&T Bank, Ovation Stand for the Arts, The Andy Warhol Foundation for the Visual Arts, and through the New York State Council for the Arts with the support of Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Legislature.



I'm Still Confused About Medicare Part A And Part B Enrollment - Ask Rusty

Dear Rusty: I'm 64 and still working full time, and plan to continue working at least until I'm 70 ~ it's a good job, and I enjoy it. My job comes with health insurance, so I don't really need additional coverage, but I understand I will be required to sign up for Medicare Part A anyway when I turn 65 next year. What I don't understand is Part B: A colleague of mine, who is a little older than I am, said she signed up for Part B because a penalty will be incurred if we wait until we retire from our jobs and actually need the additional insurance. I'm not sure she's right. Can you explain what I should do?

Signed: Confused About Medicare

Dear Confused: We're happy to assist you with understanding this. First, enrolling in Medicare Part A (coverage for inpatient hospitalization service) is mandatory to collect Social Security after age 65. If you do not plan to take your Social Security benefits yet, you can defer enrolling in Part A until you claim Social Security. But Medicare Part A is also free to those eligible for Social Security, so there is little reason not to enroll in Part A at age 65 and, when you claim Social Security, you will be automatically enrolled.

Part B, which is coverage for outpatient healthcare services (doctors, medical tests, etc.), is different. Part B is always

premium associated with (standard premium is \$185/month in 2025), but nearly everyone over age 65 requires healthcare coverage. If, however, you are employed and have "creditable" healthcare coverage from your employer ("creditable" is a group plan with more than 20 participants), then you can defer enrolling in Medicare Part B until your creditable employer coverage ends. And you can do so without incurring a "late enrollment penalty" for enrolling in Part B outside of your Initial Enrollment Period (IEP). When your creditable coverage from your employer ends, you will enter an 8-month Medicare "special enrollment period" (SEP) which permits you to enroll in Part B without penalty.

Thus, as long as your employer coverage is "creditable," you can defer enrolling in Part B without penalty. FYI, you can also enroll in Part B a couple of months prior to your employer coverage ending, asking that your Part B coverage starts when your employer coverage ends, to avoid any gap in healthcare coverage. Note you will likely need your employer to provide you with proof of creditable coverage when you later enroll in Part B.

A couple of extra

If you require prescription drug coverage when your employer coverage ends after age 65, you only have 63 days to acquire that drug coverage without incurring a "Part D" (drug plan) late enrollment penalty. So, if needed, you should not wait to get insurance coverage for prescription drugs after you employer coverage ends.

If you now have a Health Savings Account (HSA) through your employer, you should discontinue any HSA contributions well before (perhaps as much as six months before) your enrollment in Medicare Part A. That's because Part A is not considered a "high deductible" insurance plan (a "high deductible" plan is a requirement for having a Health Savings Account). If you do not have an HSA, you need not be concerned about this. If you do, we can also provide you with more info on this.

Kearns Proudly Pays Tribute To Purple Heart Veterans For National Purple Heart Day



Erie County Clerk Michael P. Kearns pays tribute to 15 Purple Heart Recipients added to the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Book of Merit for 2025 during a Dedication and Flag Raising Ceremony that included honorees, family members, veteran organizations, and the Military Order of the Purple Heart, Chapters 187 and 264.

In honor of Purple Heart Appreciation Day, Erie County Clerk Michael P. Kearns recognized Erie County Pur-

ple Heart Recipients being added to the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Book of Merit for 2024. No formal record of Purple Heart Recipients in Erie County existed prior to 2018 when Kearns originated Erie County's version of the "Book of Merit."

sion of the "Book of Merit."
"An estimated 2 million servicemen and women who fought and lost their lives or received life-altering injury protecting our great country and have earned the Purple Heart," stated Kearns. "These selfless individuals come from all walks of life and backgrounds, and more specifically, from across Erie County. While the majority of veterans do not seek our thanks and praise, I firmly believe we owe them both." National Purple Heart Day is observed annually on August 7th and dedicated to remembering and honoring the brave men and women of the United States Armed Forces who were wounded on the battlefield or lost their lives in combat operations.

The Purple Heart is a United States military decoration awarded in the name of the president to those wounded or killed while serving on or after April 5, 1917, with the U.S. military. Originally called the Badge of Military Merit, the Purple Heart was created by George Washington on August 7, 1782. In addition to receiving a purple heart shaped medal, the honoree's name and regiment were inscribed in the "Book of Merit" which was lost after the Revolutionary War and the award was largely forgotten until over 100 years later. The Purple Heart is the oldest military decoration still awarded to members of the U.S. military.

"It is my esteemed honor to present the 2025 Purple Heart Recipient Names being added to the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Book of Merit," said Kearns. "The lack of records on Purple Heart recipients was always a surprise to me. As the chief document and records holder for the county, I wanted to create a way for the names of Purple Heart Recipients to be acknowledged and remembered."

The 2025 volume of the William J. Donovan Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit will now hold the names

of five hundred ninety (590) Purple Heart Recipients from across Erie County, with the additional fifteen (15) veterans added at today's ceremony.

The book is named after Buffalo native and leading advocate for the Central Intelligence Agency, William J. Donovan. Prior to becoming known as the "Father of American Intelligence", Donovan served in the United States Infantry and was one of the first units deployed to Europe during World War I. Donovan would receive three Purple Hearts during his service in the military and would go on to head the Central Intelligence Agency, during World War II.

This year's ceremony was held at Old County Hall, home to the Erie County Clerk's Office, in the Ceremonial Court Room, followed by a Purple Heart flag raising observance at the statue of President George Washington. The ceremony began with a welcome from County Clerk Kearns, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by World War II Veteran Dr. John Long, with the National Anthem performed by local lyricist George Miller. Kearns presented Certificates of Recognition and commemorative Purple Heart pins along with Military Order of the Purple Heart Chapters 187 and 264 to recipients or their family members as the honoree's names, branch of service, and war was read aloud.

The William J. Donovan Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit is on permanent display at the Erie County Clerk's Office inside Old County Hall at 92 Franklin Street. Along with the book, there are also historical photos of William J. Donovan, a portrait of Donovan, and a World War I era Purple Heart with two oak leaf clusters donated to the Clerk's Office. Submissions for the 2026 Purple Heart Recipients Book of Merit are currently being accepted online at erie.gov/clerk/purpleheartform or by contacting the County Clerk's office at 716-858-6787.

"I strongly believe we must honor our military heroes who have been injured or lost their lives while serving our country and were awarded this national recognition. Their bravery and sacrifice deserve to be celebrated. I am proud that we can preserve the legacy of our local servicemen and servicewomen at the Erie County Clerk's Office," added Kearns.

Additionally, County Clerk Kearns announced Old County Hall will be lit up purple through August 10th in honor of Purple Heart Appreciation Day and in solemn recognition for all service members injured or killed in action.


