### **An Amazing Season**





These 24 twelve year old players went to Cooperstown last week to see the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame.

This week's column comes straight from the heart.

We have watched over 1,300 boys and girls play Baseball and Softball again in Shoshone Park since Opening Day back in early May. Over 100 teams played on eight diamonds in this tiny Park off of Hertel

Avenue near Main Street and at Mc-Carthy Park nearby. Whether your son or daughter, nephew or cousin played House, Travel or T-Ball for the first time or

in played House, Travel or T-Ball for the first time or the tenth time, chances are they had a good time. They learned how to play the game, hit a baseball or softball and round the bases, hoping for a win.

But now it's over, the seasons have ended and champions were crowned in nine different Division of House Baseball or Softball that held us all in complete rapture for three months while life continued for the adults, working downtown and not anywhere near Shoshone Park. Another great, successful season for North Buffalo in a place where most consider their second home.

Here's a quick replay of House team winners in all Divisions. In Rookie Boys, the Division was broken into two separate Playoff Brackets due to the numbers registered to play. We previously wrote about the Twins winning the Championship in the Yellow Brack-

et over the Angels. In the Green Bracket, the Royals won their second Championship in a row after last season with a 8-6 victory over the Rangers in a very hard fought series that needed an additional game after the Rangers beat the Royals two days earlier, 12-2. Both teams

er, 12-2. Both teams had tremendously successful seasons, winning four playoff games after nine wins during the regular season. It was truly a joy to watch these six and

seven year old boys fight for a championship.

As we reported last week, the Double AA Phillies defeated the Mets in the Championship game, 11-5 and New York State Senator April Baskin helped hand out the winning trophies and medallions to both teams afterward. In Double AA Girls, the Tigers defeated the Bonnies, 11-10 in a hard fought game that had to be moved to another diamond for the last inning in a 10-10 tie because of darkness. Four bright light towers in each corner of the diamond helped end a terrific season for the Bonnies in their efforts to defeat the defending champ Tigers for the Double AA trophy. Another great season for both teams.

In Triple AAA Boys, the Orioles defeated the Yankees, 12-8 in the second game, played two nights lat-

er after losing to the Yanks, 6-5. The Orioles led the Division all season long, setting the pace while teams like the A's and Mariners were not that far behind. The Yankees however became a force in the Playoffs, winning three of their last four games to give the Orioles a harder than expected victory. Credit the coaching on both sides of the diamond for an amazing season.

In Major Boys, the Giants ended the regular season undefeated with a 12-0 mark against seven other teams. Against teams like the Dodgers, Mets, Phillies or Padres, the Giants brought their bats with them every game and scored victories every week since early May.

In the Playoffs, the team faced a very competitive Braves team in round three after two victories over the Reds and Cardinals. The Atlanta team gave the Giants their first loss in the postseason, 5-4 and then took the Championship of the Division with a 6-5 victory four nights later. It was an amazing season for both teams.

"It was great experience," said Alex Felver of the North Buffalo Blaze 12U Green team after he and 11 of his teammates returned home from All-Star Village near Oneonta, New York and the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown. "I had a really good time with my friends and teammates, playing Baseball not far from the Hall Of Fame."

These are the words that 24 twelve year old Boys are saying this week after the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League got to see and experience one of the finest Baseball trips made available to them every year in Cooperstown, New York. This year, two teams of 12 year old Boys got to play against some other talented teams across the Nation. The boys are Lucas Adamczyk-Turkovich, Maddox Beale, Christian Cipolla, Connor Gunnarson, Brody Huard, Jack Kleeh, Brody Large, Vince Martin, Jace Petti and Brady Roberts.

The 12U Yellow Blaze team are Bennett Armstrong, Colin Bussiere, Sebastian Fyda, Elijah Hilliard, Patrick Lea-Kelly, Joseph LoTempio, Michael McCabe, George Rhoney, Dominic Sabia, Will Schoepflin, Cole Schrader and Colin Poppenberg.

Vince Martin won a competition against 81 other boys from across the Country for speed, running around the bases in just 12 seconds. Brady Roberts hit a Grand Slam Homerun in one game.

"I would like to thank our coaches," said Felver. "Noah Huard and Jacob Lea-Kelly are amazing."

#### I'm In Poor Health And Need To Know My Social Security Options - Ask Rusty

Dear Rusty: I plan to stop working very soon. My health is not good. I am 66 years old, born in June 1959, so my full retirement age is 66 years and 10 months. My wife passed away in March 2024, and she was collecting SS benefits when she died. I have no dependent children. In general, what benefits am I entitled to? Signed: Unhealthy and Strugoling

**Dear Unhealthy and Struggling:** Sorry to hear that your health is failing, and that you will need to stop working soon. But do not fear — Social Security will be there for you. Here is some info to help you decide your next possible steps:

Since you will not reach your full retirement age until next year (in April 2026), your earnings limit from working for this year is \$23,400 (or \$1950/ month). The earnings limit will apply only if you decide to claim Social Security early (this year). If you decide to take Social Security this year, your earnings from before you take SS won't count, but your monthly earnings for the remaining months of this year will be subject to the 2025 monthly limit (\$1950). If your monthly earnings exceed that amount, you won't be entitled to SS benefits for that month, unless your total earnings for 2025 are less than \$23,400). If you don't exceed the annual limit, your 2025 Social Security benefits won't be affected by your work earnings.

\Next year, the year you

age (FRA), your earnings limit will be much higher (about 2.5 times more, or something more than about \$63,000). If your 2026 earnings up through March do not exceed that limit, then you can claim your SS benefits a bit earlier in 2026 (before your FRA), and your benefits won't be affected, except that your monthly benefit amount will be permanently reduced by .556% for each month you claim before your FRA. For example, if you were to claim for your SŠ to start in January 2026, you would get 98.3% of your FRA amount. So, provided your work earnings won't exceed about \$63,000 between January and March 2026, you could claim effective January 2026 without worrying about Social Security's earnings test. So, depending upon your health, you could claim SS to start in January 2026, likely without worry about the earnings test, and would get about 98.3% of your FRA benefit. Or, health permitting, you could wait to claim SS starting in April 2026 to get 100% of the benefit you've earned from a lifetime of working. Point is, you just need to be careful not to exceed Social Security's earnings tests prior to reaching your full retirement age, or SS will take away some of your benefits. They "take away" by withholding future monthly payments as long as needed to recover what you owe. Worse case penalty for exceeding the 2026 monthly limit would be no benefits for any month you exceed about \$5300, or a penalty of \$1 for every \$3 over the limit if you exceed the 2026 annual limit before your FRA.

You do, however, have another option as your wife's surviving spouse: You can claim your benefit as a surviving spouse prior to claiming your own SS retirement amount. But the earnings test described above (if you claim before your FRA) would also apply to your survivor benefits. So, again, your plans for working enter this decision. If you decide to stop working this year, you could, for example, decide to claim your survivor benefit this year and collect that until you reach your FRA in April 2026 when you would get 100% of your personal SS retirement amount. In fact, you might even decide to collect your survivor benefit longer, allowing your own SS benefit to grow until you are 70, at which time you would get about 25% more than your FRA amount. Indeed, if your survivor benefit is higher than your personal age 70 amount, you can just continue to claim the higher amount.

I suggest that when you decide that you must

stop working full time, you contact Social Security at 1.800.772.1213 to discuss whether it is best to claim your survivor benefit from your wife first and delay claiming your own until a later time (to get a higher amount). You can make an appointment to discuss your options with SS over the phone, before deciding when (and what) to claim. And, of course, if you have any further questions, we are always here to assist you with your decision.

finish, the total project cost came to \$894,500.




