A Dream Come True!

With as many as nine girls returning from last year, the six and seven year old Rebels team in the Hertel North Park Youth Baseball League, won the Championship in the Rookie Girls Division

with a 10-3 victory over the Devils in late July, in front of family and friends to claim their first title in the Park's history.

Against teams like the Angels or Diamonds, scores were close on any given day but

"Our biggest competition were the Devils," said Sandel. They were the defending Champs in the Division and they sure played like it in our games. They were solid just like us from top to bottom and gave us a real fight. Our girls never gave up though.'

Sandel shared a message that Head Coach Kurtz told all the girls throughout this season. "In our games, Laura told all our girls: 'every game matters, every girl matters, every hit matters and every play matters.' The girls really listened and played for each other."


With an 11-0-1 record in the Regular season, the Rebels got ready for the Playoffs and quickly shut out the Wolfpack in round one back on July 8. Four days later, the team sent the Diamonds to the loser's Bracket with an 18-4 victory. That set up the team's first meeting with the Devils. Sandel explained:

'We were down by five runs in the last inning against the Devils, 11-6, but we fought back in the bottom of the sixth to tie it and won it in extra innings, 12-11. It was incredible! That's when I knew this season was ours."

In the Final, Silvana Scaglione, Luna Zerrate-Sandel, Blake Kurtz, Vienna Letzelter and Sarai Ahmed all came together to defeat the Devils again, convincingly, 10-3 and end a season where a girls dream becomes a reality if they stick together and play hard.

"It was like a dream come true," said Sandel afterward. "It was a total team win. The girls all improved from last season and it was truly a joy to watch these girls celebrate. They deserve it."

Other girls on the team included Denim Norman, Elizabeth Ruhlmann, Zerimer Ramirez and Serafina Sweeney. Besides Sandel, Caitlin Rush, another second year coach, helped Kurtz lead this team to the Championship.

Man Steals 5 Credit Cards, A Purse, And **Drives Off In A Stolen Car Then Crashes**



Dear Rusty: I would like to get an answer concerning taking my Social Security benefit soon and switching to my spouse's benefit when he begins to take his. I am 64 years, 9 months old and my husband is 65 years, 7 months. My benefit is low due to the fact that I did not work for about 25 years while raising our children. My benefit would be \$573 at age 65. My husband's benefit at age 67 will be \$3,326. My first question is: can I receive half of my husband's benefit once he begins drawing his? Secondly, if I draw my benefit now will that reduce the amount I can draw from his benefit later? Signed: Uncertain Spouse

Dear Uncertain: As you may know, the full re-

tirement age (FRA) for both you and your husband is 67. If either of you claim before your FRA your monthly SS retirement amount will be permanently reduced and, if you are currently working, you will be subject to Social Security's Annual Earnings Test (AET) which limits how much you can earn while collecting early benefits. The earnings limit for early filers is \$23,400 for 2025 (changes yearly) and, if that is exceeded, SS will take away some of your benefits (\$1 for every \$2 over the limit). They "take away" by withholding future payments until the penalty is satisfied.

That said, if you claim your personal ŠS "soon" (e.g., at age 65), you will get about 87% of the amount

you would get by waiting until your FRA to claim. You would, indeed, get a "spousal boost" when your husband claims, but you would not get 50% of his age 67 amount. That's because of the way spouse benefits are calculated. When your husband claims, you will get a "spousal boost" added to your early benefit amount (\$573?). The amount of that spousal boost will be computed as ½ of your husband's FRA amount (e.g., \$1663), minus your FRA entitlement (likely about \$661) for a spousal boost of about \$1002. But since you won't have yet reached vour FRA when your husband claims, the amount of the spousal boost will also be reduced (to about \$926), which will be added to your age 65 amount of \$573 for a total monthly spousal benefit of about \$1499.

So, the answers to your two questions are:

1. Because you claimed your Social Security retirement benefit early and won't yet be your full retirement age when your husband claims, you will not get half of your husband's benefit when he claims. You would likely get about 45% of his benefit.

2. If you take your own SS retirement benefit now, you will get a higher benefit when your husband claims, but the amount you get will be less than half of his FRA

entitlement.

The only way you can get the full 50% of your husband's FRA benefit entitlement is to wait until your own full retirement age to claim Social Security.

Rules Of The Road When It Comes To School Bus Safety

As summer winds down, children across Erie County are heading back to school and the "Yellow School Buses" once again dot our roadways. For a majority of the over 121,000 students throughout Erie County, the school day begins and ends with a trip on a school bus. Many children will be going to school for the first time and may not be as careful when crossing the street or running to catch the bus. Older children know the routine, but may forget in their excitement to catch up with friends. Unfortunately, each year some bus trips to school end in tragedy -- children are injured or killed in school bus incidents when motorists fail to follow the rules of the

road. Data has shown that on a single school day, an estimated 50,000 drivers throughout New York State illegally pass stopped school buses. Although drivers are required to stop for a school bus when it is stopped to load or unload passengers, children should not rely on them to do so, a fact that parents should discuss with their children prior to the start of the school year.

The rules of the road in New York State are specific when it comes to school buses. Drivers need to know and obey the "flashing signal light system" that school bus drivers use to alert motorists of pending actions. Yellow flashing lights indicate that the bus is preparing to stop to load or unload

children. That is the time to slow down and prepare to stop your vehicle. Red flashing lights and extended stop arms indicate that the bus has stopped, and that children are getting on or off the bus. Motorists must stop their cars at least 20 feet away from the bus and wait until the red lights stop flashing, the extended stop sign is withdrawn, and the bus begins moving before they can start driving again. When a school bus stops and flashes its red lights, traffic approaching from either direction must stop before reaching the bus: on a two-lane road, on multi-lane highways, or on divided highways.

All drivers should know that the fine for passing a stopped school bus ranges from a minimum of \$250 and up to \$400 and/or up to 30 days in jail for the first violation. Additionally, a conviction places 5 points on your driver's license and may result in increased insurance premiums. If convicted of three violations in three years, your license will be revoked for a minimum of six months. It goes without saying that even

one instance of passing a stopped school bus is not only reckless, but also unacceptable, and it could mean the life of a child.

Parents, it is important to talk with your child, or children, about school bus safety. Children need to know to stand at least three giant steps (6 feet) away from the curb when waiting for the bus to arrive. Children must also wait until the bus comes to a complete stop, the doors open, and the driver says it is okay before stepping onto the bus. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the greatest risk is not while riding on the school bus, but getting on or getting off. Children need to be reminded to be cautious in and around the "danger zone" of the school bus, which is the 10 feet in front, behind and on each side of the school bus.

When the new school year begins in the coming weeks, I remind motorists not to drive distracted, slow down around school zones and be alert for children approaching or exiting school buses. If we all exercise a little extra care and caution, drivers and pedestrians can co-exist and together, we can all enjoy the upcoming school year safely.

Botanical Gardens And Gerard Place Celebrate Farm Garden

Gerard Place received funding support this year from the Health Foundation for Western & Central New York's Age-Friendly Go Local project, which addresses the issue of nutrition and the livability issues of loneliness, isolation, poverty and civic engagement among older adults living in the Bailey-Delavan community. At the end of last growing season, seniors from Gerard Place were surveyed to better understand what type of produce they would like to grow or learn more about in their cooking classes. In total, 35 crops were planted, with some new vegetables that came highly requested like squash, okra, collards, and a variety of melons. Seniors enrolled in Gerard Place's Senior Circle visited the Farm Garden on Wednesday morning at the Botanical Gardens to see the growing vegetable garden that they helped to design and interact with the volunteers and staff that helped make this initiative possible.

"Gerard Place is so appreciative of the partnership with the Buffalo and Erie County Botanical The beautiful Gardens. produce that we receive from them has a huge impact on the people involved in our programs. The Seniors in our Senior Nutrition Program learn how to cook healthy meals in our culinary kitchen using the produce plus receive some of the produce weekly. We have a Food Distribution program twice a week that in addition to the hot takeout meals, we pass out the produce to over 300 people. The fourteen families that live on the Gerard Place campus also receive some of the produce and attend healthy cooking classes as well. The generosity and
