City Of Buffalo Launches Educational Program To Expand Tree Canopy In Underserved Neighborhoods

The City of Buffalo today announced the launch of Buffalo Street Trees, a new educational initiative aimed at helping residents learn about the many benefits of street trees and encouraging them to contact the city to bring more trees to their neighborhoods. This effort is part of the city's commitment to environmental health, neighborhood resilience, and quality of life for all Buffalo residents.

A cornerstone of the ini-

tiative is its strong presence in the community. Working in partnership with the University at Buffalo Regional Institute (UBRI), the city will meet residents where they are—at block club meetings, neighborhood gatherings, and community events—to share information about the benefits of trees and make it easy to request a free street tree for the areas in front of their homes.

To strengthen this grassroots effort, the city

through UBRI is also launching a Street Tree Ambassador program. Ambassadors—local neighborhood leaders—will be recruited and trained to help carry out the outreach. They will engage residents directly, attend events, and build connections with civic associations and block clubs, extending the program's reach across Buffalo's neighborhoods.

Do I Need To Sign Up For An Online Social Security Account? - Ask Rusty

Dear Rusty: I recently I heard the tail end of a radio program which was discussing "signing up for my Social Security account." I am now 76 years old and have been receiving my SSA monthly amount directly into a credit union account for years. Since the time when I applied to begin receiving Social Security, I have had no need to contact SSA again since everything is working fine. I do not like having to use the Internet. It seems the government is just giving me busy work and requiring me to remember usernames, passwords, etc. just when I am trying desperately to simplify my life. Can you shed any light on the need to sign up for an online SSA account by answering this:

1) What is the back-

ground regarding this "call" by the SSA to create an online account?

2) Why is the SSA wanting us to have "accounts"? Mysteriously, no one I have asked is able to give me a reason why we should have "accounts" on-line.

3) What happens if I do not sign up for an "account"?

4) Is there a window of time during which we must "sign up"?

Thanking you in advance for any light you can shed on this issue. **Signed: Concerned Senior**

Dear Concerned: While creating an online Social Security account is recommended by the Social Security Administration, doing so is more of a convenience than a necessity. It is mainly a way to confirm your iden-

tity to Social Security in advance, in case you need to contact them in the future to make changes to your SS account. If you don't plan to make any changes, then it is not mandatory for you to create an online "my Social Security" account. Nothing will change for you – you will continue to get your monthly benefits as you have been doing all these years.

Regarding your specific questions:

1. What is the background? Social Security has, for many years, been encouraging people to do business with them "online." This is, essentially, a way to improve the efficiency of a) getting your needs handled more quickly, and b) improving SSA's internal efficiency so as to handle more transactions with fewer staff.

2. Why does SSA want you to have an online account? SS fraud has become an issue, with nefarious individuals constantly trying to get at a person's Social Security (and other) government benefits. As part of its process for online access, SSA has evolved to a quite secure online identification process, which includes modern security techniques. These include things like "Two-Factor Identification" and use of certain specific identification measures through two main programs for access to government systems (known as LOGIN.gov and ID.me). These create a single pre-verified way to access multiple government systems (such as SSA, IRS, VA, etc.). It means that only one ID and password are required to access numerous government systems and ensures that those who access the account are the correct person. It is primarily a way to protect your benefits from others and prevent fraud.

3. What happens if I do not sign up for an "account"? Nothing will happen, unless you have a need to change something with Social Security. For example, if you for some reason wanted to change the financial account to which your SS benefits are deposited. With a secure LOGIN.gov account you could make that change quickly using your online account. Without a secure online account, you would,

instead, need to make an appointment to visit your local Social Security office to make the change and provide proof of who you are. Again, this is to reduce fraud.

4. Is there a window of time during which we must "sign up"? As indicated above, there is no time in which you must "sign up." If you do not sign up for on-

line access, and don't need to change anything with respect to your SS benefits, then you do not need to create an online account.

So, while creating an online SSA account is highly recommended, it is not mandatory for those who have no need to interact directly with the Social Security Administration.

There are good and bad things about growing old. Of course the good things are the pleasant memories that one can recollect. The bad is that physically you cannot do what you used to do, but still have the desire to do. That is just the way it is, take it or leave it. Today, I would like to share some really great things that happened back when. So hard to believe how good it was compared to the turmoil we now are facing in this country.

I would like to go back to the late 40's, early 50's. Yes, I was around back then but there are few left that were. Think about it, a terrible war had just ended and happiness was everywhere. Our boys were coming home and the death and destruction

was over. No more rationing, no more sacrificing, no more gold stars in the windows signifying the loss of a family member, just joy in the world. We all loved each other as we survived as a nation doing what was the right thing.

What I would like to focus this column on is downtown Buffalo at Christmas time back in that decade. It was magical. Main street was lined with large Department stores who tried to outdo each other with Christmas window displays. Everything had a touch of Christmas. You have to be old to remember huge stores like J.N. Adams, Kobackers, Hengerers, Adam Meldrum, and Anderson to name a few. Their street level windows were fully decorated with the

spirit of Christmas. Seasonal music filled the air as you strolled up and down to view and enjoy the moving window displays that gave you that feel good spirit of the season. Kobackers notably had a giant Santa sitting in a chair and just laughing continuously. As you stood there watching him you could not help but laugh along. Laughing is contagious. As a child to go downtown on Main Street was an annual treat. The street was loaded with shoulder to shoulder people, laughing, singing, and greeting each other with a "Merry Christmas". Everyone said it no matter your race, religion, or party. We were all Americans under one flag, especially at that war's end. Like I said, it was magical and I am so glad I lived in one of the happy times.

Just want to add that to produce these displays done for the enjoyment of the people, they had to have a huge cost. J.N. Adams always had the biggest and best display. Mr. Adams was a special man and he in a way touched my family. He was instrumental in building a magnificent facility in Perrysburg, New York for patients with tuberculosis. A large rest hospital, as continued rest was one of the remedies for TB. The structures are no longer in use and abandoned and vandalized but still there. My connection to this facility is that my aunt passed away there after a long stay at this hospital at no cost. She suffered with TB, back then it was a common and often a life ending illness. The good memory here is that there are men and women like Mr. Adams who were really good people and contributed to the elimination and cures of deadly diseases. People who leave a legacy. Had the abil-

ity and desire to help mankind. We should appreciate men and women like this. At least I do.

So that is my trip down memory lane for today. It is too bad we did not have TV and recorded those days downtown. Wish there were some way to bring back that magic, it was fun, it was great. Those of us old enough, can still enjoy this trip, even if it is just a memory.

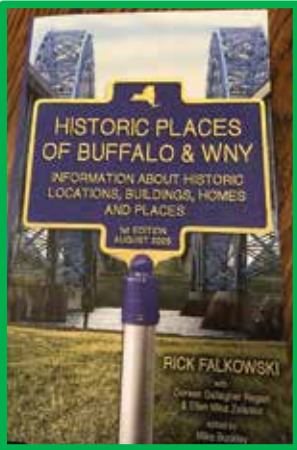

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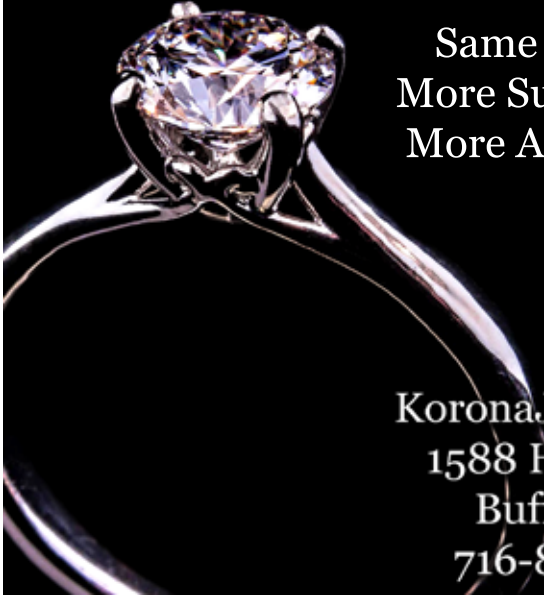
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
